<b>betrayer</b>	One who reveals confidential information in return for money.
<b>culpability</b>	Responsibility for a fault or wrong; blame. <i>A level of moral <b>culpability</b>.</i>
<b>defective</b>	Lacking or deficient. <i>Complaints over <b>defective</b> goods.</i>
<b>delinquency</b>	Minor crime, especially that committed by young people. <i>Social causes of crime and <b>delinquency</b>.</i>
<b>demonic</b>	Relating to or characteristic of demons or evil spirits. <i>Something <b>demonic</b> in him something that could be cruel.</i>
<b>deviltry</b>	Wicked and cruel behavior.
<b>diabolic</b>	Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i>The <b>diabolical</b> expression on his face.</i>
<b>error</b>	Inadvertent incorrectness. <i>The book was full of <b>errors</b>.</i>
<b>hellish</b>	Extremely (used for emphasis). <i>It was <b>hellish</b> expensive.</i>
<b>immoral</b>	Deliberately violating accepted principles of right and wrong. <i>Unseemly and <b>immoral</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>impious</b>	Showing a lack of respect for God or religion. <i>The emperor's <b>impious</b> attacks on the Church.</i>
<b>improper</b>	Not suitable or right or appropriate. <i>An <b>improper</b> suggestion.</i>
<b>inaccurate</b>	Not accurate. <i>An <b>inaccurate</b> translation.</i>
<b>iniquity</b>	An unjust act. <i>A den of <b>iniquity</b>.</i>
<b>injustice</b>	An unjust act. <i>She was taken aback by the <b>injustice</b> of Nora's remark.</i>
<b>malevolence</b>	The quality of threatening evil. <i>His eyes were glowing with <b>malevolence</b>.</i>
<b>malevolent</b>	Having or showing a wish to do evil to others. <i>Failure made him <b>malevolent</b> toward those who were successful.</i>

<b>malice</b>	The desire to harm someone; ill will. <i>I bear no <b>malice</b> towards anybody.</i>
<b>maliciousness</b>	Feeling a need to see others suffer.
<b><u>mischief</u></b>	A wrong or hardship that a statute is designed to remove or for which the common law affords a remedy. <i>Her eyes twinkled with irrepressible <b>mischief</b>.</i>
<b>misinterpret</b>	Interpret falsely. <i>I think you re <b>misinterpreting</b> the situation.</i>
<b>nefarious</b>	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i>The <b>nefarious</b> activities of the organized crime syndicates.</i>
<b><u>spite</u></b>	Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty. <i>It seemed as if the wind had a <b>spite</b> at her.</i>
<b>treacherous</b>	Tending to betray especially having a treacherous character as attributed to the Carthaginians by the Romans. <i>A <b>treacherous</b> Gestapo agent.</i>
<b>ugliness</b>	The quality of being unpleasant or repulsive in appearance. <i>The sheer <b>ugliness</b> of this architectural monstrosity.</i>
<b>unethical</b>	Not conforming to approved standards of social or professional behavior. <i>It is <b>unethical</b> to torment any creature for entertainment.</i>
<b><u>unjust</u></b>	Not equitable or fair. <i><b>Unjust</b> punishment.</i>
<b>wickedness</b>	Estrangement from god. <i>The <b>wickedness</b> of the regime.</i>
<b>wrong</b>	Treat unjustly do wrong to. <i>They were <b>wrong</b> to take the law into their own hands.</i>
