### Definitions of "Visage" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “visage” as a noun can have the following definitions:

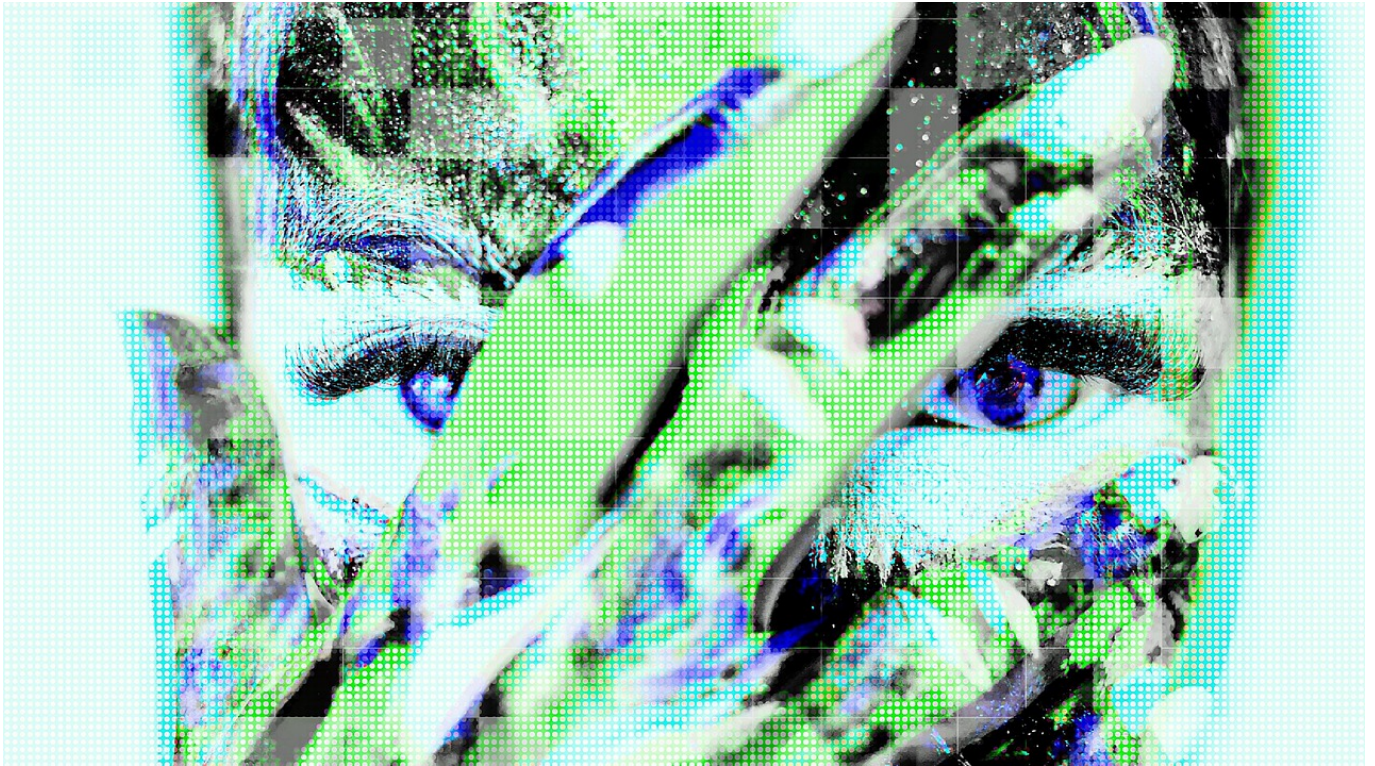
- *The appearance conveyed by a person's face.*
- *The manifestation, image, or aspect of something.*
- *A person's face, with reference to the form or proportions of the features.*
- *A person's facial expression.*
- *The human face (‘kisser’ and ‘smiler’ and ‘mug’ are informal terms for ‘face’ and ‘phiz’ is British).*



## Synonyms of "Visage" as a noun (8 Words)

- countenance** The human face (‘kisser’ and ‘smiler’ and ‘mug’ are informal terms for ‘face’ and ‘phiz’ is British).  
*His impenetrable eyes and inscrutable **countenance** give little away.*
- face** The feelings expressed on a person's face.  
*The **face** of the city is changing.*
- kisser** The human face kisser and smiler and mug are informal terms for face and phiz is British.  
*I belted him one right on the **kisser**.*
- mug** The contents of a mug.  
*They were no **mugs** where finance was concerned.*

- phiz** The human face kisser and smiler and mug are informal terms for face and phiz is British.  
*It was enough to paste his **phiz** on the cover of Time magazine.*
- physiognomy** The supposed art of judging character from facial characteristics.  
*A world where **physiognomy** was a respected practice.*
- profile** An outline of something, especially a person's face, as seen from one side.  
*Raising the **profile** of women in industry.*
- smiler** The human face kisser and smiler and mug are informal terms for face and phiz is British.



## Usage Examples of "Visage" as a noun

- *An elegant, angular visage.*
- *There was something hidden behind his visage of cheerfulness.*
- *The moonlit visage of the port's whitewashed buildings.*
- *A stern visage.*



## Associations of "Visage" (30 Words)

<b>anguished</b>	Experiencing intense pain especially mental pain. <i>He gave an <b>anguished</b> cry.</i>
<b>aquiline</b>	Like an eagle.
<b>camouflage</b>	Clothing or materials used as camouflage. <i>Much of my apparent indifference was merely protective <b>camouflage</b>.</i>
<b>cape</b>	In bullfighting taunt the bull by flourishing a cape. <i>The robe was decorated with gold lace on the fronts <b>cape</b> and hem.</i>
<b>cloak</b>	Cover with or as if with a cloak. <i>He threw his <b>cloak</b> about him.</i>
<b>conceal</b>	Hold back; keep from being perceived by others. <i>She <b>conceals</b> her anger well.</i>
<b>countenance</b>	The appearance conveyed by a person's face. <i>He was reluctant to <b>countenance</b> the use of force.</i>
<b>disguise</b>	Make unrecognizable. <i>I told them you were a policewoman in <b>disguise</b>.</i>
<b>drape</b>	A cloth for covering parts of a patient's body other than that part on which a surgical operation is being performed. <i>She <b>draped</b> a shawl around her shoulders.</i>
<b>drawn</b>	(of a person) looking strained from illness, exhaustion, anxiety, or pain. <i>Her face was <b>drawn</b> and haggard from sleeplessness.</i>
<b>evidence</b>	Provide evidence for stand as proof of show by one's behavior attitude or external attributes. <i>The <b>evidence</b> that smoking causes lung cancer is very compelling.</i>
<b>face</b>	Be positioned with the face or front towards someone or something. <i>The men had <b>faced</b> about to the front.</i>
<b>familiarize</b>	Make familiar or conversant with. <i>We <b>familiarized</b> ourselves with the new surroundings.</i>
<b>freckle</b>	Cover or become covered with freckles. <i>I <b>freckle</b> easily.</i>
<b>glove</b>	Of a wicketkeeper baseball catcher etc catch deflect or touch the ball with a gloved hand. <i>Vaughan <b>gloved</b> it and got to his knees to throw.</i>
<b>glower</b>	Look at with a fixed gaze. <i>She <b>glowered</b> at him suspiciously.</i>

<b>grimace</b>	Make a grimace. <i>He <b>grimaced</b> when he saw the amount of homework he had to do.</i>
<b>hide</b>	Cover as if with a shroud. <i>Companies with poor security can <b>hide</b> behind the law.</i>
<b>image</b>	(mathematics) the set of values of the dependent variable for which a function is defined. <i>He uses the <b>image</b> of a hole to describe emotional emptiness.</i>
<b>implicate</b>	A thing implied. <i>He is <b>implicated</b> in the scheme to defraud the government.</i>
<b>mask</b>	Put a mask on or cover with a mask. <i>The herb <b>masks</b> the garlic taste.</i>
<b>masquerade</b>	Take part in a masquerade. <i>Idle gossip that <b>masquerades</b> as news.</i>
<b>mimicry</b>	The act of mimicking; imitative behavior. <i>The word was spoken with gently teasing <b>mimicry</b>.</i>
<b>outward</b>	Outwards. <i>The <b>outward</b> voyage.</i>
<b>pallor</b>	An unhealthy pale appearance. <i>The deathlike <b>pallor</b> of his face.</i>
<b>physiognomy</b>	The general form or appearance of something. <i>A world where <b>physiognomy</b> was a respected practice.</i>
<b>pretext</b>	An artful or simulated semblance. <i>The rebels had the perfect <b>pretext</b> for making their move.</i>
<b>smiley</b>	Smiling; cheerful. <i>He drew a <b>smiley</b> face.</i>
<b>testimony</b>	A solemn statement made under oath. <i>The <b>testimony</b> of an eyewitness.</i>
<b>veil</b>	A membrane that is attached to the immature fruiting body of some toadstools and ruptures in the course of development either universal veil enclosing the whole fruiting body or partial veil joining the edges of the cap to the stalk. <i>The venture is shrouded in a <b>veil</b> of secrecy.</i>
