
### Victory as a Noun

achievement	The process or fact of achieving something. Assessing ability in terms of academic <b>achievement</b> .
conquest	The subjugation and assumption of control of a place or people by military force. <i>The conquest of inflation.</i>
<u>coup</u>	An unusual or unexpected but successful tactic in card play. <i>He was overthrown in an army <b>coup</b>.</i>
game, set, and match	Frivolous or trifling behavior.
landslide	A collapse of a mass of earth or rock from a mountain or cliff. <i>The road was blocked by a <b>landslide</b></i> .
positive result	A film showing a photographic image whose tones correspond to those of the original subject.
success	A person with a record of successes. There is a thin line between <b>success</b> and failure.



#### <u>triumph</u>

A highly successful example of something. The marriage had been a **triumph** of togetherness. A victory (as in a race or other competition.

- An election victory.
- A victory celebration.

accomplish	Achieve or complete successfully. Once this form has been <b>accomplish</b> ed the applicant needs to secure supporting documents.
accomplished	Settled securely and unconditionally. A very elegant and <b>accomplished</b> person.
accomplishment	An ability that has been acquired by training. The reduction of inflation was a remarkable <b>accomplishment</b> .
achieve	To gain with effort. The killings <b>achieve</b> d nothing.
achievement	A representation of a coat of arms with all the adjuncts to which a bearer of arms is entitled. Assessing ability in terms of academic <b>achievement</b> .



achiever	A person with a record of successes. A high <b>achiever</b> .
acquire	Win something through one's efforts. I <b>acquire</b> d a strong aversion to television.
acquirement	Something acquired, typically a skill. <i>The <b>acquirement</b> of self control.</i>
acquisition	Something acquired. The <b>acquisition</b> of one company by another.
<u>attain</u>	Reach a destination, either real or abstract. <i>He <b>attain</b>ed the rank of Brigadier.</i>
<u>attainment</u>	The act of achieving an aim. The <b>attainment</b> of corporate aims.
blowout	An act or instance of blow-drying hair. You can t do a <b>blowout</b> with super wet hair.
clinch	Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. The nails were <b>clinch</b> ed.
competition	A business relation in which two parties compete to gain customers. Business <b>competition</b> can be fiendish at times.
<u>constellation</u>	An arrangement of parts or elements. No two patients ever show exactly the same <b>constellation</b> of symptoms.
exultation	A feeling of triumphant elation or jubilation; rejoicing. <i>She laughs in <b>exultation</b>.</i>
<u>feat</u>	An achievement that requires great courage, skill, or strength. The new printing presses were considerable <b>feat</b> s of engineering.
gain	Reach a destination, either real or abstract. We <b>gain</b> ed the ridge.
jubilant	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.
jubilation	The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. Unbelievable scenes of <b>jubilation</b> .
major	A major key interval or scale. Many students would ignore courses outside their <b>major</b> .
reach	Reach a goal. Television <b>reach</b> ed those parts of the electorate that other news sources could not.
rejoicing	The utterance of sounds expressing great joy. <b>Rejoicing</b> crowds filled the streets on VJ Day.



succeed	Come after and take the place of. <i>He <b>succeed</b>ed in winning a pardon.</i>
success	A person with a record of successes. <i>His new play was a great <b>success</b>.</i>
<u>triumph</u>	A great victory or achievement. Here it is Helen s voice rose in <b>triumph</b> .
<u>triumphant</u>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. A <b>triumphant</b> shout.
victor	A combatant who is able to defeat rivals. <i>Congratulations to the victors.</i>
win	Be the winner in a contest or competition be victorious. <i>Win points.</i>
winner	A goal or shot that wins a match or point. Anyone taking out a fixed rate mortgage could be on to a <b>winner</b> .
