<b>effervescence</b>	Bubbles in a liquid; fizz. <i>The <b>effervescence</b> of sparkling wine.</i>
<b>elan</b>	Enthusiastic and assured vigor and liveliness. <i>A performance of great <b>elan</b> and sophistication.</i>
<b>energy</b>	A degree or level of energy possessed by something or required by a process. <i>He plays tennis with great <b>energy</b>.</i>
<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Few expressed <b>enthusiasm</b> about the current leaders.</i>
<b>fanaticism</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>The dangers of religious <b>fanaticism</b>.</i>
<b>feeling</b>	The emotional side of someone's character; emotional responses or tendencies to respond. <i>The surface had a greasy <b>feeling</b>.</i>
<b>fervour</b>	Intense and passionate feeling. <i>He talked with all the <b>fervour</b> of a new convert.</i>
<b>fieriness</b>	A passionate and quick-tempered nature.
<b>fire</b>	A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning. <i>We had a bath in a tin tub by the <b>fire</b>.</i>

<b>motivation</b>	A set of facts and arguments used in support of a proposal. <i>Keep staff up to date and maintain interest and <b>motivation</b>.</i>
<b>passion</b>	The suffering of Jesus at the Crucifixion. <i>Modern furniture is a particular <b>passion</b> of Bill s.</i>
<b>pep</b>	Energy and high spirits; liveliness. <i>This tonic is guaranteed to give you more <b>pep</b>.</i>
<b><u>push</u></b>	The force used in pushing. <i>An investor with the necessary money and <b>push</b>.</i>
