<b>choleric</b>	Easily moved to anger- H.G.Wells. <i>A <b>choleric</b> outburst.</i>
<b><u>contentious</u></b>	Relating to or involving differences between contending parties. <i>A style described as abrasive and <b>contentious</b>.</i>
<b><u>controversial</u></b>	Giving rise or likely to give rise to controversy or public disagreement. <i>A <b>controversial</b> decision on affirmative action.</i>
<b><u>cross</u></b>	Extending or lying across in a crosswise direction at right angles to the long axis. <i><b>Cross</b> members should be all steel.</i>
<b><u>debatable</u></b>	(of land) on the border between two countries and claimed by each. <i>It is <b>debatable</b> whether the country is coming out of recession.</i>
<b><u>disgruntled</u></b>	In a state of sulky dissatisfaction. <i>Judges receive letters from <b>disgruntled</b> members of the public.</i>
<b><u>displeased</u></b>	Feeling or showing annoyance and displeasure. <i>He was <b>displeased</b> with your work.</i>
<b>disputed</b>	Subject to disagreement and debate.
<b><u>dissatisfied</u></b>	Not content or happy with something. <i>His parents are <b>dissatisfied</b> with the quality of tuition on offer.</i>
<b>enraged</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i>The <b>enraged</b> bull attacked.</i>
<b>exasperated</b>	Intensely irritated and frustrated. <i>As the students exit an <b>exasperated</b> teacher tries in vain to get their attention.</i>
<b><u>frustrated</u></b>	Feeling or expressing distress and annoyance resulting from an inability to change or achieve something. <i>Jealousies and <b>frustrated</b> passions.</i>
<b>fuming</b>	Feeling, showing, or expressing great anger. <i>Smith was left <b>fuming</b> following the security breach.</i>
<b>furious</b>	Extremely angry. <i>A <b>furious</b> battle.</i>
<b><u>harassed</u></b>	Troubled persistently especially with petty annoyances. <i>It is a godsend for <b>harassed</b> parents.</i>
<b>harried</b>	Troubled persistently especially with petty annoyances. <i>A <b>harried</b> expression.</i>
<b>hot-tempered</b>	Quickly aroused to anger.
<b>huffy</b>	Roused to anger- Mark Twain. <i>Stayed <b>huffy</b> a good while.</i>

<b>ill-humoured</b>	Brusque and surly and forbidding.
<b>in a bad mood</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>in a huff</b>	Directed or bound inward.
<b>in a temper</b>	Holding office.
<b>in contention</b>	Holding office.
<b>in dispute</b>	Holding office.
<b>in high dudgeon</b>	Holding office.
<b>incensed</b>	Angered at something unjust or wrong. <i>Leonora glared back at him <b>incensed</b>.</i>
<b><u>inflamed</u></b>	(of a part of the body) red or swollen as a result of inflammation. <i><b>Inflamed</b> eyes and lips.</i>
<b>infuriated</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i><b>Infuriated</b> onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
<b>irate</b>	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i><b>Irate</b> protesters.</i>
<b>irritated</b>	Aroused to impatience or anger. <i>The <b>irritated</b> look on Alec's face.</i>
<b>maddened</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i>Could not control the <b>maddened</b> crowd.</i>
<b><u>moot</u></b>	Open to argument or debate. <i>It is a <b>moot</b> point whether such a controversial scheme would have succeeded.</i>
<b>nettled</b>	Aroused to impatience or anger. <i>Feeling <b>nettled</b> from the constant teasing.</i>
<b><u>ongoing</u></b>	Continuing; still in progress. <i><b>Ongoing</b> negotiations.</i>
<b>open to debate</b>	Affording unobstructed entrance and exit; not shut or closed.
<b>open to doubt</b>	Having no protecting cover or enclosure.
<b>open to question</b>	Open to or in view of all.
<b>pestered</b>	Troubled persistently especially with petty annoyances. <i>Her poor <b>pestered</b> father had to endure her constant interruptions.</i>
<b><u>questionable</u></b>	Subject to question. <i>A fire of <b>questionable</b> origin.</i>
<b><u>resentful</u></b>	Full of or marked by resentment or indignant ill will. <i>A sullen <b>resentful</b> attitude.</i>

<b>testy</b>	Easily irritated; impatient and somewhat bad-tempered. <i>His <b>testy</b> disapproving father.</i>
<b>unconcluded</b>	Not yet brought to a conclusion. <i><b>Unconcluded</b> agreements.</i>
<b><u>undecided</u></b>	Not brought to a conclusion; subject to further thought. <i>Too many voters still declare they are <b>undecided</b>.</i>
<b>undetermined</b>	Not known. <i>The bus was travelling with an <b>undetermined</b> number of passengers when it crashed.</i>
<b>unresolved</b>	Characterized by musical dissonance harmonically unresolved. <i>A number of issues remain <b>unresolved</b>.</i>
<b>unsettled</b>	(of an area) having no settlers or inhabitants. <i>A spell of <b>unsettled</b> weather.</i>
<b>up in the air</b>	Getting higher or more vigorous.
<b>wrathful</b>	Full of or characterized by intense anger. <i>Natural calamities seemed to be the work of a <b>wrathful</b> deity.</i>

<b><u>afflict</u></b>	(of a problem or illness) cause pain or trouble to; affect adversely. <i><b>Afflict</b> with the plague.</i>
<b>agitate</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i><b>Agitate</b> the water to disperse the oil.</i>
<b><u>annoy</u></b>	Cause annoyance in disturb especially by minor irritations. <i>The decision really <b>annoyed</b> him.</i>
<b>annoyance</b>	An unpleasant person who is annoying or exasperating. <i>There was <b>annoyance</b> at government interference.</i>
<b>beleaguer</b>	Annoy persistently. <i>Our leaders decided to <b>beleaguer</b> the city.</i>



<b>bother</b>	Intrude or enter uninvited. <i>A spot of <b>bother</b>.</i>
<b>bothersome</b>	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>Aircraft noise is particularly <b>bothersome</b> near the airport.</i>
<b>disrupt</b>	Make a break in. <i>Our 3D printing technology is <b>disrupting</b> the traditional manufacturing industry.</i>
<b>disruptive</b>	(of a company or form of technology) causing radical change in an existing industry or market through being innovative. <i>Breaking a <b>disruptive</b> technology into the market is never easy.</i>
<b>disturb</b>	Destroy the peace or tranquility of. <i>Don't <b>disturb</b> the patient's wounds by moving him too rapidly.</i>
<b>harass</b>	Exhaust by attacking repeatedly. <i>This man <b>harasses</b> his female co-workers.</i>
<b>heckle</b>	Comb with a heckle. <i>Hemp was <b>heckled</b> and spun into rope yarn.</i>
<b>inconvenience</b>	To cause inconvenience or discomfort to. <i>The <b>inconvenience</b> of having to change trains.</i>
<b>interrupt</b>	Interfere in someone else's activity. <i>The coastal plain is <b>interrupted</b> by chains of large lagoons.</i>
<b>irk</b>	Irritate; annoy. <i>It <b>irks</b> her to think of the runaround she received.</i>
<b>irritate</b>	Cause inflammation or other discomfort in (a part of the body). <i>His tone <b>irritated</b> her.</i>
<b>irritation</b>	The stimulation of an organism, cell, or organ to produce an active response. <i>The minor <b>irritations</b> of life.</i>
<b>nettle</b>	Sting with nettles. <i>I was only asking Jess said <b>nettled</b>.</i>
<b>nuisance</b>	A person or thing causing inconvenience or annoyance. <i>It's a <b>nuisance</b> having all those people clomping through the house.</i>
<b>offend</b>	Cause to feel resentment or indignation. <i>Her tactless remark <b>offended</b> me.</i>
<b>peeve</b>	An annoyed or irritated mood. <i>That was the one thing that <b>peeved</b> him.</i>

<b><u>pester</u></b>	Trouble or annoy (someone) with frequent or persistent requests or interruptions. <i>She constantly <b>pestered</b> him with telephone calls.</i>
<b>pique</b>	Cause to feel resentment or indignation. <i>Men who are thought to <b>pique</b> themselves upon their Wit.</i>
<b>rag</b>	Apply paint to a surface with a rag. <i>He wiped his hands on an oily <b>rag</b>.</i>
<b>rile</b>	Cause annoyance in; disturb, especially by minor irritations. <i>He has been <b>riled</b> by suggestions that his Arsenal future is in doubt.</i>
<b><u>teasing</u></b>	Playful vexation. <i>A <b>teasing</b> and persistent thought annoyed him.</i>
<b>trouble</b>	Take the trouble to do something concern oneself. <i>I wouldn't want to put you to any <b>trouble</b>.</i>
<b><u>turbulent</u></b>	Relating to or denoting flow of a fluid in which the velocity at any point fluctuates irregularly and there is continual mixing rather than a steady or laminar flow pattern. <i>Her <b>turbulent</b> emotions.</i>
<b><u>vexation</u></b>	Anger produced by some annoying irritation. <i>The <b>vexations</b> of life under canvas.</i>
<b><u>worry</u></b>	Annoy or disturb. <i>I <b>worry</b> about my grades.</i>
