*The hotel's lobby and restaurant are the height of designer **chic**.*

craze

A fine crack in a glaze or other surface.
*The new **craze** for step aerobics.*

current

A flow of electricity through a conductor.
*This completes the circuit so that a **current** flows to the lamp.*

desired

Something that is desired.

enthusiasm

Something that arouses enthusiasm.
*Her energy and **enthusiasm** for life.*

fad

An arbitrary like or dislike.
*Some regard green politics as no more than the latest **fad**.*

fancy

Enthusiasts for a sport, especially boxing or racing, considered collectively.
*I've a **fancy** they want to be alone.*

fashion	The latest and most admired style in clothes and cosmetics and behavior. <i>A fashion magazine.</i>
in demand	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
in fashion	A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.
in favour	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
in style	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
infatuation	An intense but short-lived passion or admiration for someone or something. <i>The thrill of infatuation.</i>
mania	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>He had a mania for automobiles.</i>
<u>mode</u>	A fashion or style in clothes, art, literature, etc. <i>His preferred mode of travel was a kayak.</i>
<u>modern</u>	A person who advocates or practises a departure from traditional styles or values. <i>They were moderns they must not look back towards the old generation.</i>
<u>obsession</u>	An unhealthy and compulsive preoccupation with something or someone. <i>She cared for him with a devotion bordering on obsession.</i>
passing fancy	Success in satisfying a test or requirement.
passion	An irrational but irresistible motive for a belief or action. <i>She nurses a passion for Thomas.</i>
rage	A feeling of intense anger. <i>The sea hurled itself in thundering rage against the rocks.</i>
smart	Mental pain or suffering. <i>Sorrow is the effect of smart and smart the effect of faith.</i>
style	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>A cartilaginous style.</i>
taste	The faculty of perceiving taste. <i>Try a taste of cheese.</i>
<u>trend</u>	A topic that is the subject of many posts on a social media website or application within a short period of time. <i>An upward trend in sales and profit margins.</i>
voguish	A current state of general acceptance and use.

befitting	Appropriate to the occasion. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a befitting manner.</i>
craze	Make (someone) insane or wildly out of control. <i>The loch was frozen over but crazed with cracks.</i>
fad	An intense and widely shared enthusiasm for something, especially one that is short-lived; a craze. <i>He always follows the latest fads.</i>
fashion	A manner of doing something. <i>The skins were fashioned into boots and shoes.</i>
glamorize	Interpret romantically. <i>This new wallpaper really glamorizes the living room.</i>
gothic	As if belonging to the Middle Ages; old-fashioned and unenlightened. <i>Gothic novels like Frankenstein.</i>
hairdressing	Care for the hair: the activity of washing or cutting or curling or arranging the hair. <i>Courses in beauty and hairdressing.</i>
imaginable	Possible to be thought of or believed. <i>The most spectacular views imaginable.</i>
inimitable	So good or unusual as to be impossible to copy; unique. <i>An inimitable style.</i>
latest	Of most recent date. <i>The latest news.</i>
leaning	A tendency or partiality of a particular kind. <i>He felt leanings toward frivolity.</i>
means	Resources; capability. <i>Technology seen as a means to bring about emancipation.</i>
modernity	A modern way of thinking, working, etc.; contemporariness. <i>Hobbes was the genius of modernity.</i>
oversize	Larger than normal for its kind.

popular	Representing or appealing to or adapted for the benefit of the people at large. <i>A democratic or popular movement.</i>
popularity	The quality of being widely admired or accepted or sought after. <i>The universal popularity of American movies.</i>
proneness	Liability to suffer from or experience something disagreeable; susceptibility. <i>Accident proneness.</i>
recent	Of the immediate past or just previous to the present time. <i>In recent months.</i>
resurgent	Increasing or reviving after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>Resurgent nationalism.</i>
sartorial	Relating to tailoring, clothes, or style of dress. <i>Sartorial elegance.</i>
sicilian	A resident of Sicily.
style	Make consistent with certain rules of style. <i>His shoes were in a style that he could wear anywhere.</i>
suit	Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit. <i>This behavior doesn't suit you.</i>
tatty	Tastelessly showy. <i>The generally tatty output of the current Celtic revival.</i>
transformation	A rule describing the conversion of one syntactic structure into another related syntactic structure. <i>British society underwent a radical transformation.</i>
transmogrify	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<u>trend</u>	The popular taste at a given time. <i>The latest trends in modern dance.</i>
tuscan	A resident of Tuscany.
wizardry	Very impressive or ingenious technology or devices. <i>Merlin used his powers of wizardry for good.</i>
