## Associations of "Vice versa" (30 Words)

<b>bad</b>	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. A <b>bad</b> report card.
<b>betray</b>	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
<a href="#">culpability</a>	Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame. A level of moral <b>culpability</b> .
<a href="#">defective</a>	A person with mental disabilities. A <b>defective</b> appliance.
<b>delinquency</b>	Nonpayment of a debt when due. <i>Social causes of crime and <b>delinquency</b>.</i>
<a href="#">demonic</a>	Relating to or characteristic of demons or evil spirits. <i>Her laughter was <b>demonic</b>.</i>
<b>devilry</b>	Wicked and cruel behavior.
<b>diabolic</b>	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. <b>Diaboli</b> sorcerers under the influence of devils.
<a href="#">error</a>	A wrong action attributable to bad judgment or ignorance or inattention. <i>The crash was caused by human <b>error</b>.</i>
<a href="#">hellish</a>	Very unpleasant. <i>An unearthly <b>hellish</b> landscape.</i>
<b>immoral</b>	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>They considered colonialism <b>immoral</b>.</i>
<b>impious</b>	Lacking due respect or dutifulness. <b>Impious</b> toward one's parents.
<a href="#">improper</a>	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. <b>Improper</b> medication.

<b>inaccurate</b>	Not accurate. <i>An <b>inaccurate</b> translation.</i>
<b>iniquity</b>	Immoral or grossly unfair behaviour. <i>A den of <b>iniquity</b>.</i>
<b><u>injustice</u></b>	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora's remark.</i>
<b>malevolence</b>	The quality of threatening evil. <i>His eyes were glowing with <b>malevolence</b>.</i>
<b>malevolent</b>	Wishing or appearing to wish evil to others; arising from intense ill will or hatred. <i>Failure made him <b>malevolent</b> toward those who were successful.</i>
<b>malice</b>	Feeling a need to see others suffer. <i>I bear no <b>malice</b> towards anybody.</i>
<b>maliciousness</b>	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<b><u>mischief</u></b>	Harm or trouble caused by someone or something. <i>She'll make sure Danny doesn't get into <b>mischief</b>.</i>
<b>misinterpret</b>	Interpret wrongly. <i>Don't <b>misinterpret</b> my comments as criticism.</i>
<b>nefarious</b>	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i>The <b>nefarious</b> activities of the organized crime syndicates.</i>
<b><u>spite</u></b>	Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty. <i>It seemed as if the wind had a <b>spite</b> at her.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Memory is particularly <b>treacherous</b>.</i>
<b>ugliness</b>	Qualities of appearance that do not give pleasure to the senses. <i>The sheer <b>ugliness</b> of this architectural monstrosity.</i>
<b>unethical</b>	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i><b>Unethical</b> business practices.</i>
<b><u>unjust</u></b>	Violating principles of justice. <i><b>Unjust</b> punishment.</i>
<b>wickedness</b>	The quality of being wicked. <i>The <b>wickedness</b> of the regime.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>The <b>wrong</b> side of the road.</i>
