Associations of "Vice versa" (30 Words)

bad	Feeling physical discomfort or pain tough is occasionally used colloquially for bad. A bad report card.
betrayer	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
culpability	Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame. A level of moral culpability .
defective	A person with mental disabilities. A defective appliance.
delinquency	Nonpayment of a debt when due. <i>Social causes of crime and delinquency.</i>
demonic	Relating to or characteristic of demons or evil spirits. <i>Her laughter was demonic.</i>
deviltry	Wicked and cruel behavior.
diabolic	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. Diabolic sorcerers under the influence of devils.
error	A wrong action attributable to bad judgment or ignorance or inattention. <i>The crash was caused by human error.</i>
hellish	Very unpleasant. <i>An unearthly hellish landscape.</i>
immoral	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>They considered colonialism immoral.</i>
impious	Lacking due respect or dutifulness. Impious toward one's parents.
improper	Not in accordance with accepted standards, especially of morality or honesty. Improper medication.

inaccurate	Not accurate. <i>An inaccurate translation.</i>
iniquity	Immoral or grossly unfair behaviour. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>
<u>injustice</u>	Lack of fairness or justice. <i>She was taken aback by the injustice of Nora's remark.</i>
malevolence	The quality of threatening evil. <i>His eyes were glowing with malevolence.</i>
malevolent	Wishing or appearing to wish evil to others; arising from intense ill will or hatred. <i>Failure made him malevolent toward those who were successful.</i>
malice	Feeling a need to see others suffer. <i>I bear no malice towards anybody.</i>
maliciousness	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<u>mischief</u>	Harm or trouble caused by someone or something. <i>She'll make sure Danny doesn't get into mischief.</i>
misinterpret	Interpret wrongly. <i>Don't misinterpret my comments as criticism.</i>
nefarious	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i>The nefarious activities of the organized crime syndicates.</i>
<u>spite</u>	Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty. <i>It seemed as if the wind had a spite at her.</i>
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>Memory is particularly treacherous.</i>
ugliness	Qualities of appearance that do not give pleasure to the senses. <i>The sheer ugliness of this architectural monstrosity.</i>
unethical	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i>Unethical business practices.</i>
<u>unjust</u>	Violating principles of justice. <i>Unjust punishment.</i>
wickedness	The quality of being wicked. <i>The wickedness of the regime.</i>
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>The wrong side of the road.</i>
