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| candour | Ability to make judgments free from discrimination or dishonesty. <i>A man of refreshing candour.</i> |
| certainty | A person that is certain to do or win the specified thing. <i>A man exuding certainty.</i> |
| certitude | Something that someone firmly believes is true. <i>The question may never be answered with certitude.</i> |

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| fact | A statement or assertion of verified information about something that is the case or has happened. <i>He supported his argument with an impressive array of facts.</i> |
| genuineness | Undisputed credibility. <i>So many have been touched by her genuineness her indomitable spirit and her love.</i> |
| god's truth | Conformity to reality or actuality. |
| gospel truth | Conformity to reality or actuality. |
| honesty | Referring to or using a way of charging for goods or services that relies on the customers to leave money in an unattended receptacle even though there is no one to collect their payments. <i>They spoke with convincing honesty about their fears.</i> |
| sincerity | The absence of pretence, deceit, or hypocrisy. <i>They demanded some proof of my sincerity.</i> |
| the truth | United States abolitionist and feminist who was freed from slavery and became a leading advocate of the abolition of slavery and for the rights of women (1797-1883). |
| the whole truth | All of something including all its component elements or parts. |
| trueness | Conformity to reality or actuality. <i>I marveled at the trueness of his aim.</i> |
| truth | A true statement. <i>He thought of answering with the truth but he knew they wouldn't believe it.</i> |
| truthfulness | The fact of being realistic or true to life; realism. <i>The truthfulness of her playing of an ageing American spinster.</i> |
| veracity | Conformity to facts; accuracy. <i>Officials expressed doubts concerning the veracity of the story.</i> |

| certainty | The state of being certain. <i>She knew with absolute certainty that they were dead.</i> |
| confirm | Administer the rite of confirmation to. <i>Two recent experiences have confirmed me in this view.</i> |
| dependability | The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The brand has built its reputation on rock solid dependability.</i> |
| exact | Inflict (revenge) on someone. <i>An exact mind.</i> |
| exactness | The quality of being exact. <i>He demanded exactness in all details.</i> |
| exhaustive | Performed comprehensively and completely. <i>An exhaustive study.</i> |
| fact | An event known to have happened or something known to have existed. <i>Your fears have no basis in fact.</i> |
| factual | Existing in act or fact. <i>Cases mentioned are factual.</i> |
| genuine | Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something. <i>A genuine dilemma.</i> |
| infallible | (in the Roman Catholic Church) credited with papal infallibility. <i>An infallible antidote.</i> |
| precise | (of ideas, images, representations, expressions) characterized by perfect conformity to fact or truth; strictly correct. <i>A precise measurement.</i> |
| precision | Marked by or adapted for accuracy and exactness. <i>Note the meticulous precision of his measurements.</i> |
| real | Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>Real incomes had fallen by 30 per cent.</i> |
| reliability | The quality of being dependable or reliable. <i>The car's background gives me every confidence in its reliability.</i> |

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| reliable | A reliable person or thing. <i>Reliable information.</i> |
| reliably | In a consistently good or accurate way. <i>Few of these paintings can be reliably dated.</i> |
| scientifically | In a systematic or methodical manner. <i>A scientifically important site.</i> |
| scrupulous | Characterized by extreme care and great effort. <i>Less scrupulous producers sent bundles that were deceptive in appearance.</i> |
| sinless | Free from sin. <i>The sinless life of Christ.</i> |
| <u>thorough</u> | Taking pains to do something carefully and completely. <i>The child is being a thorough nuisance.</i> |
| thoroughgoing | Involving or attending to every detail or aspect of something. <i>A thoroughgoing chocoholic.</i> |
| transparency | The condition of being transparent. <i>The transparency of ice.</i> |
| truth | A fact or belief that is accepted as true. <i>The situation brought home to us the blunt truth of the military threat.</i> |
| <u>truthfulness</u> | The fact of being realistic or true to life; realism. <i>We have had to judge the truthfulness of the evidence.</i> |
| unerring | Not liable to error. <i>An unerring sense of direction.</i> |
| verisimilitude | The appearance of truth; the quality of seeming to be true. <i>The detail gives the novel some verisimilitude.</i> |
