Stylishness and elegance, typically of a specified kind.

*The hotel's lobby and restaurant are the height of designer **chic**.*

### **craze**

A fine crack in a glaze or other surface.

*The new **craze** for step aerobics.*

### **current**

A flow of electricity through a conductor.

*This completes the circuit so that a **current** flows to the lamp.*

### desired

Something that is desired.

### **enthusiasm**

Something that arouses enthusiasm.

*Her energy and **enthusiasm** for life.*

### **fad**

An arbitrary like or dislike.

*Some regard green politics as no more than the latest **fad**.*

### **fancy**

Enthusiasts for a sport, especially boxing or racing, considered collectively.

*I've a **fancy** they want to be alone.*

<b><u>fascination</u></b>	The capacity to attract intense interest. <i>Television has always held a <b>fascination</b> for me.</i>
<b>fashion</b>	The latest and most admired style in clothes and cosmetics and behavior. <i>A <b>fashion</b> magazine.</i>
<b>in demand</b>	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
<b>in fashion</b>	A unit of length equal to one twelfth of a foot.
<b>in favour</b>	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
<b>in style</b>	A rare soft silvery metallic element; occurs in small quantities in sphalerite.
<b>infatuation</b>	An intense but short-lived passion or admiration for someone or something. <i>The thrill of <b>infatuation</b>.</i>
<b>mania</b>	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>He had a <b>mania</b> for automobiles.</i>
<b><u>mode</u></b>	A fashion or style in clothes, art, literature, etc. <i>His preferred <b>mode</b> of travel was a kayak.</i>
<b><u>modern</u></b>	A person who advocates or practises a departure from traditional styles or values. <i>They were <b>moderns</b> they must not look back towards the old generation.</i>
<b><u>obsession</u></b>	An unhealthy and compulsive preoccupation with something or someone. <i>She cared for him with a devotion bordering on <b>obsession</b>.</i>
<b>passing fancy</b>	Success in satisfying a test or requirement.
<b>passion</b>	An irrational but irresistible motive for a belief or action. <i>She nurses a <b>passion</b> for Thomas.</i>
<b>rage</b>	A feeling of intense anger. <i>The sea hurled itself in thundering <b>rage</b> against the rocks.</i>
<b>smart</b>	Mental pain or suffering. <i>Sorrow is the effect of <b>smart</b> and <b>smart</b> the effect of faith.</i>
<b>style</b>	In an invertebrate a small slender pointed appendage a stylet. <i>A cartilaginous <b>style</b>.</i>
<b>taste</b>	The faculty of perceiving taste. <i>Try a <b>taste</b> of cheese.</i>
<b><u>trend</u></b>	A topic that is the subject of many posts on a social media website or application within a short period of time. <i>An upward <b>trend</b> in sales and profit margins.</i>
<b>voguish</b>	A current state of general acceptance and use.

<b>baroque</b>	The historic period from about 1600 until 1750 when the baroque style of art architecture and music flourished in Europe. <i>The sculptural group in Rome is a key work of the <b>baroque</b>.</i>
<b>befitting</b>	Appropriate to the occasion. <i>A country which can run the prestigious tournament in a <b>befitting</b> manner.</i>
<b>craze</b>	Make (someone) insane or wildly out of control. <i>The loch was frozen over but <b>crazed</b> with cracks.</i>
<b>fad</b>	An intense and widely shared enthusiasm for something, especially one that is short-lived; a craze. <i>He always follows the latest <b>fads</b>.</i>
<b>fashion</b>	A manner of doing something. <i>The skins were <b>fashioned</b> into boots and shoes.</i>
<b>glamorize</b>	Interpret romantically. <i>This new wallpaper really <b>glamorizes</b> the living room.</i>
<b>gothic</b>	As if belonging to the Middle Ages; old-fashioned and unenlightened. <i><b>Gothic</b> novels like Frankenstein.</i>
<b>hairdressing</b>	Care for the hair: the activity of washing or cutting or curling or arranging the hair. <i>Courses in beauty and <b>hairdressing</b>.</i>
<b>imaginable</b>	Possible to be thought of or believed. <i>The most spectacular views <b>imaginable</b>.</i>
<b>inimitable</b>	So good or unusual as to be impossible to copy; unique. <i>An <b>inimitable</b> style.</i>
<b>latest</b>	Of most recent date. <i>The <b>latest</b> news.</i>
<b>leaning</b>	A tendency or partiality of a particular kind. <i>He felt <b>leanings</b> toward frivolity.</i>
<b>means</b>	Resources; capability. <i>Technology seen as a <b>means</b> to bring about emancipation.</i>
<b>modernity</b>	A modern way of thinking, working, etc.; contemporariness. <i>Hobbes was the genius of <b>modernity</b>.</i>
<b>oversize</b>	Larger than normal for its kind.

<b>popular</b>	Representing or appealing to or adapted for the benefit of the people at large. <i>A democratic or <b>popular</b> movement.</i>
<b>popularity</b>	The quality of being widely admired or accepted or sought after. <i>The universal <b>popularity</b> of American movies.</i>
<b>proneness</b>	Liability to suffer from or experience something disagreeable; susceptibility. <i>Accident <b>proneness</b>.</i>
<b>recent</b>	Of the immediate past or just previous to the present time. <i>In <b>recent</b> months.</i>
<b>resurgent</b>	Increasing or reviving after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i><b>Resurgent</b> nationalism.</i>
<b>sartorial</b>	Relating to tailoring, clothes, or style of dress. <i><b>Sartorial</b> elegance.</i>
<b>sicilian</b>	A resident of Sicily.
<b>style</b>	Make consistent with certain rules of style. <i>His shoes were in a <b>style</b> that he could wear anywhere.</i>
<b>suit</b>	Slang a businessman dressed in a business suit. <i>This behavior doesn't <b>suit</b> you.</i>
<b>tatty</b>	Tastelessly showy. <i>The generally <b>tatty</b> output of the current Celtic revival.</i>
<b>transformation</b>	A rule describing the conversion of one syntactic structure into another related syntactic structure. <i>British society underwent a radical <b>transformation</b>.</i>
<b>transmogrify</b>	Transform in a surprising or magical manner. <i>His home was transmogrified into a hippy crash pad.</i>
<b>trend</b>	The popular taste at a given time. <i>The latest <b>trends</b> in modern dance.</i>
<b>tuscan</b>	A resident of Tuscany.
<b>wizardry</b>	Very impressive or ingenious technology or devices. <i>Merlin used his powers of <b>wizardry</b> for good.</i>
