Definitions of "Visitor" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “visitor” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A person with the right or duty of occasionally inspecting and reporting on a college or other academic institution.*
- *Someone who visits.*
- *A person visiting someone or somewhere, especially socially or as a tourist.*
- *A member of a sports team on tour or playing away from home.*
- *A migratory bird present in a locality for only part of the year.*



Synonyms of "Visitor" as a noun (13 Words)

- backpacker** A person who travels or hikes carrying their belongings in a rucksack.
*A **backpacker** hotel in Melbourne.*
- caller** A person who calls out numbers in a game of bingo or directions in a dance.
*The bailiff was a frequent **caller**.*
- day tripper** An era of existence or influence.
Someone who travels into little known regions (especially for some scientific purpose).
- explorer** A polar **explorer**.
- globetrotter** Someone who travels widely and often.
- guest** A person staying at a hotel or guest house.
*The **guest** list.*
- pilgrim** A member of the Pilgrim Fathers.
*Thousands of **pilgrims** converged in Memphis for the 16th anniversary of Presley's death.*
- sightseer** A person who goes sightseeing.
*Hordes of **sightseers**.*
- tourer** Large open car seating four with folding top.
*They enjoy caravanning in their **tourer**.*

tourist	Someone who travels for pleasure. <i>Worcestershire have beaten the tourists with five wickets to spare.</i>
traveller	A person who changes location. <i>Thousands of air travellers were left stranded.</i>
visitant	A visitor. <i>In the poem the angels of death appeared as spectral visitants.</i>
voyager	A journey to some distant place.



Usage Examples of "Visitor" as a noun

- *She's a frequent visitor to London.*
- *I'm expecting visitors later this evening.*
- *The red-necked grebe is a regular winter visitor.*
- *The visitors came back into the game with two penalty goals.*

- attendee** A person who attends a conference or other gathering.
*Seminar **attendees**.*
- cave** Explore natural caves.
*The narrow gorge contains a series of prehistoric **caves**.*
- customer** Someone who pays for goods or services.
*He s a tough **customer**.*
- encroach** Advance beyond the usual limit.
*Rather than **encroach** on his privacy she might have kept to her room.*
- exhibitor** A person who displays works of art or other items of interest at an exhibition.
*The trade fair attracted 89 **exhibitors** and 37 000 visitors.*
- explore** Inquire into.
*Her fingers **explored** his hair.*
- guest** A person staying at a hotel or guest house.
*A **guest** speaker.*

hotel	An establishment providing accommodation, meals, and other services for travellers and tourists. <i>A group of four friends had gone to have dinner at a roadside hotel.</i>
interject	Say (something) abruptly, especially as an aside or interruption. <i>She interjected the odd question here and there.</i>
interloper	A person who becomes involved in a place or situation where they are not wanted or are considered not to belong. <i>Japanese consumers have in the past been unreceptive to foreign interlopers in the cell phone market.</i>
intrude	Enter unlawfully on someone's property. <i>They intruded on our dinner party.</i>
intruder	Someone who intrudes on the privacy or property of another without permission. <i>The intruder had pulled out drawers and dumped their contents on the floor.</i>
intrusion	The forcing of molten rock into fissures or between strata of an earlier rock formation. <i>Unacceptable intrusions of privacy.</i>
invade	(of an armed force) enter (a country or region) so as to subjugate or occupy it. <i>He felt his privacy was being invaded.</i>
lodging	The act of lodging. <i>He was looking for lodgings and a job.</i>
oppressor	A person of authority who subjects others to undue pressures. <i>They overthrew their colonial oppressors.</i>
passport	Any authorization to pass or go somewhere. <i>A British citizen with a valid passport does not need a visa to visit the US.</i>
resident	Living somewhere on a long-term basis. <i>Arctic residents are joined annually by long distance migrants.</i>
resort	The action of resorting to a course of action in a difficult situation. <i>An appeal to his uncle was his last resort.</i>
robber	A person who commits robbery.
spelunker	A person who explores caves.
tour	Take a performer production etc on tour. <i>A tour of duty in Northern Ireland.</i>
tourist	Travel as a tourist. <i>The pyramids have drawn tourists to Egypt.</i>
trespass	Break the law. <i>A mass trespass on the moor.</i>

trespasser A person entering someone's land or property without permission.
*A **trespasser** on his land.*

usurpation Wrongfully seizing and holding (an office or powers) by force (especially the seizure of a throne or supreme authority).
*A succession of generals who ruled by **usurpation**.*

violate Violate the sacred character of a place or language.
*This sentence **violates** the rules of syntax.*

violator Someone who assaults others sexually.
*A major crackdown on **violators** of immigration regulations.*

visa Provide a passport with a visa.
*US **visa** restrictions.*

visit Pay a brief visit.
*He scheduled a **visit** to the dentist.*
