- *A person's emotional state or the atmosphere of a place as communicated to and felt by others.*



## Synonyms of "Vibe" as a noun (25 Words)

- air** Air regarded as necessary for breathing.  
*An **air** of mystery.*
- ambience** Quality or character given to a sound recording by the space in which the sound occurs.  
*The relaxed **ambience** of the cocktail lounge is popular with guests.*
- aspect** The visual percept of a region.  
*The financial **aspect** can be overstressed.*
- aura** The distinctive atmosphere or quality that seems to surround and be generated by a person, thing, or place.  
*Emotional mental and spiritual levels form an energy field around the body known as the **aura**.*

<b>character</b>	A person seen in terms of a particular aspect of character. <i>He is a man of <b>character</b>.</i>
<b>climate</b>	A region with a particular climate. <i>The <b>climate</b> of opinion.</i>
<b>colour</b>	Any of the major conventional colours used in coats of arms gules vert sable azure purpure especially as opposed to the metals furs and stains. <i>Discrimination on the basis of <b>colour</b>.</i>
<b>colouring</b>	The process of changing the colour of something by painting, dyeing, or shading it. <i>Food <b>colouring</b>.</i>
<b>element</b>	Each of more than one hundred substances that cannot be chemically interconverted or broken down into simpler substances and are primary constituents of matter Each element is distinguished by its atomic number i.e. the number of protons in the nuclei of its atoms. <i>It was the <b>element</b> of danger he loved in flying.</i>
<b>emanation</b>	(theology) the origination of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. <i>She saw the insults as <b>emanations</b> of his own tortured personality.</i>
<b>feel</b>	Feelings of heightened emotion. <i>Nylon cloth with a cotton <b>feel</b>.</i>
<b>feeling</b>	The emotional side of someone's character; emotional responses or tendencies to respond. <i>A <b>feeling</b> of joy.</i>
<b>flavour</b>	A substance used to alter or enhance the taste of food or drink a flavouring. <i>Whitewashed walls and red roof tiles gave the resort a Mediterranean <b>flavour</b>.</i>
<b>impression</b>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>Her courtesy had made a good <b>impression</b>.</i>
<b>look</b>	An expression of a feeling or thought by looking. <i>He had charm good <b>looks</b> and an amusing insouciance.</i>
<b>mood</b>	An angry, irritable, or sullen state of mind. <i>A concept album which captures the <b>mood</b> of modern times.</i>
<b>overtone</b>	A component of any oscillation whose frequency is an integral multiple of the fundamental frequency. <i><b>Overtones</b> of despair.</i>
<b>quality</b>	A degree or grade of excellence or worth. <i>Commanding the admiration of people of <b>quality</b>.</i>
<b>spirit</b>	A volatile liquid, especially a fuel, prepared by distillation. <i>He was a leading <b>spirit</b> in the conference.</i>

<b>suggestion</b>	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>At my <b>suggestion</b> the museum held an exhibition of his work.</i>
<b><u>tenor</u></b>	An adult male with a tenor voice. <i>Although I disagreed with him I could follow the <b>tenor</b> of his argument.</i>
<b>tone</b>	A musical interval of two semitones. <i>A reduction of muscle <b>tone</b>.</i>
<b>undercurrent</b>	A subdued emotional quality underlying an utterance; implicit meaning. <i>Racial <b>undercurrents</b>.</i>
<b><u>undertone</u></b>	A pale or subdued color. <i>The sexual <b>undertones</b> of most advertising.</i>
<b><u>vibration</u></b>	(physics) a regular periodic variation in value about a mean. <i>Molecular <b>vibrations</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Vibe" as a noun

- *It gave me a nostalgic vibe.*



## Associations of "Vibe" (30 Words)

**aftershock** A smaller earthquake following the main shock of a large earthquake.

**alarm** Fill with apprehension or alarm cause to be unpleasantly surprised.  
*They disabled the **alarm** and used a glass cutter to get in.*

**careen** Move swiftly and in an uncontrolled way.  
*A heavy flood tide caused my vessel to **careen** dizzily.*

**commotion** Civil insurrection.  
*A **commotion** of people fought for the exits.*

**earthquake** Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity.  
*Selling the company caused an **earthquake** among the employees.*

**flicker** (of an emotion) be felt or shown briefly or faintly.  
*The interior lights **flickered** and came on.*

<b>flutter</b>	An act of fluttering. <i>Her insides were in a <b>flutter</b>.</i>
<b>gyroscope</b>	A device consisting of a wheel or disc mounted so that it can spin rapidly about an axis which is itself free to alter in direction The orientation of the axis is not affected by tilting of the mounting so gyroscopes can be used to provide stability or maintain a reference direction in navigation systems automatic pilots and stabilizers.
<b>oscillation</b>	A single complete execution of a periodically repeated phenomenon. <i>Electromagnetic <b>oscillations</b>.</i>
<b>palpitate</b>	Shake with fast, tremulous movements. <i>His heart <b>palpitated</b>.</i>
<b>pulsate</b>	Move with or as if with a regular alternating motion. <i>Blood vessels throb and <b>pulsate</b>.</i>
<b>quake</b>	An earthquake. <i>A little <b>quake</b> of delayed shock nudged her.</i>
<b>quaver</b>	Give off unsteady sounds, alternating in amplitude or frequency. <i>I m not safe here am I she said in a <b>quavering</b> voice.</i>
<b>quiver</b>	Cause (something) to make a slight rapid motion. <i>Juliet s lower lip <b>quivered</b>.</i>
<b>resonant</b>	(of sound) deep, clear, and continuing to sound or reverberate. <i>The sound of these instruments played in a <b>resonant</b> room is unforgettable.</i>
<b>seesaw</b>	Move up and down as if on a seesaw.
<b>shake</b>	Shake or vibrate rapidly and intensively. <i>I ve had this cold that I just can t <b>shake</b>.</i>
<b>shaking</b>	A shaky motion. <i>The <b>shaking</b> of his fingers as he lit his pipe.</i>
<b>shiver</b>	An almost pleasurable sensation of fright. <i>They <b>shivered</b> in the damp foggy cold.</i>
<b>shudder</b>	An act of shuddering. <i>The building cracked and <b>shuddered</b>.</i>
<b>teeter</b>	Move unsteadily, with a rocking motion. <i>She <b>teetered</b> after him in her high heeled sandals.</i>
<b>tremble</b>	A reflex motion caused by cold or fear or excitement. <i>There was a slight <b>tremble</b> in his voice.</i>
<b>tremor</b>	Undergo a tremor or tremors. <i>A <b>tremor</b> of unease.</i>

<b>tremulous</b>	Quivering as from weakness or fear. <i>Barbara's voice was <b>tremulous</b>.</i>
<b>upheaval</b>	A state of violent disturbance and disorder (as in politics or social conditions generally). <i>Major <b>upheavals</b> in the financial markets.</i>
<b>vacillate</b>	Waver between different opinions or actions; be indecisive. <i>I <b>vacillated</b> between teaching and journalism.</i>
<b>vibrate</b>	(of a pendulum) swing to and fro. <i>The bumblebee <b>vibrated</b> its wings for a few seconds.</i>
<b>vibration</b>	An oscillation of the parts of a fluid or an elastic solid whose equilibrium has been disturbed or of an electromagnetic wave. <i>The high frequencies of <b>vibration</b> in diamond.</i>
<b>waver</b>	Move hesitatingly, as if about to give way. <i>His love for her had never <b>wavered</b>.</i>
<b>wobble</b>	Tremble or shake. <i>The old cart <b>wobbled</b> down the street.</i>
