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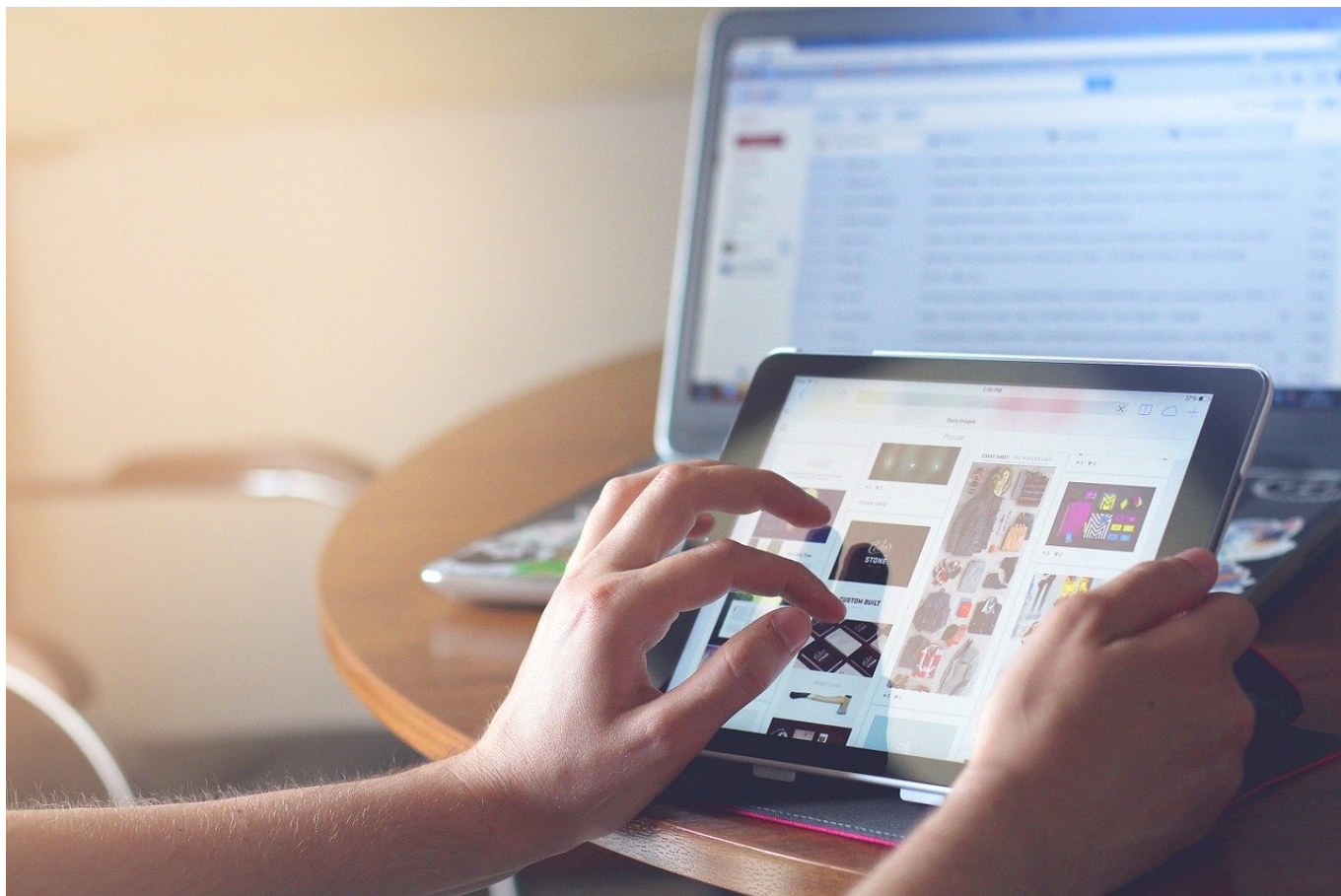

Evoke or provoke to appear or occur.
*Akasha is **evoked** in India when a house is being built to ensure its completion.*

fancy

Have a fancy or particular liking or desire for.
*I **fancy** him to win the tournament.*

figure

Judge to be probable.
*How do the elections **figure** in the current pattern of internal politics.*

image

Render visible, as by means of MRI.
*The hard disk drive should be **imaged** using a specialized bitstream backup product.*

imagine

Form a mental image or concept of.
*I couldn't **imagine** what she expected to tell them.*

picture

Show in or as in a picture.
*He is **pictured** with party guests.*

picture in the mind's eye

Imagine; conceive of; see in one's mind.

project

Project on a screen.
*The candidate **projects** himself as a moderate and a reformer.*

see

Imagine conceive of see in one's mind.
*Now I **see**.*

think about

Ponder; reflect on, or reason about.

visualise

View the outline of by means of an X-ray.

fancy	Have a fancy or particular liking or desire for. <i>Never had the wildest flights of fancy imagined such magnificence.</i>
<u>fantasy</u>	A fanciful mental image, typically one on which a person often dwells and which reflects their conscious or unconscious wishes. <i>Look at their dedication to fantasy leagues and the enormous minutiae of the stats they memorize.</i>
faun	One of a class of lustful rural gods, represented as a man with a goat's horns, ears, legs, and tail.
<u>icon</u>	A graphic symbol (usually a simple picture) that denotes a program or a command or a data file or a concept in a graphical user interface. <i>This iron jawed icon of American manhood.</i>
ideational	Being of the nature of a notion or concept. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and ideational factors.</i>
illusory	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>She knew the safety of her room was illusory.</i>
<u>image</u>	A representation of the external form of a person or thing in art. <i>The company tried to project an altruistic image.</i>
<u>imagery</u>	Visual symbolism. <i>The film s religious imagery.</i>
<u>imaginary</u>	(mathematics) a number of the form $a+bi$ where a and b are real numbers and i is the square root of -1 . <i>A small child s imaginary friends.</i>
<u>imagination</u>	The ability to form mental images of things or events. <i>Imagination reveals what the world could be.</i>
<u>imagine</u>	Believe (something unreal or untrue) to exist or be so. <i>I imagine she earned a lot of money with her new novel.</i>
improbably	Not easy to believe. <i>Everyone in the film is improbably gorgeous.</i>
picture	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>The very picture of a modern general.</i>

- presuppose** Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition.
*This step **presupposes** two prior ones.*
- scenario** A written outline of a film, novel, or stage work giving details of the plot and individual scenes.
*The **scenarios** for four short stories.*
- supposedly According to what is generally assumed or believed (often used to indicate that the speaker doubts the truth of the statement).
*There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues **supposedly** because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.*
- surreal Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre.
*As irrational and **surreal** as a dream.*
- trope A significant or recurrent theme; a motif.
*She uses the Eucharist as a pictorial **trope**.*
- visionary A person with original ideas about what the future will or could be like.
*A **visionary** leader.*
