- *Relating to deep inward feelings rather than to the intellect.*

### Synonyms of "Visceral" as an adjective (16 Words)

<b>abdominal</b>	Of or relating to or near the abdomen. <b><i>Abdominal</i></b> pain.
<b>coeliac</b>	Relating to or affected by coeliac disease. A <b><i>coeliac</i></b> child.
<b>deep-rooted</b>	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.
<b>deep-seated</b>	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.
<b>duodenal</b>	In or relating to the duodenum.

<b>enteric</b>	Relating to or occurring in the intestines. <i>The complexity of the <b>enteric</b> nervous system.</i>
<b>gastric</b>	Of the stomach. <i><b>Gastric</b> acid secretion.</i>
<b>gastroenteric</b>	Relating to the stomach and intestines. <i><b>Gastroenteric</b> infections.</i>
<b>innate</b>	Inborn; natural. <i>Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.</i>
<b>instinctive</b>	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>An <b>instinctive</b> distaste for conflict.</i>
<b>instinctual</b>	Relating to or denoting an innate, typically fixed pattern of behaviour; based on instinct. <i>An <b>instinctual</b> survival response.</i>
<b>intuitive</b>	Spontaneously derived from or prompted by a natural tendency. <i>His <b>intuitive</b> understanding of the readers real needs.</i>
<b>inward</b>	Directed or moving inward or toward a center. <i>A concern with <b>inward</b> reflections.</i>
<b>nonrational</b>	Obtained through intuition rather than from reasoning or observation. <i>There is a great deal that is <b>nonrational</b> in modern culture.</i>
<b>splanchnic</b>	Relating to or affecting the viscera. <i>A <b>splanchnic</b> nerve.</i>
<b>ventral</b>	Nearest to or facing toward the axis of an organ or organism. <i><b>Ventral</b> or pelvic fins correspond to the hind limbs of a quadruped.</i>

<b>antenatal</b>	Before birth; during or relating to pregnancy. <i><b>Antenatal</b> care.</i>
<u><b>biologically</b></u>	In an inherited or innate way. <i>The world s most <b>biologically</b> diverse ecosystems.</i>

<b>born</b>	British nuclear physicist born in Germany honored for his contributions to quantum mechanics 1882 1970. <i>He s a <b>born</b> engineer.</i>
<b>clairvoyance</b>	The supposed faculty of perceiving things or events in the future or beyond normal sensory contact. <i>She stared at the card as if she could contact its writer by <b>clairvoyance</b>.</i>
<b>congenital</b>	(of a person) having a particular trait from birth or by firmly established habit. <i>A <b>congenital</b> malformation of the heart.</i>
<b>direct</b>	Flowing in one direction only. <i>Can you <b>direct</b> me to the railway station please.</i>
<b>genetically</b>	In a way that relates to origin or development. <i>Hair colour is <b>genetically</b> determined.</i>
<b>hunch</b>	Raise (one's shoulders) and bend the top of one's body forward. <i>I have a <b>hunch</b> that someone is telling lies.</i>
<b>immanent</b>	Existing or operating within; inherent. <i>The protection of liberties is <b>immanent</b> in constitutional arrangements.</i>
<b>inborn</b>	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. <i>An <b>inborn</b> defect in the formation of collagen.</i>
<b>inherence</b>	The state of inhering; the state of being a fixed characteristic. <i>The <b>inherence</b> of polysemy in human language.</i>
<b>inherent</b>	(of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses. <i>Shortcomings <b>inherent</b> in our approach.</i>
<b>innate</b>	Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. <i>Her <b>innate</b> capacity for organization.</i>
<b>insight</b>	A feeling of understanding. <i>The town offers some <b>insight</b> into Finnish rural life.</i>
<b>instinct</b>	(followed by `with') deeply filled or permeated. <i>These canvases are <b>instinct</b> with passion.</i>
<b>instinctive</b>	Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>An <b>instinctive</b> distaste for conflict.</i>
<b>intrinsic</b>	Situated within or belonging solely to the organ or body part on which it acts. <i>Form was treated as something <b>intrinsic</b> as the very essence of the thing.</i>

<b>intuition</b>	The ability to understand something instinctively, without the need for conscious reasoning. <i>We shall allow our <b>intuition</b> to guide us.</i>
<b>intuitive</b>	Using or based on what one feels to be true even without conscious reasoning; instinctive. <i>His <b>intuitive</b> understanding of the readers real needs.</i>
<b>maternal</b>	Related on the mother's side. <i>My <b>maternal</b> grandmother.</i>
<u><b>mutual</b></u>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i><b>Mutual</b> respect.</i>
<b>natal</b>	Relating to the place or time of one's birth. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his <b>natal</b> city.</i>
<b>paranormal</b>	Seemingly outside normal sensory channels. <i>A mystic who can prove he has <b>paranormal</b> powers.</i>
<b>parental</b>	A person's parents. <i><b>Parental</b> guidance.</i>
<b>paternal</b>	Relating to or characteristic of or befitting a parent. <i>A <b>paternal</b> aunt.</i>
<u><b>predisposition</b></u>	An inclination beforehand to interpret statements in a particular way. <i>Factors including genetic <b>predisposition</b>.</i>
<b>pregnancy</b>	The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus. <i>A straightforward <b>pregnancy</b>.</i>
<u><b>psychic</b></u>	The study of psychic phenomena. <i><b>Psychic</b> trauma.</i>
<b>sense</b>	Relating to or denoting a coding sequence of nucleotides complementary to an antisense sequence. <i>She had a fine <b>sense</b> of comic timing.</i>
<u><b>sensory</b></u>	Relating to sensation or the physical senses; transmitted or perceived by the senses. <i><b>Sensory</b> organs.</i>
