discerning	Having or revealing keen insight and good judgment. <i>A discerning reader.</i>
<u>enterprising</u>	Marked by imagination, initiative, and readiness to undertake new projects. <i>An enterprising foreign policy.</i>
gifted	Having exceptional talent or natural ability. <i>A gifted writer.</i>
<u>imaginative</u>	Having or showing creativity or inventiveness. <i>Making imaginative use of computer software.</i>
<u>impractical</u>	Not practical; not workable or not given to practical matters. <i>His impractical romanticism.</i>
ingenious	(of a machine or idea) cleverly and originally devised and well suited to its purpose. <i>He was ingenious enough to overcome the limited budget.</i>
innovative	Ahead of the times. <i>Innovative members of the artistic community.</i>
insightful	Exhibiting insight or clear and deep perception. <i>An insightful parent.</i>
inspired	(of air or another substance) that is breathed in. <i>She was an inspired gardener.</i>
intuitive	(chiefly of computer software) easy to use and understand. <i>His intuitive understanding of the readers real needs.</i>
<u>inventive</u>	(used of persons or artifacts) marked by independence and creativity in thought or action. <i>Had an inventive turn of mind.</i>
laputan	Relating to or characteristic of the imaginary country of Laputa or its people.
penetrating	Tending to penetrate; having the power of entering or piercing. <i>The problem of penetrating damp.</i>
perceptive	Having or showing sensitive insight. <i>An extraordinarily perceptive account of their relationship.</i>

<u>prescient</u>	Perceiving the significance of events before they occur-R.H.Rovere. <i>A prescient warning.</i>
<u>resourceful</u>	Having the ability to find quick and clever ways to overcome difficulties. <i>An able and resourceful politician.</i>
<u>sharp</u>	Of a key having a sharp or sharps in the signature. <i>F sharp.</i>
shrewd	Mischievous; malicious. <i>She was shrewd enough to guess the motive behind his gesture.</i>
<u>talented</u>	Having a natural aptitude or skill for something. <i>A talented young musician.</i>
<u>windy</u>	Using or containing too many words. <i>A very windy day.</i>
wise	Marked by the exercise of good judgment or common sense in practical matters. <i>A wise and perceptive comment.</i>

abstraction	The process of considering something independently of its associations or attributes. <i>Topics will vary in degrees of abstraction.</i>
clairvoyant	Someone who has the power of clairvoyance. <i>She has had a message from a clairvoyant that her son is alive and well.</i>
daydream	Have a daydream indulge in a fantasy. <i>She was lost in a daydream.</i>
divination	The practice of seeking knowledge of the future or the unknown by supernatural means. <i>The mediums are hired to perform divinations.</i>
dreamer	A person who is impractical or idealistic. <i>A rebellious young dreamer.</i>
dreaming	A series of mental images and emotions occurring during sleep.
dreamland	An imagined and unrealistically ideal world. <i>A digital dreamland where you ll pay bills with a click of the mouse.</i>
envisage	Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case. <i>The Rome Treaty envisaged free movement across frontiers.</i>
fancied	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A fancied wrong.</i>
fanciful	Not based on fact; existing only in the imagination. <i>A fanciful Art Nouveau bar.</i>
fantasy	The faculty or activity of imagining impossible or improbable things. <i>A schoolgirl fantasy.</i>
fictitious	Occurring in or invented for fiction. <i>Reports of a deal were dismissed as fictitious by the Minister.</i>
foretell	Indicate by signs. <i>A seer had foretold that the earl would assume the throne.</i>
future	Bulk commodities bought or sold at an agreed price for delivery at a specified future date. <i>We plan on getting married in the near future.</i>
idealist	A person who believes in the theory of idealism. <i>Hegel described himself as an absolute idealist.</i>
idealistic	Characterized by idealism; unrealistically aiming for perfection. <i>Idealistic young doctors who went to work for the rebels.</i>

illusive	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>Illusive hopes of finding a better job.</i>
illusory	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>Secret activities offer presidents the alluring but often illusory promise that they can achieve foreign policy goals without the bothersome debate and open decision that are staples of democracy.</i>
<u>imaginary</u>	Existing only in the imagination. <i>Chris had imaginary conversations with her.</i>
<u>imagine</u>	Believe (something unreal or untrue) to exist or be so. <i>I couldn't imagine what she expected to tell them.</i>
improbable	Too improbable to admit of belief. <i>The characters have improbable names.</i>
magic	An illusory feat considered magical by naive observers. <i>Suddenly as if by magic the doors start to open.</i>
oracle	A response or message given by an oracle especially an ambiguous one. <i>He reigned supreme as the Colonial Office's oracle on Africa.</i>
<u>prophet</u>	In Christian use the books of Isaiah Jeremiah Ezekiel Daniel and the twelve minor prophets. <i>The prime minister ignored the prophets of doom.</i>
<u>reverie</u>	Absentminded dreaming while awake. <i>I slipped into reverie.</i>
seer	An authoritative person who divines the future. <i>A seer of the future.</i>
<u>surreal</u>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>A surreal mix of fact and fantasy.</i>
<u>tale</u>	A number or total. <i>An exact tale of the dead bodies.</i>
<u>tangential</u>	Of superficial relevance if any. <i>A tangential line.</i>
<u>visualize</u>	Make (something) visible to the eye. <i>The radiologist can visualize the cancerous liver.</i>
