- *A short musical composition with words.*
- *A part of a piece of music that is sung.*
- *A musical performance involving singing.*



## Synonyms of "Vocal" as a noun (2 Words)

- song** A musical composition suggestive of a song.  
*A bird will not learn its **song** unless it hears it at an early age.*
- vocal music** Music intended to be performed by one or more singers, usually with instrumental accompaniment.

## Vocal as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Vocal" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "vocal" as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Used in the production of speech sounds.*
- *Full of the sound of voices.*
- *Given to expressing yourself freely or insistently.*
- *Relating to the human voice.*
- *Having or using the power to produce speech or sound.*
- *Relating to or designed for or using the singing voice.*
- *(of music) consisting of or incorporating singing.*
- *Expressing opinions or feelings freely or loudly.*



## Synonyms of "Vocal" as an adjective (16 Words)

- articulated** Having two or more sections connected by a flexible joint.  
*The trilobite s thorax has a variable number of **articulated** segments.*
- blunt** Used of a knife or other blade; not sharp.  
*A **blunt** instrument.*
- candid** Characterized by directness in manner or speech; without subtlety or evasion.  
*A **candid** discussion.*
- direct** Direct in spatial dimensions proceeding without deviation or interruption straight and short.  
***Direct** vote.*
- expressed** Precisely and clearly expressed or readily observable leaving nothing to implication.

<b>forthright</b>	Proceeding directly forwards. <i>A <b>forthright</b> approach to the problem.</i>
<b>frank</b>	Unmistakable; obvious. <i><b>Frank</b> ulceration.</i>
<b>open</b>	Open and observable not secret or hidden. <i>His eyes were <b>open</b> but he could see nothing.</i>
<b>oral</b>	Done or taken by the mouth. <i><b>Oral</b> hygiene.</i>
<b>outspoken</b>	Given to expressing yourself freely or insistently. <i>He has been <b>outspoken</b> in his criticism.</i>
<b>said</b>	Used in legal language or humorously to refer to someone or something already mentioned or named. <i>Acting in pursuance of the <b>said</b> agreement.</i>
<b>spoken</b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>A <b>spoken</b> message.</i>
<b>uninhibited</b>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i><b>Uninhibited</b> exuberance.</i>
<b>uttered</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Frequently <b>uttered</b> sentiments.</i>
<b>vociferous</b>	Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>A <b>vociferous</b> mob.</i>
<b>voiced</b>	(of an opinion or attitude) expressed in a particular way. <i>A <b>voiced</b> velar fricative.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Vocal" as an adjective

- *A vocal assembly.*
- *The vocal apparatus.*
- *A playground vocal with the shouts and laughter of children.*
- *A four-part vocal composition.*
- *Non-linguistic vocal effects like laughs and sobs.*
- *A vocal bassline.*
- *He was vocal in condemning the action.*



## Associations of "Vocal" (30 Words)

<b>aloud</b>	Using the voice; not silently. <i>He wept <b>aloud</b>.</i>
<b>aural</b>	Relating to the ear or the sense of hearing. <i>Information held in written <b>aural</b> or visual form.</i>
<b><u>communicative</u></b>	Of or relating to communication. <i>Was a <b>communicative</b> person and quickly told all she knew.</i>
<b>dumb</b>	Make dumb or unheard silence. <i>She stood <b>dumb</b> while he poured out a stream of abuse.</i>
<b><u>expansive</u></b>	Tending towards economic or political expansion. <i><b>Expansive</b> domestic economic policies.</i>
<b>garrulous</b>	Excessively talkative, especially on trivial matters. <i>A <b>garrulous</b> cab driver.</i>
<b>halitosis</b>	Offensive breath.



<b>inarticulate</b>	Unable to express one's ideas or feelings clearly or easily. <i><b>Inarticulate</b> with rage.</i>
<b>incommunicado</b>	Without the means or right to communicate. <i><b>Incommunicado</b> political detainees.</i>
<b>lengthiness</b>	The consequence of being lengthened in duration.
<b>literate</b>	A literate person. <i>Computer <b>literate</b>.</i>
<b>loquacious</b>	Tending to talk a great deal; talkative. <i>Never <b>loquacious</b> Sarah was now totally lost for words.</i>
<b>loquacity</b>	The quality of being wordy and talkative. <i>He was renowned for <b>loquacity</b>.</i>
<b>mute</b>	Muffle the sound of a musical instrument especially by the use of a mute. <i>The great church was <b>mute</b> and dark.</i>
<b>oral</b>	Relating to the mouth. <i>A French <b>oral</b>.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) a society of priests without vows, especially the Oratory of St Philip Neri founded in 1564. <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>
<b>recitative</b>	A vocal passage of narrative text that a singer delivers with natural rhythms of speech. <i>Singing in <b>recitative</b>.</i>
<b>rhapsodize</b>	Recite a rhapsody. <i>He began to <b>rhapsodize</b> about Gaby's beauty and charm.</i>
<b>sinus</b>	An irregular venous or lymphatic cavity, reservoir, or dilated vessel. <i><b>Sinus</b> rhythm.</i>
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>A bird will not learn its <b>song</b> unless it hears it at an early age.</i>
<b>speak</b>	Make a characteristic or natural sound. <i>In his agitation he was unable to <b>speak</b>.</i>
<b>spoken</b>	Uttered through the medium of speech or characterized by speech; sometimes used in combination. <i>The <b>spoken</b> language.</i>
<b>talkative</b>	Fond of or given to talking. <i>The <b>talkative</b> driver hadn't stopped chatting.</i>
<b>timbre</b>	The character or quality of a musical sound or voice as distinct from its pitch and intensity. <i>The <b>timbre</b> of her soprano was rich and lovely.</i>

<b>unwritten</b>	Based on custom rather than documentation. <i>An <b>unwritten</b> law.</i>
<b>verbal</b>	A verbal statement containing a damaging admission alleged to have been made to the police and offered as evidence by the prosecution. <i>The root of the problem is visual rather than <b>verbal</b>.</i>
<b>volubility</b>	The quality of being facile in speech and writing. <i>Her legendary <b>volubility</b> deserted her.</i>
<b>whistle</b>	The act of signalling e.g. summoning by whistling or blowing a whistle. <i>The referee did not <b>whistle</b> for a foul.</i>
<b>wordless</b>	Not speaking or involving speech. <i>A sort of <b>wordless</b> communication had developed.</i>
<b>wordy</b>	Using or expressed in rather too many words. <i>Newspapers of the day printed long <b>wordy</b> editorials.</i>
