bad	Badly. <i>He wants a bicycle so bad he can taste it.</i>
betrayer	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
culpability	Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame. <i>A level of moral culpability.</i>
defective	Lacking or deficient. <i>Complaints over defective goods.</i>
delinquency	Minor crime, especially that committed by young people. <i>Social causes of crime and delinquency.</i>
demonic	Relating to or characteristic of demons or evil spirits. <i>Something demonic in him something that could be cruel.</i>
deviltry	Wicked and cruel behavior.
diabolic	Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i>The diabolical expression on his face.</i>
error	Inadvertent incorrectness. <i>The book was full of errors.</i>
hellish	Extremely (used for emphasis). <i>It was hellish expensive.</i>
immoral	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>Unseemly and immoral behaviour.</i>
impious	Showing a lack of respect for God or religion. <i>The emperor's impious attacks on the Church.</i>
improper	Not suitable or right or appropriate. <i>An improper suggestion.</i>
inaccurate	Not accurate. <i>An inaccurate translation.</i>
iniquity	An unjust act. <i>A den of iniquity.</i>
injustice	An unjust act. <i>She was taken aback by the injustice of Nora's remark.</i>
malevolence	The quality of threatening evil. <i>His eyes were glowing with malevolence.</i>
malevolent	Having or showing a wish to do evil to others. <i>Failure made him malevolent toward those who were successful.</i>

malice	The desire to harm someone; ill will. <i>I bear no malice towards anybody.</i>
maliciousness	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<u>mischief</u>	A wrong or hardship that a statute is designed to remove or for which the common law affords a remedy. <i>Her eyes twinkled with irrepressible mischief.</i>
misinterpret	Interpret falsely. <i>I think you re misinterpreting the situation.</i>
nefarious	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i>The nefarious activities of the organized crime syndicates.</i>
<u>spite</u>	Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty. <i>It seemed as if the wind had a spite at her.</i>
treacherous	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A treacherous Gestapo agent.</i>
ugliness	The quality of being unpleasant or repulsive in appearance. <i>The sheer ugliness of this architectural monstrosity.</i>
unethical	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i>It is unethical to torment any creature for entertainment.</i>
<u>unjust</u>	Not equitable or fair. <i>Unjust punishment.</i>
wickedness	Estrangement from god. <i>The wickedness of the regime.</i>
wrong	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>They were wrong to take the law into their own hands.</i>
