- In names of metallic sulphates, e.g. blue vitriol (copper sulphate) and green vitriol (ferrous sulphate).
- A highly corrosive acid made from sulfur dioxide; widely used in the chemical industry.
- Bitter criticism or malice.
- Sulphuric acid.
- Abusive or venomous language used to express blame or censure or bitter deep-seated ill will.

Any of various water-soluble compounds having a sour taste and capable sulphuric acid

of turning litmus red and reacting with a base to form a salt.

Decades of **enmity** between the two countries.

An appeal to some supernatural power to inflict evil on someone or some execration
