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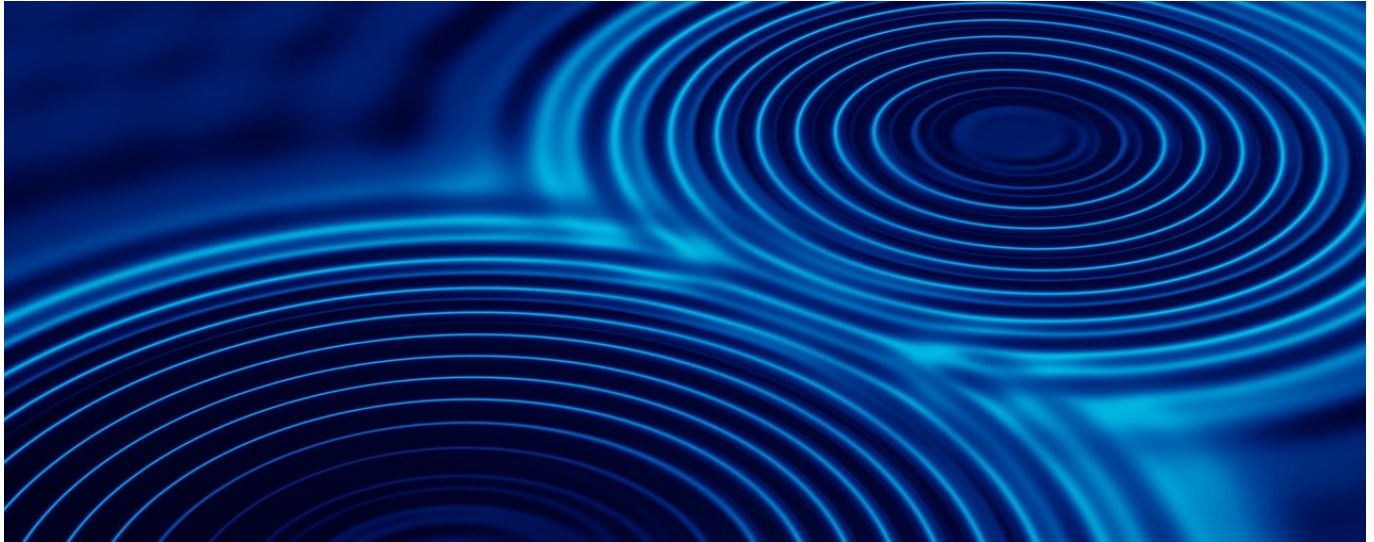

<b><u>climate</u></b>	A region with a particular climate. <i>Agricultural development is constrained by <b>climate</b>.</i>
<b>colour</b>	An item or items of a particular colour worn to identify or distinguish an individual or a member of a group in particular a jockey or a member of a sports team. <i>Discrimination on the basis of <b>colour</b>.</i>

<b>colouring</b>	A digestible substance used to give color to food. <i>Paint the eggs using edible food <b>colourings</b>.</i>
<b>drum</b>	A drum kit. <i>He could hear the <b>drums</b> before he heard the fifes.</i>
<b>drumming</b>	Small to medium sized bottom dwelling food and game fishes of shallow coastal and fresh waters that make a drumming noise. <i>He took up <b>drumming</b> in his teens.</i>
<b>element</b>	Each of more than one hundred substances that cannot be chemically interconverted or broken down into simpler substances and are primary constituents of matter Each element is distinguished by its atomic number i e the number of protons in the nuclei of its atoms. <i>In your <b>element</b>.</i>
<b>emanation</b>	The action or process of issuing from a source. <i>The commission is an <b>emanation</b> of the state.</i>
<b>feel</b>	Feelings of heightened emotion. <i>Fans will undoubtedly get the <b>feels</b> when they see how things haven t changed.</i>
<b>feeling</b>	An attitude or opinion. <i>He had the <b>feeling</b> that he was being watched.</i>
<b>flavour</b>	A substance used to alter or enhance the taste of food or drink a flavouring. <i>The yoghurt comes in eight fruit <b>flavours</b>.</i>
<b><u>impression</u></b>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>I wanted to create an <b>impression</b> of success.</i>
<b>judder</b>	An instance of rapid and forceful shaking and vibration. <i>The car gave a <b>judder</b>.</i>
<b>look</b>	An expression of a feeling or thought by looking. <i>Let me get a closer <b>look</b>.</i>
<b>mood</b>	The atmosphere or pervading tone of something. <i><b>Mood</b> music.</i>
<b>oscillation</b>	The process of oscillating between states. <i>The <b>oscillations</b> of a pendulum.</i>
<b>overtone</b>	(usually plural) an ulterior implicit meaning or quality. <i>The decision may have political <b>overtones</b>.</i>
<b>palpitation</b>	A noticeably rapid, strong, or irregular heartbeat due to agitation, exertion, or illness. <i>The stimulants gave me <b>palpitations</b>.</i>

<b><u>pound</u></b>	A symbol for a unit of currency especially for the pound sterling in Great Britain. <i>He got a hernia when he tried to lift 100 <b>pounds</b>.</i>
<b><u>pounding</u></b>	The act of pounding delivering repeated heavy blows. <i>All she could hear was the <b>pounding</b> of her heart.</i>
<b>pulsation</b>	(electronics) a sharp transient wave in the normal electrical state (or a series of such transients). <i>The <b>pulsations</b> seemed to be coming from a star.</i>
<b>pulsing</b>	The rate at which the heart beats; usually measured to obtain a quick evaluation of a person's health.
<b>quake</b>	An earthquake. <i>A little <b>quake</b> of delayed shock nudged her.</i>
<b>quaking</b>	Shaking and vibration at the surface of the earth resulting from underground movement along a fault plane or from volcanic activity.
<b>quality</b>	(music) the distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound). <i>The <b>quality</b> of students has risen.</i>
<b>quaver</b>	A tremulous sound. <i>It was impossible to hide the slight <b>quaver</b> in her voice.</i>
<b>quavering</b>	A tremulous sound.
<b><u>quiver</u></b>	An almost pleasurable sensation of fright. <i>She couldn't help the <b>quiver</b> in her voice.</i>
<b>quivering</b>	The act of vibrating. <i>To minimize her <b>quivering</b> she pressed her chin against her chest.</i>
<b>resonance</b>	A relationship of mutual understanding or trust and agreement between people. <i>The <b>resonance</b> of his voice.</i>
<b>reverberation</b>	A remote or indirect consequence of some action. <i>The attack has had <b>reverberations</b> around the world.</i>
<b><u>rumble</u></b>	A continuous deep, resonant sound like distant thunder. <i>The continuous <b>rumble</b> of traffic.</i>
<b>rumbling</b>	A continuous deep, resonant sound. <i>The <b>rumbling</b> of wheels in the distance.</i>
<b>shake</b>	A milkshake. <i>Cedar <b>shakes</b>.</i>
<b>shakiness</b>	The quality of being unstable and insecure. <i>The <b>shakiness</b> of the present regime.</i>

<b><u>shaking</u></b>	The act of causing something to move up and down (or back and forth) with quick movements. <i>The <b>shaking</b> of his fingers as he lit his pipe.</i>
<b>shaking movement</b>	A shaky motion.
<b>shiver</b>	A momentary trembling movement. <i>A look that gave him the <b>shivers</b>.</i>
<b>shivering</b>	A sensation of cold that often marks the start of an infection and the development of a fever. <i>Gradually his <b>shivering</b> slowed.</i>
<b><u>shudder</u></b>	An act of shuddering. <i>The pound s devaluation sent <b>shudders</b> through the market.</i>
<b>shuddering</b>	An involuntary vibration (as if from illness or fear). <i>If engine <b>shuddering</b> is evident get this fixed as soon as possible.</i>
<b>spirit</b>	The non-physical part of a person manifested as an apparition after their death; a ghost. <i>The university is a symbol of the nation s egalitarian <b>spirit</b>.</i>
<b>suggestion</b>	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>The power of <b>suggestion</b>.</i>
<b><u>tenor</u></b>	A singer with a tenor voice. <i>The Serenade for <b>tenor</b> horn and strings.</i>
<b><u>throb</u></b>	A deep pulsating type of pain. <i>The dull ache became a <b>throb</b>.</i>
<b>throbbing</b>	A sound with a strong rhythmic beat. <i>The <b>throbbing</b> of the engines.</i>
<b>thrum</b>	A thrumming sound. <i>The steady <b>thrum</b> of rain on the windows.</i>
<b>thump</b>	A strong heartbeat, especially one caused by fear or excitement. <i>The bag landed on the floor with a <b>thump</b>.</i>

<b>undercurrent</b>	A current of water below the surface and moving in a different direction from any surface current. Racial <b>undercurrents</b> .
<b>undertone</b>	A pale or subdued color. Spoke in <b>undertones</b> .
<b>vibe</b>	A distinctive emotional aura experienced instinctively. It gave me a nostalgic <b>vibe</b> .

**aftershock** A smaller earthquake following the main shock of a large earthquake.

**alarm** An alarm clock.

**careen** Turn (a ship) on its side for cleaning, caulking, or repair.  
*An electric golf cart **careened** around the corner.*

**earthquake** A great upheaval.  
*A political **earthquake**.*

**flutter** An act of fluttering.  
*A **flutter** on the horses.*

<b>gyroscope</b>	A device consisting of a wheel or disc mounted so that it can spin rapidly about an axis which is itself free to alter in direction The orientation of the axis is not affected by tilting of the mounting so gyroscopes can be used to provide stability or maintain a reference direction in navigation systems automatic pilots and stabilizers.
<b>hesitation</b>	The act of pausing uncertainly. <i>There was a <b>hesitation</b> in his speech.</i>
<b>oscillation</b>	Movement back and forth in a regular rhythm. <i>The <b>oscillations</b> of a pendulum.</i>
<b>palpitate</b>	(of the heart) beat rapidly, strongly, or irregularly. <i>His heart <b>palpitated</b>.</i>
<b>pulsate</b>	Move with or as if with a regular alternating motion. <i>The city <b>pulsated</b> with music and excitement.</i>
<b>quake</b>	An earthquake. <i>A big <b>quake</b> east of the Rocky Mountains.</i>
<b>quaver</b>	A note having the time value of an eighth of a semibreve or half a crotchet, represented by a large dot with a hooked stem. <i>His voice <b>quavered</b> with rage.</i>
<b>quiver</b>	A shaky motion. <i>She couldn't help the <b>quiver</b> in her voice.</i>
<b>seesaw</b>	Move up and down as if on a seesaw.
<b>seismic</b>	Of enormous proportions or effect. <i>There are <b>seismic</b> pressures threatening American society.</i>
<b>shake</b>	Shake a body part to communicate a greeting feeling or cognitive state. <i>She was visibly <b>shaken</b> and upset when she returned.</i>
<b>shaking</b>	A shaky motion. <i>The <b>shaking</b> of his fingers as he lit his pipe.</i>
<b>shiver</b>	Shake, as from cold. <i>She gave a little <b>shiver</b> as the wind flicked at her bare arms.</i>
<b>shudder</b>	An act of shuddering. <i>The train <b>shuddered</b> and edged forward.</i>
<b>sway</b>	Move or walk in a swinging or swaying manner. <i>The easy <b>sway</b> of her hips.</i>
<b>swing</b>	Mechanical device used as a plaything to support someone swinging back and forth. <i>The flaws in his <b>swing</b> weren't evident when he was an amateur.</i>



- teeter** Move unsteadily, with a rocking motion.  
*She **teetered** after him in her high heeled sandals.*
- tremble** (of a person or part of the body) shake involuntarily, typically as a result of anxiety, excitement, or frailty.  
*There was a slight **tremble** in his voice.*
- tremor** Undergo a tremor or tremors.  
*A muscle in my jaw **tremored** uncontrollably.*
- tremulous** Quivering as from weakness or fear.  
*Barbara s voice was **tremulous**.*
- vacillate** Waver between different opinions or actions; be indecisive.  
*I **vacillated** between teaching and journalism.*
- vibe** A person's emotional state or the atmosphere of a place as communicated to and felt by others.  
*Another classic CD for you to **vibe** with.*
- vibrate** Be undecided about something; waver between conflicting positions or courses of action.  
*The cabin started to **vibrate**.*
- waver** Move hesitatingly, as if about to give way.  
*The flame **wavered** in the draught.*
- wobble** A variation of pitch in the voice.  
*He is beginning to **wobble** on the issue.*
