<a href="#">alacrity</a>	Liveliness and eagerness. <i>He accepted with <b>alacrity</b>.</i>
<b>ardor</b>	Intense feeling of love. <i>They were imbued with a revolutionary <b>ardor</b>.</i>
<b>eager</b>	Strongly wanting to do or have something. <i>Small <b>eager</b> faces looked up and listened.</i>
<b>eagerness</b>	Enthusiasm to do or to have something; keenness. <i>The player showed <b>eagerness</b> to play.</i>
<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>The three <b>enthusiasms</b> of his life were politics religion and books.</i>
<b>enthusiastic</b>	Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i><b>Enthusiastic</b> crowds filled the streets.</i>
<b>fervid</b>	Intensely enthusiastic or passionate, especially to an excessive degree. <i>His <b>fervid</b> protestations of love.</i>
<a href="#">fervor</a>	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up.
<b>fever</b>	A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection. <i>She had a slight <b>fever</b>.</i>
<b>flog</b>	Beat severely with a whip or rod. <i>The issue has been <b>flogged</b> to death already.</i>
<a href="#">gusto</a>	A relish or liking. <i>He had a particular <b>gusto</b> for those sort of performances.</i>
<a href="#">harass</a>	Make repeated small-scale attacks on (an enemy). <i>The squadron s task was to <b>harass</b> the retreating enemy forces.</i>
<a href="#">heated</a>	Made warm or hot het is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>A <b>heated</b> argument.</i>
<b>importunate</b>	Persistent, especially to the point of annoyance. <i><b>Importunate</b> creditors.</i>

<b>importune</b>	Approach (someone) to request or offer sexual services, especially as a prostitute. <i>The president would <b>importune</b> them to try harder.</i>
<b>insist</b>	Be emphatic or resolute and refuse to budge. <i>He <b>insisted</b> on answers to his allegations.</i>
<b>instinctively</b>	As a matter of instinct. <i>Some people know <b>instinctively</b> what suits them.</i>
<b>intensely</b>	With extreme effort or attention. <i>She loved him <b>intensely</b>.</i>
<b>irrepressible</b>	Impossible to repress or control. <i>An <b>irrepressible</b> rogue.</i>
<b>lash</b>	An eyelash. <i>He <b>lashed</b> the flag to the mast.</i>
<b>passion</b>	The suffering of Jesus at the Crucifixion. <i>She nurses a <b>passion</b> for Thomas.</i>
<b>persistently</b>	In a persistent manner. <i>Prices have remained <b>persistently</b> high.</i>
<b>strap</b>	Sharpen with a strap. <i>I expected when my dad walked in that he'd <b>strap</b> him.</i>
<b>torrid</b>	Very hot and dry. <i>The world's most <b>torrid</b> economies.</i>
<b>vigorously</b>	With vigor; in a vigorous manner. <i>He defended his ideas <b>vigorously</b>.</i>
<b>whip</b>	Beat severely with a whip or rod. <i>She began <b>whipping</b> narrow lace along the top of the garment.</i>
<b>zeal</b>	Prompt willingness. <i>His <b>zeal</b> for privatization.</i>
<b>zealot</b>	A person who is fanatical and uncompromising in pursuit of their religious, political, or other ideals.
<b>zealotry</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious <b>zealotry</b> playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
<b>zest</b>	Vigorous and enthusiastic enjoyment. <i>She had a great <b>zest</b> for life.</i>
