alacrity	Liveliness and eagerness. <i>He accepted with alacrity.</i>
ardor	Intense feeling of love. <i>They were imbued with a revolutionary ardor.</i>
eager	Strongly wanting to do or have something. <i>Small eager faces looked up and listened.</i>
eagerness	Enthusiasm to do or to have something; keenness. <i>The player showed eagerness to play.</i>
enthusiasm	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>The three enthusiasms of his life were politics religion and books.</i>
enthusiastic	Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i>Enthusiastic crowds filled the streets.</i>
fervid	Intensely enthusiastic or passionate, especially to an excessive degree. <i>His fervid protestations of love.</i>
fervor	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up.
fever	A rise in the temperature of the body; frequently a symptom of infection. <i>She had a slight fever.</i>
flog	Beat severely with a whip or rod. <i>The issue has been flogged to death already.</i>
gusto	A relish or liking. <i>He had a particular gusto for those sort of performances.</i>
harass	Make repeated small-scale attacks on (an enemy). <i>The squadron s task was to harass the retreating enemy forces.</i>
heated	Made warm or hot het is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>A heated argument.</i>
importunate	Persistent, especially to the point of annoyance. <i>Importunate creditors.</i>

importune	Approach (someone) to request or offer sexual services, especially as a prostitute. <i>The president would importune them to try harder.</i>
insist	Be emphatic or resolute and refuse to budge. <i>He insisted on answers to his allegations.</i>
instinctively	As a matter of instinct. <i>Some people know instinctively what suits them.</i>
intensely	With extreme effort or attention. <i>She loved him intensely.</i>
irrepressible	Impossible to repress or control. <i>An irrepressible rogue.</i>
lash	An eyelash. <i>He lashed the flag to the mast.</i>
passion	The suffering of Jesus at the Crucifixion. <i>She nurses a passion for Thomas.</i>
persistently	In a persistent manner. <i>Prices have remained persistently high.</i>
strap	Sharpen with a strap. <i>I expected when my dad walked in that he'd strap him.</i>
torrid	Very hot and dry. <i>The world's most torrid economies.</i>
vigorously	With vigor; in a vigorous manner. <i>He defended his ideas vigorously.</i>
whip	Beat severely with a whip or rod. <i>She began whipping narrow lace along the top of the garment.</i>
zeal	Prompt willingness. <i>His zeal for privatization.</i>
zealot	A person who is fanatical and uncompromising in pursuit of their religious, political, or other ideals.
zealotry	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious zealotry playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
zest	Vigorous and enthusiastic enjoyment. <i>She had a great zest for life.</i>
