| applaud | Clap one's hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. <i>His speech was loudly applauded.</i> |
| chivalry | The medieval principles governing knighthood and knightly conduct. <i>Tales of chivalry and knightly deeds.</i> |
| compliment | Formal greetings, especially when sent as a message. <i>Carry my compliments to your kinsmen.</i> |
| encomium | A formal expression of praise. |
| eulogistic | Formally expressing praise. |
| eulogize | Praise highly in speech or writing. <i>He was eulogized as a rock star.</i> |
| eulogy | A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A eulogy to the Queen Mother.</i> |
| euphonious | Having a pleasant sound. <i>A stream of fine euphonious phrases.</i> |
| exemplar | Something to be imitated. <i>The place is an exemplar of multicultural Britain.</i> |
| extol | Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>He extolled the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i> |
| glorify | Praise glorify or honor. <i>You are glorifying a rather mediocre building.</i> |
| humble | Used of unskilled work (especially domestic work). <i>Essentially humble and self effacing he achieved the highest formal honors and distinctions.</i> |
| humbleness | A humble feeling. |
| humility | A humble feeling. <i>He was filled with humility at the sight of the Pope.</i> |

| laud | Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>All glory laud and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i> |
| lowliness | A position of inferior status; low in station or rank or fortune or estimation. |
| lowly | To a low degree; in a low manner. <i>A lowly parish priest.</i> |
| meekness | The fact or condition of being meek; submissiveness. <i>All his best friends make fun of him for his meekness.</i> |
| menial | A person with a menial job. <i>Menial factory jobs.</i> |
| moderate | A person who holds moderate views especially in politics. <i>Moderate prices.</i> |
| modest | Not offensive to sexual mores in conduct or appearance. <i>A modest flat in Fulham.</i> |
| modesty | Formality and propriety of manner. <i>Modesty forbade her to undress in front of so many people.</i> |
| monument | An enduring and memorable example of something. <i>A handsome monument of granite is placed over the grave.</i> |
| nice | Excessively fastidious and easily disgusted. <i>A nice point.</i> |
| oration | The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>There is nothing quite like his messianic oration.</i> |
| paeon | (ancient Greece) a hymn of praise (especially one sung in ancient Greece to invoke or thank a deity). <i>He s created a filmic paeon to his hero.</i> |
| panegyric | A formal expression of praise. <i>A panegyric on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i> |
| polite | Marked by refinement in taste and manners. <i>They thought she was wrong but were too polite to say so.</i> |
| tribute | An act, statement, or gift that is intended to show gratitude, respect, or admiration. <i>A tribute show.</i> |
| unbelievably | To a great degree; extremely. <i>Unbelievably all this is yours for 50p.</i> |
