<b>accurate</b>	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>A player who can deliver long <b>accurate</b> passes to the wingers.</i>
<b><a href="#">authentic</a></b>	Conforming to fact and therefore worthy of belief. <i>Every detail of the film was totally <b>authentic</b>.</i>
<b>bona fide</b>	Undertaken in good faith.
<b>close</b>	Close in relevance or relationship. <i>She finished a <b>close</b> second.</i>
<b>correct</b>	Correct in opinion or judgment. <i>The <b>correct</b> version.</i>

<b>errorless</b>	Free from error. <i>An <b>errorless</b> baseball game.</i>
<b><u>exact</u></b>	Accurate or correct in all details. <i>Hit the <b>exact</b> center of the target.</i>
<b>factual</b>	Of or relating to or characterized by facts. <i>Cases mentioned are <b>factual</b>.</i>
<b><u>faithful</u></b>	(of a spouse or partner) never having a sexual relationship with anyone else. <i>A <b>faithful</b> copy of the portrait.</i>
<b><u>just</u></b>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>His <b>just</b> inheritance.</i>
<b>literal</b>	(of a person or performance) lacking imagination; prosaic. <i>A <b>literal</b> depiction of the scene before him.</i>
<b><u>precise</u></b>	Marked by exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. <i>A <b>precise</b> measurement.</i>
<b><u>realistic</u></b>	Representing what is real; not abstract or ideal. <i>A <b>realistic</b> novel.</i>
<b>regular</b>	Relating to a person who does something regularly. <i>Her breathing became more <b>regular</b>.</i>
<b>strict</b>	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>A <b>strict</b> interpretation of the law.</i>
<b>true</b>	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>The horseshoe crab is not a <b>true</b> crab.</i>
<b>unelaborated</b>	Not developed or presented in great or further detail. <i>He prefers the <b>unelaborated</b> 1818 23 text.</i>
<b>unerring</b>	Not liable to error. <i>An <b>unerring</b> sense of direction.</i>
<b><u>unquestionable</u></b>	Not counterfeit or copied. <i><b>Unquestionable</b> authority.</i>
<b>unvarnished</b>	Not having a coating of stain or varnish. <i><b>Unvarnished</b> woodwork.</i>

## Associations of "Veritable" (30 Words)

<b>accuracy</b>	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>He was beginning to doubt the <b>accuracy</b> of his compass.</i>
<b><u>actual</u></b>	Existing now; current. <i><b>Actual</b> and imagined conditions.</i>
<b>actually</b>	Used to introduce a new topic or to add information to a previous statement. <i>He had a thick Cockney accent he sounded like my grandad <b>actually</b>.</i>
<b><u>authentic</u></b>	Not counterfeit or copied. <i>An <b>authentic</b> account by an eyewitness.</i>
<b>authenticate</b>	Establish the authenticity of something. <i>They were invited to <b>authenticate</b> artefacts from the Italian Renaissance.</i>
<b>authenticity</b>	Undisputed credibility. <i>The paper should have established the <b>authenticity</b> of the documents before publishing them.</i>
<b><u>certainty</u></b>	A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place. <i>The passing of the act made a general election a <b>certainty</b>.</i>
<b>documentary</b>	Emphasizing or expressing things as perceived without distortion of personal feelings, insertion of fictional matter, or interpretation. <i>A <b>documentary</b> programme about Manchester United.</i>
<b>fact</b>	A statement or assertion of verified information about something that is the case or has happened. <i>Your fears have no basis in <b>fact</b>.</i>
<b>factual</b>	Actually occurring. <i>A mixture of comment and <b>factual</b> information.</i>
<b><u>fulfil</u></b>	Satisfy or meet (a requirement, condition, or need). <i>Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to <b>fulfil</b> themselves.</i>
<b><u>genuine</u></b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>A <b>genuine</b> dilemma.</i>
<b>infotainment</b>	Broadcast material which is intended both to entertain and to inform.
<b>integrity</b>	An undivided or unbroken completeness or totality with nothing wanting. <i>Upholding territorial <b>integrity</b> and national sovereignty.</i>
<b>legitimacy</b>	Conformity to the law or to rules. <i>It is difficult to judge the <b>legitimacy</b> of the rumour.</i>

<b><u>practical</u></b>	Guided by practical experience and observation rather than theory. <i>The idea had no <b>practical</b> application.</i>
<b>probing</b>	Physically exploring or examining. <i>His dark <b>probing</b> eyes.</i>
<b>real</b>	Really very. <i><b>Real</b> prices.</i>
<b>reality</b>	Relating to reality TV. <i>He refuses to face <b>reality</b>.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i>The supporting cast includes old <b>reliables</b> like Mitchell.</i>
<b>sooth</b>	Truth or reality. <i>In <b>sooth</b>.</i>
<b><u>substantive</u></b>	Any word or group of words functioning as a noun. <i><b>Substantive</b> law.</i>
<b><u>tangible</u></b>	Perceptible by the senses especially the sense of touch. <i><b>Tangible</b> evidence.</i>
<b>tangibly</b>	In a tangible manner.
<b>thoroughbred</b>	A horse of a thoroughbred breed. <i>This is a real <b>thoroughbred</b> of a record.</i>
<b>truth</b>	That which is true or in accordance with fact or reality. <i>The emergence of scientific <b>truths</b>.</i>
<b>unalloyed</b>	(of metal) not alloyed; pure. <i><b>Unalloyed</b> copper.</i>
<b><u>veracity</u></b>	Unwillingness to tell lies. <i>Officials expressed doubts concerning the <b>veracity</b> of the story.</i>
<b><u>virtual</u></b>	Relating to the points at which rays would meet if produced backwards. <i>A <b>virtual</b> revolution.</i>
<b><u>virtually</u></b>	By means of a computer; computationally. <i>The college became <b>virtually</b> bankrupt.</i>
