accurate	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i>A player who can deliver long accurate passes to the wingers.</i>
authentic	Conforming to fact and therefore worthy of belief. <i>Every detail of the film was totally authentic.</i>
bona fide	Undertaken in good faith.
close	Close in relevance or relationship. <i>She finished a close second.</i>
correct	Correct in opinion or judgment. <i>The correct version.</i>

errorless	Free from error. <i>An errorless baseball game.</i>
<u>exact</u>	Accurate or correct in all details. <i>Hit the exact center of the target.</i>
factual	Of or relating to or characterized by facts. <i>Cases mentioned are factual.</i>
<u>faithful</u>	(of a spouse or partner) never having a sexual relationship with anyone else. <i>A faithful copy of the portrait.</i>
<u>just</u>	Of an opinion or appraisal well founded justifiable. <i>His just inheritance.</i>
literal	(of a person or performance) lacking imagination; prosaic. <i>A literal depiction of the scene before him.</i>
<u>precise</u>	Marked by exactness and accuracy of expression or detail. <i>A precise measurement.</i>
<u>realistic</u>	Representing what is real; not abstract or ideal. <i>A realistic novel.</i>
regular	Relating to a person who does something regularly. <i>Her breathing became more regular.</i>
strict	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>A strict interpretation of the law.</i>
true	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>The horseshoe crab is not a true crab.</i>
unelaborated	Not developed or presented in great or further detail. <i>He prefers the unelaborated 1818 23 text.</i>
unerring	Not liable to error. <i>An unerring sense of direction.</i>
<u>unquestionable</u>	Not counterfeit or copied. <i>Unquestionable authority.</i>
unvarnished	Not having a coating of stain or varnish. <i>Unvarnished woodwork.</i>

Usage Examples of "Veritable" as an adjective

- *Photographs taken in a veritable bull ring.*
- *The early 1970s witnessed a veritable price explosion.*

accuracy	The quality or state of being correct or precise. <i>He was beginning to doubt the accuracy of his compass.</i>
actual	Existing now; current. <i>Actual and imagined conditions.</i>
actually	Used to introduce a new topic or to add information to a previous statement. <i>He had a thick Cockney accent he sounded like my grandad actually.</i>
authentic	Not counterfeit or copied. <i>An authentic account by an eyewitness.</i>
authenticate	Establish the authenticity of something. <i>They were invited to authenticate artefacts from the Italian Renaissance.</i>
authenticity	Undisputed credibility. <i>The paper should have established the authenticity of the documents before publishing them.</i>
certainty	A fact that is definitely true or an event that is definitely going to take place. <i>The passing of the act made a general election a certainty.</i>
documentary	Emphasizing or expressing things as perceived without distortion of personal feelings, insertion of fictional matter, or interpretation. <i>A documentary programme about Manchester United.</i>
fact	A statement or assertion of verified information about something that is the case or has happened. <i>Your fears have no basis in fact.</i>
factual	Actually occurring. <i>A mixture of comment and factual information.</i>
fulfil	Satisfy or meet (a requirement, condition, or need). <i>Arts grants go to young people who say they wish to fulfil themselves.</i>
genuine	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>A genuine dilemma.</i>
infotainment	Broadcast material which is intended both to entertain and to inform.
integrity	An undivided or unbroken completeness or totality with nothing wanting. <i>Upholding territorial integrity and national sovereignty.</i>
legitimacy	Conformity to the law or to rules. <i>It is difficult to judge the legitimacy of the rumour.</i>

<u>practical</u>	Guided by practical experience and observation rather than theory. <i>The idea had no practical application.</i>
probing	Physically exploring or examining. <i>His dark probing eyes.</i>
real	Really very. <i>Real prices.</i>
reality	Relating to reality TV. <i>He refuses to face reality.</i>
reliable	A reliable person or thing. <i>The supporting cast includes old reliables like Mitchell.</i>
sooth	Truth or reality. <i>In sooth.</i>
<u>substantive</u>	Any word or group of words functioning as a noun. <i>Substantive law.</i>
<u>tangible</u>	Perceptible by the senses especially the sense of touch. <i>Tangible evidence.</i>
tangibly	In a tangible manner.
thoroughbred	A horse of a thoroughbred breed. <i>This is a real thoroughbred of a record.</i>
truth	That which is true or in accordance with fact or reality. <i>The emergence of scientific truths.</i>
unalloyed	(of metal) not alloyed; pure. <i>Unalloyed copper.</i>
<u>veracity</u>	Unwillingness to tell lies. <i>Officials expressed doubts concerning the veracity of the story.</i>
<u>virtual</u>	Relating to the points at which rays would meet if produced backwards. <i>A virtual revolution.</i>
<u>virtually</u>	By means of a computer; computationally. <i>The college became virtually bankrupt.</i>
