Vertigo as a Noun

Definitions of "Vertigo" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “vertigo” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall.*
- *A sensation of whirling and loss of balance, associated particularly with looking down from a great height, or caused by disease affecting the inner ear or the vestibular nerve; giddiness.*



Synonyms of "Vertigo" as a noun (7 Words)

dizziness	A sensation of spinning around and losing one's balance. <i>The medicine can cause dizziness or nausea.</i>
giddiness	A sensation of whirling and a tendency to fall or stagger; dizziness. <i>The fans can be forgiven their giddiness.</i>
lightheadedness	A frivolous lack of prudence.
loss of balance	Something that is lost.
loss of equilibrium	Something that is lost.
spinning of the head	A swift whirling motion (usually of a missile.
swimming of the head	The act of swimming.



Associations of "Vertigo" (30 Words)

airsickness	Motion sickness experienced while traveling by air (especially during turbulence).
chaos	(Greek mythology) the most ancient of gods; the personification of the infinity of space preceding creation of the universe. <i>Snow caused chaos in the region.</i>
<u>coma</u>	The luminous cloud of particles surrounding the frozen nucleus of a comet; forms as the comet approaches the sun and is warmed. <i>She went into a coma.</i>
confuse	Identify wrongly; mistake. <i>Purchasers might confuse the two products.</i>
confused	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>A confused expression crossed her face.</i>
dementia	A chronic or persistent disorder of the mental processes caused by brain disease or injury and marked by memory disorders, personality changes, and impaired reasoning.

<u>diarrhea</u>	Frequent and watery bowel movements; can be a symptom of infection or food poisoning or colitis or a gastrointestinal tumor.
<u>discombobulated</u>	Having self-possession upset; thrown into confusion. <i>He is looking a little pained and discombobulated.</i>
<u>discomfort</u>	Something that makes a person feel physically uncomfortable. <i>His remarks caused her discomfort.</i>
<u>dismayed</u>	Struck with fear, dread, or consternation.
disorient	Cause someone to lose their sense of direction disorientate. <i>I was disoriented by the dark.</i>
dizziness	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall. <i>The medicine can cause dizziness or nausea.</i>
<u>dizzy</u>	Make dizzy or giddy. <i>Had a dizzy spell.</i>
earache	An ache localized in the middle or inner ear. <i>I ve got earache.</i>
epilepsy	A neurological disorder marked by sudden recurrent episodes of sensory disturbance, loss of consciousness, or convulsions, associated with abnormal electrical activity in the brain.
fatigue	Cause (someone) to feel exhausted. <i>Buccinator and orbicularis oris muscles showing signs of fatigue.</i>
frenetic	Fast and energetic in a rather wild and uncontrolled way. <i>A frenetic pace of activity.</i>
giddiness	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall. <i>Symptoms include nausea vomiting and giddiness.</i>
<u>groggy</u>	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion). <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling groggy.</i>
headache	Something or someone that causes anxiety; a source of unhappiness. <i>I ve got a splitting headache.</i>
<u>ill</u>	Suffering from an illness or disease or feeling unwell. <i>He was ill prepared.</i>
migraine	A severe recurring vascular headache; occurs more frequently in women than men. <i>I m getting a migraine.</i>
<u>nausea</u>	Disgust so strong it makes you feel sick. <i>The stories will launch a wave of public nausea and outrage.</i>

numbness	Partial or total lack of sensation in a part of the body; a symptom of nerve damage or dysfunction. <i>Tingling and numbness in the left arm.</i>
pain	Cause mental or physical pain to. <i>Chest pains.</i>
sickness	Defectiveness or unsoundness. <i>A woman suffering an incurable sickness.</i>
<u>stupor</u>	The feeling of distress and disbelief that you have when something bad happens accidentally. <i>Someone stole his wallet while he was in a drunken stupor.</i>
syncope	The loss of sounds from within a word (as in `fo`c`sle` for `forecastle.
toothache	Pain in a tooth or teeth. <i>He has a toothache.</i>
vomiting	The reflex act of ejecting the contents of the stomach through the mouth.
