Synonyms of "Visual" as an adjective (9 Words)

- discernible** Perceptible by the senses or intellect.
*The scandal had no **discernible** effect on his career.*
- ocular** Visible- Shakespeare.
*An **ocular** spot is a pigmented organ or part believed to be sensitive to light.*
- optic** Of or relating to or resembling the eye.
*The **optic** or **optical** axis of the eye.*
- optical** (of a device) requiring electromagnetic radiation for its operation.
***Optical** telescopes.*
- perceivable** Capable of being perceived especially by sight or hearing.
***Perceivable** through the mist.*

perceptible Easily perceived by the senses or grasped by the mind.
*Easily **perceptible** sounds.*

seeable Capable of being seen; or open to easy view.

seeing Having vision, not blind.

visible Capable of being seen; or open to easy view.
*A highly **visible** member of the royal entourage.*

- aesthetics** The branch of philosophy which deals with questions of beauty and artistic taste.
*Traditional **aesthetics** assumed the existence of universal and timeless criteria of artistic value.*
- behold** See or observe (someone or something, especially of remarkable or impressive nature).
*The botanical gardens were a wonder to **behold**.*
- espy** Catch sight of.
*She **espied** her daughter rounding the corner.*
- eye** The visual or light detecting organ of many invertebrate animals that corresponds to the eye of humans and vertebrate animals.
*Margot saw the women **eyeing** up her boyfriend.*
- imagery** The ability to form mental images of things or events.
*The film's religious **imagery**.*
- lookout** Used to indicate whether a likely outcome is good or bad.
*A **lookout** point with breathtaking views.*
- microscopy** Research with the use of microscopes.

nerves	Control of your emotions. <i>This kind of tension is not good for my nerves.</i>
observe	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>A stockbroker once observed that dealers live and work in hell.</i>
ocular	Visible- Shakespeare. <i>An ocular organ.</i>
oculist	A medical doctor specializing in the diagnosis and treatment of diseases of the eye. <i>He visited an oculist in Chicago who prescribed a pair of reading glasses.</i>
ophthalmologist	A specialist in the branch of medicine concerned with the study and treatment of disorders and diseases of the eye.
optic	A lens or other optical component in an optical instrument. <i>An optical illusion.</i>
optical	Of or relating to or resembling the eye. <i>An optical aid.</i>
optician	A person qualified to prescribe and dispense glasses and contact lenses and to detect eye diseases ophthalmic optician or to make and supply glasses and contact lenses dispensing optician.
optometrist	A person skilled in testing for defects of vision in order to prescribe corrective glasses.
perceive	To become aware of through the senses. <i>He perceived the faintest of flushes creeping up her neck.</i>
perception	The way in which something is regarded, understood, or interpreted. <i>We need to challenge many popular perceptions of old age.</i>
perceptual	Relating to the ability to interpret or become aware of something through the senses. <i>A patient with perceptual problems who cannot judge distances.</i>
recognize	Exhibit recognition for (an antigen or a substrate). <i>They were refusing to recognize the puppet regime.</i>
see	See and understand have a good eye. <i>I ll go along to the club and see if I can get a game.</i>
sensory	Of a nerve fiber or impulse originating outside and passing toward the central nervous system. <i>Sensory neurons.</i>

sight	Take a detailed visual measurement of something with or as with a sight. <i>There were reports of a man on the roof aiming a rifle and looking through its sights.</i>
spectacle	A blunder that makes you look ridiculous used in the phrase make a spectacle of yourself. <i>The acrobatic feats make a good spectacle.</i>
splendor	A quality that outshines the usual. <i>It is the university that gives the scene its stately splendor.</i>
telescopic	Capable of viewing and magnifying distant objects. <i>A telescopic umbrella.</i>
visibility	The state of being able to see or be seen. <i>Visibility was down to 15 yards.</i>
visible	Visible imports or exports. <i>Visible files.</i>
vision	The images seen on a television screen. <i>We visioned a small lawn surrounded with a perfect tangle of trees.</i>
watch	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>There aren't enough staff to watch him properly.</i>
