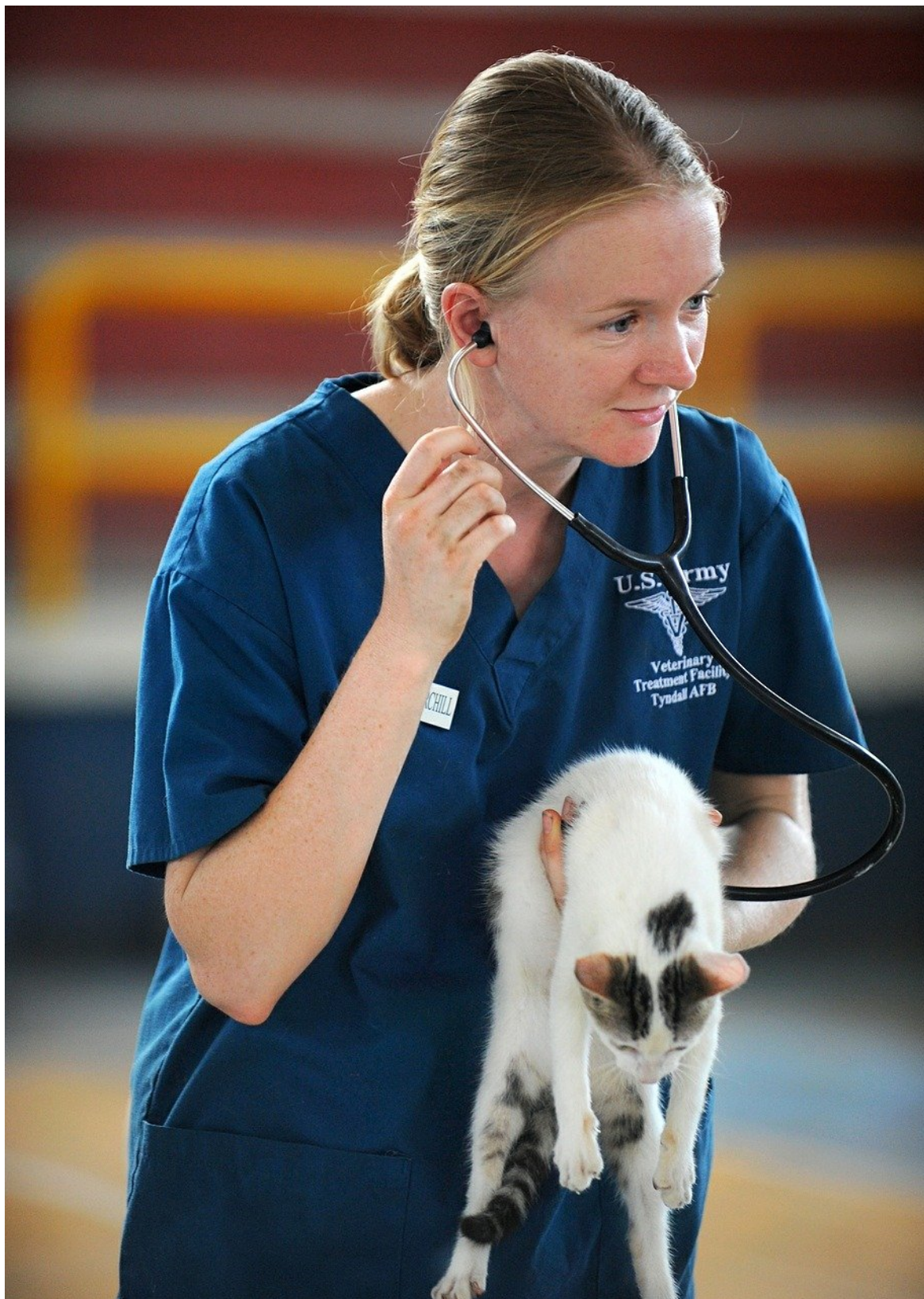
- appraise** Consider in a comprehensive way.

*They **inspected** the paintwork for cracks and flaws.*
- look over** Take charge of or deal with.

- review** Hold a review of troops.

- weigh up** To be oppressive or burdensome.

<b>doctor</b>	(Roman Catholic Church) a title conferred on 33 saints who distinguished themselves through the orthodoxy of their theological teaching. <i>She wanted to become a <b>doctor</b>.</i>
<b>ferret</b>	Hunt with ferrets. <i>He shambled over to the desk and <b>ferreted</b> around.</i>
<b>forefoot</b>	A front foot of a quadruped.
<b>homeopathy</b>	A method of treating disease with small amounts of remedies that, in large amounts in healthy people, produce symptoms similar to those being treated.
<b>hospital</b>	An institution providing medical and surgical treatment and nursing care for sick or injured people. <i>Christ's <b>Hospital</b>.</i>
<u><b>massage</b></u>	Give a massage to. <i><b>Massage</b> can ease tiredness.</i>
<b>medic</b>	A medical practitioner or student.
<b>medicinal</b>	A medicinal substance. <i><b>Medicinal</b> herbs.</i>



<b>midwife</b>	A woman skilled in aiding the delivery of babies. <i>These women <b>midwifed</b> her.</i>
<b>orthopedist</b>	A specialist in correcting deformities of the skeletal system (especially in children).
<b>osteopath</b>	A therapist who manipulates the skeleton and muscles.
<b>pediatrics</b>	The branch of medicine concerned with the treatment of infants and children.
<b>pet</b>	A fit of petulance or sulkiness especially at what is felt to be a slight. <i>Don t cry <b>pet</b> it s all right.</i>
<b>pharmacist</b>	A person who is professionally qualified to prepare and dispense medicinal drugs.
<b>physician</b>	A licensed medical practitioner. <i><b>Physicians</b> of the soul.</i>
<b>practitioner</b>	A person actively engaged in an art, discipline, or profession, especially medicine. <i>Patients are treated by skilled <b>practitioners</b>.</i>
<b><u>preferred</u></b>	Preferred above all others and treated with partiality. <i>Danny s <b>preferred</b> name is Dan.</i>
<b>prescribe</b>	(of a medical practitioner) advise and authorize the use of (a medicine or treatment) for someone, especially in writing. <i>My mother <b>prescribes</b> a good night s sleep as the cure for all ills.</i>
<b>pug</b>	Small compact smooth-coated breed of Asiatic origin having a tightly curled tail and broad flat wrinkled muzzle.
<b>puppy</b>	A person or thing of a specified kind. <i>You ungrateful <b>puppy</b>.</i>
