<b>interdiction</b>	The action of impeding an enemy force, especially by bombing lines of communication or supply. <i>The <b>interdiction</b> of arms shipments.</i>
<b>moratorium</b>	A temporary prohibition of an activity. <i>The debt was to be subject to a five year <b>moratorium</b>.</i>
<b>prohibition</b>	The period from 1920 to 1933 when the sale of alcoholic beverages was prohibited in the United States by a constitutional amendment. <i><b>Prohibitions</b> on insider dealing.</i>
<b>proscription</b>	Condemnation or denunciation of something. <i>He plays a the priest whose moral <b>proscriptions</b> lead only to catastrophe.</i>
<b>rejection</b>	The speech act of rejecting. <i><b>Rejection</b> of the transplanted liver.</i>
<b>turndown</b>	A rejection or refusal. <i>The company has suffered a dramatic <b>turndown</b> after a storm of bad publicity.</i>
<b>vetoing</b>	A vote that blocks a decision.

<b>proscribe</b>	Denounce or condemn. <i>Certain customary practices which the Catholic Church <b>proscribed</b> such as polygyny.</i>

<b>quash</b>	Declare invalid. <i>The government <b>quashes</b> any attempt of an uprising.</i>
<b>reject</b>	Reject with contempt. <i>I <b>reject</b> the idea of starting a war.</i>
<b>rule against</b>	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance.
<b>rule out</b>	Mark or draw with a ruler.
<b>say 'no' to</b>	State as one's opinion or judgement; declare.
<b>throw out</b>	Convey or communicate; of a smile, a look, a physical gesture.
<b>turn down</b>	Change to the contrary.

<b><u>disavow</u></b>	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>Her husband <b>disavowed</b> her after 30 years of marriage and six children.</i>
<b><u>forbid</u></b>	Command against. <i>I can see why phones were <b>forbidden</b>.</i>
<b>interdict</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a sentence debarring a person or place from ecclesiastical functions and privileges. <i>I have not been <b>interdicted</b> from consuming alcoholic beverages.</i>
<b>interdiction</b>	A court order prohibiting a party from doing a certain activity. <i>Air ground and naval <b>interdictions</b>.</i>
<b><u>invalidate</u></b>	Declare invalid. <i><b>Invalidate</b> a contract.</i>
<b>legislation</b>	The process of making or enacting laws. <i>It will require <b>legislation</b> to change this situation.</i>
<b>misrepresent</b>	Give a false or misleading account of the nature of. <i>This statement <b>misrepresents</b> my intentions.</i>
<b>negate</b>	Make (a clause, sentence, or proposition) negative in meaning. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b><u>neutralize</u></b>	Oppose and mitigate the effects of by contrary actions. <i>The double agent was <b>neutralized</b>.</i>
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Make ineffective by counterbalancing the effect of. <i>Insulin can block the release of the hormone and thereby <b>nullify</b> the effects of training.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	Rule against. <i>You can <b>override</b> the cut out by releasing the switch.</i>
<b><u>pessimistic</u></b>	Tending to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen. <i>He was <b>pessimistic</b> about the prospects.</i>
<b><u>prohibit</u></b>	(of a fact or situation) make (something) impossible; prevent. <i>All ivory trafficking between nations is <b>prohibited</b>.</i>
<b>proscribe</b>	Command against. <i>Strikes remained <b>proscribed</b> in the armed forces.</i>
<b>reject</b>	The person or thing that is rejected or set aside as inferior in quality. <i>His body could begin to <b>reject</b> the implanted heart.</i>

<b>repeal</b>	The action of revoking or annulling a law or act of parliament. <i>The legislation was <b>repealed</b> five months later.</i>
<b>repudiation</b>	Refusal to acknowledge or pay a debt or honor a contract (especially by public authorities). <i>The breach is not so serious as to amount to a <b>repudiation</b> of the whole contract.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b>rescission</b>	(law) the act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the <b>rescission</b> of the agreement.</i>
<u><b>revoke</b></u>	The mistake of not following suit when able to do so. <i>He <b>revoked</b> the ban on smoking.</i>
