Vibrate as a Verb

Definitions of "Vibrate" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "vibrate" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- (of a pendulum) swing to and fro.
- Move or swing from side to side regularly.
- Quiver with (a quality or emotion.
- Move continuously and rapidly to and fro.
- (of a sound) resonate; continue to be heard.
- Sound with resonance.
- Shake, quiver, or throb; move back and forth rapidly, usually in an uncontrolled manner.
- Feel sudden intense sensation or emotion.
- Be undecided about something; waver between conflicting positions or courses of action.





Synonyms of "Vibrate" as a verb (33 Words)

beat	Beat through cleverness and wit. She beat him easily at chess.
<u>boom</u>	Say in a loud, deep, resonant voice. Stop right there boom ed the Headmaster.
drum	Play on a drum or drums. He channelled his energies into drum ming with local groups.
<u>echo</u>	Ring or echo with sound. The house echo ed with shouts.
hammer	Strike or knock at or on something violently with one s hand or with a hammer or other object. Maclean was presented with a great chance but he hammer ed the ball over the bar from 10 yards.
<u>hover</u>	Hang over, as of something threatening, dark, or menacing. Army helicopters hover ed overhead.



jiggle	Shake (something) lightly up and down or from side to side. <i>The car jiggled on its springs.</i>
judder	(especially of something mechanical) shake and vibrate rapidly and with force.
oscillate	The steering wheel judder ed in his hand. Vary in magnitude or position in a regular manner about a central point. The grain pan near the front of the combine oscillate s back and forth.
palpitate	Cause to throb or beat rapidly. <i>His heart palpitated.</i>
<u>pound</u>	Place or shut up in a pound. Pound the cows so they don t stray.
pulsate	Expand and contract with strong regular movements. Bangkok is a cosmopolitan city that pulsate s with life.
<u>pulse</u>	Modulate a wave or beam so that it becomes a series of pulses. A soft breeze pulse d the air.
quaver	Sing or play with trills, alternating with the half note above or below. <i>His voice quavered with rage.</i>
<u>quiver</u>	Move back and forth very rapidly. <i>The tree s branches stopped quivering.</i>
resonate	Evoke images, memories, and emotions. The sound of the siren resonate d across the harbour.
resound	(of fame, an achievement, etc.) be much talked of. <i>The hall resounded with laughter.</i>
reverberate	(of a place) appear to vibrate because of a loud noise. The waves reverberate as far away as the end of the building.
ring	Ring or echo with sound. My uncle ring s every Sunday at the local church.
shake	Shake or vibrate rapidly and intensively. I couldn t shake the car that was following me.
shiver	Shake, as from cold. They shiver ed in the damp foggy cold.
<u>shudder</u>	(especially of a vehicle, machine, or building) shake or vibrate violently. I shudder ed with horror.
thrill	Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input. <i>He was thrilled by the speed and the roar of the engine.</i>
<u>throb</u>	Pulsate or pound with abnormal force. <i>Her foot throbbed with pain.</i>



thrum	Sound with a monotonous hum. Blind men thrum and hum in the soft air.
<u>thud</u>	Move, fall, or strike something with a dull, heavy sound. Bullets were thud ding against the wall.
thump	Hit or strike heavily, especially with the fist or a blunt implement. She thump ed on the cottage door.
thunder	Be the case that thunder is being heard. Briggs thunder ed home a 30 yard free kick.
<u>tickle</u>	(of a part of the body) have a sensation of mild irritation or discomfort. <i>The grass tickled her calves.</i>
<u>tremble</u>	(of a structure or area of land) shake or quiver slightly. Her voice tremble d as she described how much she missed him.
vacillate	Waver between different opinions or actions; be indecisive. I vacillate d between teaching and journalism.
waver	Be unsure or weak. His love for her had never waver ed.
wobble	Waver between different courses of action; vacillate. They wobble around on their bikes.




Usage Examples of "Vibrate" as a verb

- A low rumbling sound that began to vibrate through the car.



Associations of "Vibrate" (30 Words)

aftershock	A tremor (or one of a series of tremors) occurring after the main shock of an earthquake.
careen	(of a ship) tilt; lean over. A heavy flood tide caused my vessel to careen dizzily.
<u>earthquake</u>	A sudden violent shaking of the ground, typically causing great destruction, as a result of movements within the earth's crust or volcanic action. <i>Selling the company caused an earthquake among the employees.</i>
excitement	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>His face was flushed with</i> excitement <i>and his hands trembled.</i>
<u>flutter</u>	An act of fluttering. There was a flutter of wings at the window.



gyroscope	A device consisting of a wheel or disc mounted so that it can spin rapidly about an axis which is itself free to alter in direction The orientation of the axis is not affected by tilting of the mounting so gyroscopes can be used to provide stability or maintain a reference direction in navigation systems automatic pilots and stabilizers.
oscillation	A regular periodic variation in value about a mean. <i>The oscillations of a pendulum.</i>
palpitate	Shake; tremble. <i>His nostrils palpitated.</i>
pulsate	Expand and contract rhythmically; beat rhythmically. The city pulsate d with music and excitement.
quake	An earthquake. A big quake east of the Rocky Mountains.
quaver	A note having the time value of an eighth of a semibreve or half a crotchet, represented by a large dot with a hooked stem. It was impossible to hide the slight quaver in her voice.
<u>quiver</u>	Tremble or shake with a slight rapid motion. She couldn t help the quiver in her voice.
<u>resonant</u>	(of a room, musical instrument, or hollow body) tending to reinforce or prolong sounds, especially by synchronous vibration. <i>The sound of these instruments played in a resonant room is unforgettable.</i>
seesaw	Move up and down as if on a seesaw.
shake	A milkshake. I couldn t shake the feeling that everyone was laughing at me.
<u>shaking</u>	A shaky motion. The shaking of his fingers as he lit his pipe.
shiver	A spell or an attack of trembling, typically as a result of fear or horror. She gave a little shiver as the wind flicked at her bare arms.
<u>shudder</u>	An act of shuddering. She still shudder ed at the thought of him.
<u>sway</u>	Move or walk in a swinging or swaying manner. The easy sway of her hips.
teeter	Be unable to decide between different courses; waver. She teeter ed after him in her high heeled sandals.
thrill	Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input. The men were thrill ed by a loud whistle blow.



<u>tremble</u>	A reflex motion caused by cold or fear or excitement. <i>There was a slight tremble in his voice.</i>
tremor	Undergo a tremor or tremors. A disorder that causes tremor s and muscle rigidity.
tremulous	Quivering as from weakness or fear. <i>He gave a tremulous smile.</i>
vacillate	Be undecided about something; waver between conflicting positions or courses of action. The line on the monitor vacillate d.
<u>vibe</u>	Get on; have a good relationship. <i>It gave me a nostalgic vibe.</i>
<u>vibration</u>	A distinctive emotional aura experienced instinctively. The big capacity engine generated less vibration .
wag	(especially with reference to an animal's tail) move or cause to move rapidly to and fro. <i>The dog went out</i> wag ging its tail.
waver	The act of moving back and forth. She never waver ed from her intention.
wobble	An unsteady rocking motion. His knees wobble d.
