### Definitions of "Viciously" as an adverb

### Synonyms of "Viciously" as an adverb (2 Words)

**brutally** In a savagely violent way.  
*She was unapologetic and **brutally** honest.*

**savagely** In a fierce, violent, and uncontrolled manner.  
*Corporations have **savagely** cut costs to boost profits.*

### Usage Examples of "Viciously" as an adverb

- *He was viciously attacked.*
- *The boy swore viciously.*
- *The animals tore viciously into their flesh.*
- *A teenager was viciously attacked by a group of youths.*

<b>barbarous</b>	Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>A <b>barbarous</b> crime.</i>
<b>beastly</b>	In a beastly manner. <i>This <b>beastly</b> war.</i>
<b>blasphemous</b>	Characterized by profanity or cursing. <i>Foul mouthed and <b>blasphemous</b>.</i>
<b>brawl</b>	An uproarious party. <i>A street <b>brawl</b>.</i>
<b>caitiff</b>	A contemptible or cowardly person. <i>A <b>caitiff</b> knight.</i>
<b>cranky</b>	Bad-tempered; irritable. <i>A <b>cranky</b> scheme to pipe ground level ozone into the stratosphere.</i>
<b>cruel</b>	Wilfully causing pain or suffering to others, or feeling no concern about it. <i>People who are <b>cruel</b> to animals.</i>
<b>debauch</b>	A wild gathering involving excessive drinking and promiscuity. <i>He has <b>debauched</b> the morals of the people and endeavoured to corrupt parliament.</i>
<b>demonic</b>	Extremely evil or cruel; expressive of cruelty or befitting hell. <i>A <b>demonic</b> hurry.</i>
<b>despicable</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>Would do something as <b>despicable</b> as murder.</i>
<b>diabolic</b>	Showing the cunning or ingenuity or wickedness typical of a devil. <i>The cold calculation and <b>diabolic</b> art of some statesmen.</i>
<b>fell</b>	The act of felling something as a tree.
<b>ferocious</b>	Very great; extreme. <i>A <b>ferocious</b> battle.</i>
<b>ferocity</b>	The state or quality of being ferocious. <i>The <b>ferocity</b> of the storm caught them by surprise.</i>
<b>fiendish</b>	Extremely cruel or unpleasant. <i>A <b>fiendish</b> despot.</i>
<b>fierce</b>	Fashionable or attractive in a bold or striking way. <i>His <b>fierce</b> loyalty.</i>
<b>heinous</b>	Extremely wicked, deeply criminal. <i><b>Heinous</b> accusations.</i>

<b>hellish</b>	Extremely difficult or unpleasant. <i><b>Hellish</b> weather.</i>
<b>impious</b>	Lacking piety or reverence for a god. <i>The emperor s <b>impious</b> attacks on the Church.</i>
<b>inhumane</b>	Without compassion for misery or suffering; cruel. <i>Biological weapons are considered too <b>inhumane</b> to be used.</i>
<b>iniquitous</b>	Grossly unfair and morally wrong. <i>These awards remain an <b>iniquitous</b> system.</i>
<b>irreverent</b>	Showing a lack of respect for people or things that are generally taken seriously. <i>A certain <b>irreverent</b> gaiety and ease of manner.</i>
<b>nefarious</b>	(typically of an action or activity) wicked or criminal. <i><b>Nefarious</b> schemes.</i>
<b>odious</b>	Extremely unpleasant; repulsive. <i>Consequences <b>odious</b> to those you govern.</i>
<b>profane</b>	Treat (something sacred) with irreverence or disrespect. <i>It was a serious matter to <b>profane</b> a tomb.</i>
<b>sinister</b>	Of, on, or towards the left-hand side (in a coat of arms, from the bearer's point of view, i.e. the right as it is depicted). <i>The scheme of some <b>sinister</b> intelligence bent on punishing him.</i>
<b>truculence</b>	Obstreperous and defiant aggressiveness.
<b>ungodly</b>	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i><b>Ungodly</b> lives of lust and pleasure.</i>
<b>villainous</b>	Extremely bad or unpleasant. <i>A <b>villainous</b> smell.</i>
<b>wicked</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>Sophie makes <b>wicked</b> cakes.</i>
