Vigour or vivacity of style or performance.

*She told her story with some **brio**.*

buoyancy

A high level of activity in an economy or stock market.

*She plunged into the sea grateful for the **buoyancy** of the salt water.*

dynamism	The quality of being characterized by vigorous activity and progress. <i>He was known for his dynamism and strong views.</i>
effervescence	Vivacity and enthusiasm. <i>The effervescence of sparkling wine.</i>
elan	Enthusiastic and assured vigor and liveliness. <i>A performance of great elan and sophistication.</i>
energy	A thermodynamic quantity equivalent to the capacity of a physical system to do work the units of energy are joules or ergs. <i>A collision in which no energy is transferred.</i>
exuberance	Overflowing with eager enjoyment or approval. <i>A sense of youthful exuberance.</i>
fire	A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning. <i>Mortar fire.</i>
forcefulness	Physical energy or intensity. <i>A government has not the vitality and forcefulness of a living man.</i>
<u>gusto</u>	The style in which a work of art is executed. <i>Hawkins tucked into his breakfast with gusto.</i>
high-spiritedness	Exuberant liveliness.
life	A sentence of imprisonment for life. <i>Revelations about his private life.</i>
life force	A characteristic state or mode of living.
liveliness	General activity and motion. <i>He radiated liveliness and good humour.</i>
passion	A musical setting of any of the biblical accounts of the Passion. <i>She nurses a passion for Thomas.</i>
pep	Liveliness and energy. <i>He was an enthusiastic player full of pep.</i>
punch	An iced mixed drink usually containing alcohol and prepared for multiple servings normally served in a punch bowl. <i>He reeled under the well aimed punch.</i>
<u>push</u>	An act of pushing someone or something in order to move them away from oneself. <i>Many clubs are joining in the fund raising push.</i>
<u>relish</u>	An appetizing flavour. <i>The tired glutton finds no relish in the sweetest meat.</i>

spark	A small flash of light produced by a sudden disruptive electrical discharge through the air. <i>A log fire was sending sparks on to the rug.</i>
sparkle	Merriment expressed by a brightness or gleam or animation of countenance. <i>There was a sparkle in his eyes.</i>
spirit	A supernatural being. <i>He confessed in a spirit of self respect.</i>
spiritedness	Quality of being active or spirited or alive and vigorous.
verve	An energetic style. <i>Kollo sings with supreme verve and flexibility.</i>
vibrancy	The state of being full of energy and life. <i>Her eyes seemed to radiate the vibrancy of youth.</i>
vigour	Effort, energy, and enthusiasm. <i>I was 79 but still full of vigour and vitality.</i>
vim	A healthy capacity for vigorous activity. <i>In his youth he was full of vim and vigour.</i>
vivacity	Characterized by high spirits and animation. <i>He was struck by her vivacity humour and charm.</i>
zeal	Excessive fervor to do something or accomplish some end. <i>They disliked his zeal in demonstrating his superiority.</i>
zest	A quality of excitement and piquancy. <i>They campaigned with zest and intelligence.</i>
zestfulness	Vigorous and enthusiastic enjoyment.

panache	Distinctive and stylish elegance. <i>He entertained London society with great panache.</i>
reanimate	Give new life or energy to. <i>His personal dislike of the man was reanimated.</i>
<u>recreate</u>	Create anew. <i>The door was now open to recreate a single German state.</i>
refresh	Refresh one's memory. <i>The tea is cold and the pot needs refreshing.</i>
<u>reincarnation</u>	A new version of something from the past. <i>His reincarnation as a lion.</i>
revive	Regain life, consciousness, or strength. <i>The paper made panicky attempts to revive falling sales.</i>
<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm-hearted generous spirited man.</i>
<u>stamina</u>	Enduring strength and energy. <i>Their secret is stamina rather than speed.</i>
suppleness	The gracefulness of a person or animal that is flexible and supple. <i>He increased the leanness and suppleness of the organization.</i>
