| inward | Directed or moving inward or toward a center. <i>A concern with inward reflections.</i> |
| nonrational | Obtained through intuition rather than from reasoning or observation. <i>There is a great deal that is nonrational in modern culture.</i> |
| splanchnic | Relating to or affecting the viscera. <i>A splanchnic nerve.</i> |
| ventral | Nearest to or facing toward the axis of an organ or organism. <i>Ventral or pelvic fins correspond to the hind limbs of a quadruped.</i> |

| inherence | The state of inhering; the state of being a fixed characteristic. <i>The inherence of polysemy in human language.</i> |
| inherent | (of an adjective) having the same meaning in both attributive and predicative uses. <i>Shortcomings inherent in our approach.</i> |
| innate | Present at birth but not necessarily hereditary; acquired during fetal development. <i>Her innate capacity for organization.</i> |
| insight | A feeling of understanding. <i>The town offers some insight into Finnish rural life.</i> |
| instinct | (followed by `with') deeply filled or permeated. <i>These canvases are instinct with passion.</i> |
| instinctive | Relating to or prompted by instinct; done without conscious thought. <i>An instinctive distaste for conflict.</i> |
| intrinsic | Situated within or belonging solely to the organ or body part on which it acts. <i>Form was treated as something intrinsic as the very essence of the thing.</i> |

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| intuition | The ability to understand something instinctively, without the need for conscious reasoning. <i>We shall allow our intuition to guide us.</i> |
| intuitive | Using or based on what one feels to be true even without conscious reasoning; instinctive. <i>His intuitive understanding of the readers real needs.</i> |
| maternal | Related on the mother's side. <i>My maternal grandmother.</i> |
| mutual | A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>Mutual respect.</i> |
| natal | Relating to the place or time of one's birth. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his natal city.</i> |
| paranormal | Seemingly outside normal sensory channels. <i>A mystic who can prove he has paranormal powers.</i> |
| parental | A person's parents. <i>Parental guidance.</i> |
| paternal | Relating to or characteristic of or befitting a parent. <i>A paternal aunt.</i> |
| predisposition | An inclination beforehand to interpret statements in a particular way. <i>Factors including genetic predisposition.</i> |
| pregnancy | The state of being pregnant; the period from conception to birth when a woman carries a developing fetus in her uterus. <i>A straightforward pregnancy.</i> |
| psychic | The study of psychic phenomena. <i>Psychic trauma.</i> |
| sense | Relating to or denoting a coding sequence of nucleotides complementary to an antisense sequence. <i>She had a fine sense of comic timing.</i> |
| sensory | Relating to sensation or the physical senses; transmitted or perceived by the senses. <i>Sensory organs.</i> |
