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| achievement | The process or fact of achieving something. <i>Assessing ability in terms of academic achievement.</i> |
| conquest | The subjugation and assumption of control of a place or people by military force. <i>The conquest of inflation.</i> |
| <u>coup</u> | An unusual or unexpected but successful tactic in card play. <i>He was overthrown in an army coup.</i> |
| game, set, and match | Frivolous or trifling behavior. |
| landslide | A collapse of a mass of earth or rock from a mountain or cliff. <i>The road was blocked by a landslide.</i> |
| positive result | A film showing a photographic image whose tones correspond to those of the original subject. |
| success | A person with a record of successes. <i>There is a thin line between success and failure.</i> |

triumph

A highly successful example of something.
*The marriage had been a **triumph** of togetherness.*

win

A victory (as in a race or other competition).
*He was happy to get the **win**.*

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| <u>accomplish</u> | Achieve or complete successfully. <i>Once this form has been accomplished the applicant needs to secure supporting documents.</i> |
| accomplished | Settled securely and unconditionally. <i>A very elegant and accomplished person.</i> |
| accomplishment | An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable accomplishment.</i> |
| achieve | To gain with effort. <i>The killings achieved nothing.</i> |
| achievement | A representation of a coat of arms with all the adjuncts to which a bearer of arms is entitled. <i>Assessing ability in terms of academic achievement.</i> |

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| achiever | A person with a record of successes. <i>A high achiever.</i> |
| acquire | Win something through one's efforts. <i>I acquired a strong aversion to television.</i> |
| acquirement | Something acquired, typically a skill. <i>The acquirement of self control.</i> |
| acquisition | Something acquired. <i>The acquisition of one company by another.</i> |
| <u>attain</u> | Reach a destination, either real or abstract. <i>He attained the rank of Brigadier.</i> |
| <u>attainment</u> | The act of achieving an aim. <i>The attainment of corporate aims.</i> |
| blowout | An act or instance of blow-drying hair. <i>You can't do a blowout with super wet hair.</i> |
| clinch | Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. <i>The nails were clinched.</i> |
| competition | A business relation in which two parties compete to gain customers. <i>Business competition can be fiendish at times.</i> |
| <u>constellation</u> | An arrangement of parts or elements. <i>No two patients ever show exactly the same constellation of symptoms.</i> |
| exultation | A feeling of triumphant elation or jubilation; rejoicing. <i>She laughs in exultation.</i> |
| <u>feat</u> | An achievement that requires great courage, skill, or strength. <i>The new printing presses were considerable feats of engineering.</i> |
| gain | Reach a destination, either real or abstract. <i>We gained the ridge.</i> |
| jubilant | Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch.</i> |
| jubilation | The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of jubilation.</i> |
| major | A major key interval or scale. <i>Many students would ignore courses outside their major.</i> |
| reach | Reach a goal. <i>Television reached those parts of the electorate that other news sources could not.</i> |
| rejoicing | The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <i>Rejoicing crowds filled the streets on VJ Day.</i> |

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| succeed | Come after and take the place of. <i>He succeeded in winning a pardon.</i> |
| success | A person with a record of successes. <i>His new play was a great success.</i> |
| <u>triumph</u> | A great victory or achievement. <i>Here it is Helen's voice rose in triumph.</i> |
| <u>triumphant</u> | Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>A triumphant shout.</i> |
| victor | A combatant who is able to defeat rivals. <i>Congratulations to the victors.</i> |
| win | Be the winner in a contest or competition be victorious. <i>Win points.</i> |
| <u>winner</u> | A goal or shot that wins a match or point. <i>Anyone taking out a fixed rate mortgage could be on to a winner.</i> |
