### Definitions of "Village" as a noun

- *A mainly residential district of Manhattan; ‘the Village’ became a home for many writers and artists in the 20th century.*
- *A settlement smaller than a town.*
- *A group of houses and associated buildings, larger than a hamlet and smaller than a town, situated in a rural area.*
- *A small municipality with limited corporate powers.*

### district

An area of a country or city, especially one characterized by a particular feature or activity.  
*A **district** health authority.*

### **encampment**

The act of encamping and living in tents in a camp.  
*A Bedouin **encampment**.*

<b>hamlet</b>	The hero of William Shakespeare's tragedy who hoped to avenge the murder of his father.
<b>neighbourhood</b>	A district or community within a town or city. <i>She lived in a wealthy <b>neighbourhood</b> of Boston.</i>
<b>outpost</b>	A remote part of a country or empire. <i>A few scattered <b>outposts</b> along the west coast.</i>
<b>parish</b>	The local subdivision of a diocese committed to one pastor. <i>A <b>parish</b> church.</i>
<b><u>provincial</u></b>	An inhabitant of a province of a country or empire. <i>A town populated by money grubbers philistines and self satisfied <b>provincials</b>.</i>
<b>regional</b>	A sporting contest involving competitors from a particular region. <i>The opening game of the Little League Senior Division Softball Eastern <b>Regionals</b>.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The action of allowing or helping people to establish settlements. <i>One of the oldest Viking <b>settlements</b> in western Europe.</i>
<b>small town</b>	The slender part of the back.
<b><u>town</u></b>	The permanent residents of a university town. <i>Britain s major <b>towns</b> and cities.</i>

<b><u>emigrant</u></b>	A person who leaves their own country in order to settle permanently in another. <i><b>Emigrant</b> workers.</i>
<b>farmstead</b>	A farm together with its buildings.
<b><u>ghetto</u></b>	The Jewish quarter in a city. <i>The Warsaw <b>ghetto</b>.</i>
<b>hamlet</b>	A settlement smaller than a town.
<b>hovel</b>	A conical building enclosing a kiln. <i>People were living in rat infested <b>hovels</b>.</i>
<b>idyll</b>	An episode of such pastoral or romantic charm as to qualify as the subject of a poetic idyll. <i>The rural <b>idyll</b> remains strongly evocative in most industrialized societies.</i>
<b><u>idyllic</u></b>	Suggestive of an idyll; charmingly simple and serene. <i>His <b>idyllic</b> life in Tahiti.</i>
<b><u>local</u></b>	Of or belonging to or characteristic of a particular locality or neighborhood. <i>The <b>local</b> post office.</i>
<b>localization</b>	The fact of being or becoming located or fixed in a particular place. <i>The tug of war between the forces of globalization and <b>localization</b>.</i>
<b>municipal</b>	Of or relating to the government of a municipality. <i>International law only authorizes a belligerent to punish a spy under its <b>municipal</b> law.</i>
<b>municipality</b>	The governing body of a municipality. <i>Voters in each <b>municipality</b> choose between four candidates.</i>
<b>outskirts</b>	The outer parts of a town or city. <i>He built a new factory on the <b>outskirts</b> of Birmingham.</i>
<b>parish</b>	(in the Christian Church) a small administrative district typically having its own church and a priest or pastor. <i>A <b>parish</b> church.</i>
<b>pastoral</b>	(of land) used for the keeping or grazing of sheep or cattle. <i>A <b>pastoral</b> economy.</i>
<b>prefecture</b>	The office of prefect. <i>Enraged fans besieged the <b>Prefecture</b> of Police.</i>
<b><u>provincial</u></b>	An official in charge of an ecclesiastical province acting under the superior general of a religious order. <i><b>Provincial</b> towns.</i>
<b><u>rural</u></b>	Living in or characteristic of farming or country life. <i>Unpaved <b>rural</b> roads.</i>



<b>rustic</b>	Characteristic of the fields or country. <i><b>Rustic</b> capitals were much easier to form.</i>
<b>slum</b>	A district of a city marked by poverty and inferior living conditions. <i>Businessmen are having to <b>slum</b> it in aircraft economy class seats.</i>
<b>suburban</b>	Contemptibly dull and ordinary. <i><b>Suburban</b> life.</i>
<b>town</b>	The particular town under consideration especially one's own town. <i>The whole <b>town</b> cheered the team.</i>
<b>urban</b>	In, relating to, or characteristic of a town or city. <i>Hip hop's traditionally <b>urban</b> vibe.</i>
<b>villager</b>	One who has lived in a village most of their life. <i>Jose married a fellow <b>villager</b>.</i>
<b>yokel</b>	An uneducated and unsophisticated person from the countryside.
