## **Voiced as an Adjective**

### **Definitions of "Voiced" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “voiced” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Produced with vibration of the vocal cords.*
- *Speaking or singing with a voice of a specified kind.*
- *(of a speech sound) uttered with resonance of the vocal cords (e.g. b, d, g).*
- *(of an opinion or attitude) expressed in a particular way.*



## Synonyms of "Voiced" as an adjective (2 Words)

**soft** Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe.  
*The moon's pale light cast **soft** shadows.*

**sonant** Produced with vibration of the vocal cords.  
*Voiced **sonants** such as b and g and z.*



## Usage Examples of "Voiced" as an adjective

- *A commonly voiced concern amongst doctors.*
- *A squeaky-voiced comedian.*
- *A frequently voiced opinion.*
- *A passionate deep-voiced singer.*
- *Voiced consonants such as `b' and `g' and `z.*

- *A voiced velar fricative.*





## Associations of "Voiced" (30 Words)

<b>acoustic</b>	Of or relating to the science of acoustics. <i>A sad gentle <b>acoustic</b> ballad.</i>
<b>acoustics</b>	The study of the physical properties of sound.
<b>alto</b>	An alto saxophone. <i><b>Alto</b> clarinet or recorder.</i>
<b>ballad</b>	A poem or song narrating a story in short stanzas Traditional ballads are typically of unknown authorship having been passed on orally from one generation to the next.
<b>baritone</b>	A singer with a baritone voice. <i>He starred as a <b>baritone</b>.</i>
<b>cackle</b>	A loud laugh suggestive of a hen s cackle. <i>Ducks have a harsh growling <b>cackle</b>.</i>

<b>choir</b>	The part of a cathedral or large church between the high altar and the nave used by the choir and clergy. <i>A clarinet <b>choir</b>.</i>
<b>contralto</b>	A part written for a contralto voice. <i>She sang in a high <b>contralto</b>.</i>
<b>earshot</b>	The range within which a voice can be heard. <i>The children were told to stay within <b>earshot</b>.</i>
<b>harpsichord</b>	A keyboard instrument with horizontal strings which run perpendicular to the keyboard in a long tapering case, and are plucked by points of quill, leather, or plastic operated by depressing the keys. It is used chiefly in European classical music of the 16th to 18th centuries.
<b>hearing</b>	The act of hearing attentively. <i>The investigative committee will hold <b>hearings</b> in Chicago.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i><b>Loud</b> sport shirts.</i>
<b>megaphone</b>	Utter through or as if through a megaphone. <i>The director stood around megaphoning orders.</i>
<b>music</b>	Musical activity singing or whistling etc. <i>He devoted his life to <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>musical</b>	Characteristic of or resembling or accompanied by music. <i>They shared similar <b>musical</b> tastes.</i>
<b>noise</b>	Emit a noise. <i>Making a <b>noise</b> like a pig.</i>
<b>octave</b>	The interval between the two notes at the extremes of an octave.
<b>phonic</b>	Relating to phonics. <i>The English language presents difficulties if a purely <b>phonic</b> approach is attempted.</i>
<b>piano</b>	Used as a direction in music; to be played relatively softly. <i>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</i>
<b>reverberation</b>	A remote or indirect consequence of some action. <i>Electronic effects have been added such as echo and <b>reverberation</b>.</i>
<b>shouting</b>	Uttering a loud inarticulate cry as of pain or excitement. <i>It s all over but the <b>shouting</b>.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of terror, pain, or excitement. <i>The answer <b>shrieked</b> at her all too clearly.</i>

<b><u>sing</u></b>	Deliver by singing. <i>My brother <b>sings</b> very well.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>His <b>singing</b> is rich toned.</i>
<b>solfege</b>	A voice exercise; singing scales or runs to the same syllable.
<b>sonorous</b>	Capable of producing a deep or ringing sound. <i>He relished the <b>sonorous</b> words of condemnation.</i>
<b>soprano</b>	A female or boy singer with a soprano voice. <i>A good <b>soprano</b> voice.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Phonetics an individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language. <i>A <b>sound</b> timber.</i>
<b><u>tenor</u></b>	An adult male with a tenor voice. <i>A <b>tenor</b> sax.</i>
<b><u>tune</u></b>	Adjust (an engine) or balance (mechanical parts) so that a vehicle runs smoothly and efficiently. <i>DJ Samantha provided the <b>tunes</b>.</i>
