acrimonious	(typically of speech or discussion) angry and bitter. An <b>acrimonious</b> dispute about wages.
<u>bitter</u>	Causing a sharp and acrid taste experience. <i>Bitter</i> about the divorce.
despiteful	Malicious. A <b>despiteful</b> fiend.
implacable	Unable to be appeased or placated. An <b>implacable</b> enemy.
out for revenge	Directed outward or serving to direct something outward.
<u>resentful</u>	Full of or marked by resentment or indignant ill will. A sullen <b>resentful</b> attitude.
revengeful	Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge. The average Briton is not naturally vindictive and <b>revengeful</b>
spiteful	Showing or caused by malice. The teachers made <b>spiteful</b> little jokes about me.
<u>unforgiving</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>He was always a proud and <b>unforgiving</b> man.</i>
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not giving way to kindness or compassion. <i>The heat was <b>unrelenting</b></i> .

adversary	One's opponent in a contest, conflict, or dispute. <i>The confrontations of <b>adversary</b> politics.</i>
<u>aggressor</u>	A person or country that attacks another first.
<u>avenge</u>	Take revenge for a perceived wrong. <i>He vowed in silent fervour to <b>avenge</b> their murders.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. The <b>enemy</b> attacked at dawn.
factious	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion. A <i>factious</i> country.
foe	An armed adversary (especially a member of an opposing military force. <i>His work was praised by friends and <b>foe</b>s alike.</i>
futilely	In a futile and unproductive manner.
<u>gloat</u>	An act of gloating. I would join her for a good <b>gloat</b> .
<u>harassment</u>	Aggressive pressure or intimidation. They face daily <b>harassment</b> and assault on the streets.
killing	Exhausting or unbearable. The community was shocked by the brutal <b>killing</b> s.
objector	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <b>Objector</b> s claim the motorway will damage the environment.
opponent	A person who disagrees with or resists a proposal or practice. The news will delight <b>opponent</b> s of GM foods.
opposed	Being in opposition or having an opponent. Parties <b>opposed</b> to the ruling party.
rancor	A feeling of deep and bitter anger and ill-will.



reprisal	A retaliatory action against an enemy in wartime. Three youths died in the <b>reprisal</b> s which followed.
requital	A justly deserved penalty.
retaliate	Make an attack in return for a similar attack. The blow stung and she <b>retaliate</b> d immediately.
<u>retaliation</u>	Action taken in return for an injury or offense. The bombings are believed to be in <b>retaliation</b> for the trial of 15 suspects.
retribution	A justly deserved penalty. <i>Divine <b>retribution</b></i> .
revenge	Take revenge for a perceived wrong. Other spurned wives have taken public <b>revenge</b> on their husbands.
revengeful	Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge- Shakespeare- M.R.Cohen. <i>The average Briton is not naturally vindictive and revengeful.</i>
<u>spite</u>	Malevolence by virtue of being malicious or spiteful or nasty. It seemed as if the wind had a <b>spite</b> at her.
spurn	An act of spurning. It is a <b>spurn</b> of God s sovereignty and a slight of his goodness.
stern	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. The <b>stern</b> demands of parenthood.
swear	An offensive word used especially to express anger a swear word. Griffin made contact with the coach which led to him yelling a <b>swear</b> back in his direction.
<u>unforgiving</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. A surly <b>unforgiving</b> old woman.
vendetta	A feud in which members of the opposing parties murder each other. <i>He has accused the British media of pursuing a <b>vendetta</b> against him.</i>
<u>vengeance</u>	Punishment inflicted or retribution exacted for an injury or wrong. Voters are ready to wreak <b>vengeance</b> on all politicians.
<u>vengeful</u>	Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge- Shakespeare- M.R.Cohen. <i>A vengeful ex con.</i>
wreak	Inflict (vengeance. Torrential rainstorms <b>wreak</b> ed havoc yesterday.
