- *A small ornamental design filling a space in a book or carving, typically based on foliage.*
- *A brief literary description.*

account	A client having an account with a supplier. <i>A detailed account of what has been achieved.</i>
<u>chronicle</u>	A factual written account of important or historical events in the order of their occurrence. <i>A chronicle of his life during the war years.</i>
cut	The way or style in which something especially a garment or someone's hair is cut. <i>The cut from the accident scene to the hospital seemed too abrupt.</i>
<u>depiction</u>	The action of depicting something, especially in a work of art. <i>Michelangelo's depictions of the male nude.</i>
description	The action of giving a spoken or written account. <i>It is laughably easy to buy drugs of all descriptions.</i>
design	A decorative pattern. <i>The design of a building.</i>

engraving	A print made from an engraving. <i>The quality of his engraving established new standards.</i>
etching	A print produced by the process of etching. <i>The artist dispensed with the medium of etching.</i>
<u>impression</u>	An impressionistic portrayal of a person. <i>The events left a permanent impression in his mind.</i>
linocut	A print made from a linocut block.
lithograph	A print produced by lithography.
monoprint	A single print taken from a design created in oil paint or printing ink on glass or metal. <i>She won an award of merit for her monoprint of a father and child.</i>
<u>photo</u>	A photograph.
photograph	A picture made using a camera, in which an image is focused on to light-sensitive material and then made visible and permanent by chemical treatment, or stored digitally. <i>A photograph of her father.</i>
picture	A visual representation (of an object or scene or person or abstraction) produced on a surface. <i>Draw a picture of a tree.</i>
<u>plate</u>	The quantity contained in a plate. <i>He pushed his empty plate to one side and sipped his wine.</i>
portrayal	Acting the part of a character on stage; dramatically representing the character by speech and action and gesture. <i>His portrayal of the title character.</i>
representation	(in some theories of perception) a mental state or concept regarded as corresponding to a thing perceived. <i>The sales contract contains several representations by the vendor.</i>
shot	A ball of stone or metal used as a missile shot from a large gun or cannon. <i>He poured a shot of whiskey.</i>
silk screen	A fabric made from the fine threads produced by certain insect larvae.
<u>sketch</u>	A short humorous play or performance, consisting typically of one scene in a revue or comedy programme. <i>A hilarious sketch for their latest BBC series.</i>
snap	The act of snapping the fingers movement of a finger from the tip to the base of the thumb on the same hand. <i>He can hear the snap of a twig.</i>

<u>snapshot</u>	A shot in soccer or hockey taken quickly with little backlift. <i>My snapshots haven't been developed yet.</i>
still	An apparatus used for the distillation of liquids consists of a vessel in which a substance is vaporized by heat and a condenser where the vapor is condensed. <i>He wanted some stills for a magazine ad.</i>
story	A plot or storyline. <i>The story of modern farming.</i>
studio portrait	An apartment with a living space and a bathroom and a small kitchen.
study	A room used for reading and writing and studying. <i>I'm a quick study.</i>
woodcut	A print made from a woodcut.

amusing	Causing laughter and providing entertainment. <i>An amusing film with a steady stream of pranks and pratfalls.</i>
<u>cartoon</u>	A film made by photographing a series of cartoon drawings to give the illusion of movement when projected in rapid sequence. <i>The tapestries are based on a set of cartoons commissioned by Pope Leo XI.</i>
<u>delineate</u>	Show the form or outline of. <i>His finger found a precisely outlined section delineated in red marker.</i>
doodle	Make a doodle draw aimlessly. <i>The text was interspersed with doodles.</i>
draft	Select a player for a sports team through the draft. <i>The draft and I were sent to the barracks near Folkestone.</i>
droll	A jester or entertainer; a buffoon. <i>His unique brand of droll self mockery.</i>

engraved	Cut or impressed into a surface. <i>Engraved invitations.</i>
exhilaration	A feeling of excitement, happiness, or elation. <i>They felt the exhilaration of victory.</i>
facetious	Cleverly amusing in tone. <i>A facetious remark.</i>
farcical	Relating to or resembling farce, especially because of absurd or ridiculous aspects. <i>He considered the whole idea farcical.</i>
funny	An account of an amusing incident (usually with a punch line). <i>I do get some funny looks.</i>
hilarious	Boisterously merry. <i>Hilarious broad comedy.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>The humors are blood and phlegm and yellow and black bile.</i>
humorous	Full of or characterized by humor. <i>A humorous and entertaining talk.</i>
jesting	Said or done for amusement; joking. <i>A jesting commentary on world affairs.</i>
jocose	Playful or humorous. <i>A jocose allusion.</i>
jocular	With humor. <i>They tried to deal with this painful subject jocularly.</i>
laughable	Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>If it didn't make me so angry it would be laughable.</i>
outline	Draw up an outline or sketch for something. <i>Sketch the outline of the book.</i>
precis	Make a precis of a text or speech.
profile	Represent in profile by drawing or painting. <i>He was standing motionless profiled on the far side of the swimming pool.</i>
repartee	Adroitness and cleverness in reply. <i>Quick fire repartee.</i>
resume	Assume anew. <i>Resume an office.</i>
scribble	A piece of writing or a picture produced carelessly or hurriedly. <i>They scribbled potted and painted.</i>

sketch

Make a sketch of.

*As they talked Modigliani began to **sketch** her.*

skit

A short informal performance intended to educate or inform.

*A **skit** on daytime magazine programmes.*

slapstick

Comedy based on deliberately clumsy actions and humorously embarrassing events.

***Slapstick** style of humor.*

synopsis

A brief summary or general survey of something.

*A **synopsis** of the insurance cover provided is set out below.*

waggish

Humorous in a playful, mischievous, or facetious manner.

*Muskrat Castle as the house has been facetiously named by some **waggish** officer.*

witty

Combining clever conception and facetious expression.

*A **witty** remark.*
