Voiced as an Adjective

Definitions of "Voiced" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “voiced” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Produced with vibration of the vocal cords.*
- *Speaking or singing with a voice of a specified kind.*
- *(of a speech sound) uttered with resonance of the vocal cords (e.g. b, d, g).*
- *(of an opinion or attitude) expressed in a particular way.*



Synonyms of "Voiced" as an adjective (2 Words)

soft Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe.
*The moon's pale light cast **soft** shadows.*

sonant Produced with vibration of the vocal cords.
*Voiced **sonants** such as b and g and z.*



Usage Examples of "Voiced" as an adjective

- *A commonly voiced concern amongst doctors.*
- *A squeaky-voiced comedian.*
- *A frequently voiced opinion.*
- *A passionate deep-voiced singer.*
- *Voiced consonants such as `b' and `g' and `z.*
- *Strongly voiced sentiments.*
- *A voiced velar fricative.*



Associations of "Voiced" (30 Words)

acoustic	Of or relating to the science of acoustics. <i>A sad gentle acoustic ballad.</i>
acoustics	The study of the physical properties of sound.
alto	An alto saxophone. <i>Alto clarinet or recorder.</i>
ballad	A poem or song narrating a story in short stanzas Traditional ballads are typically of unknown authorship having been passed on orally from one generation to the next.
baritone	A singer with a baritone voice. <i>He starred as a baritone.</i>
cackle	A loud laugh suggestive of a hen s cackle. <i>Ducks have a harsh growling cackle.</i>

choir	The part of a cathedral or large church between the high altar and the nave used by the choir and clergy. <i>A clarinet choir.</i>
contralto	A part written for a contralto voice. <i>She sang in a high contralto.</i>
earshot	The range within which a voice can be heard. <i>The children were told to stay within earshot.</i>
harpsichord	A keyboard instrument with horizontal strings which run perpendicular to the keyboard in a long tapering case, and are plucked by points of quill, leather, or plastic operated by depressing the keys. It is used chiefly in European classical music of the 16th to 18th centuries.
hearing	The act of hearing attentively. <i>The investigative committee will hold hearings in Chicago.</i>
loud	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>Loud sport shirts.</i>
megaphone	Utter through or as if through a megaphone. <i>The director stood around megaphoning orders.</i>
music	Musical activity singing or whistling etc. <i>He devoted his life to music.</i>
musical	Characteristic of or resembling or accompanied by music. <i>They shared similar musical tastes.</i>
noise	Emit a noise. <i>Making a noise like a pig.</i>
octave	The interval between the two notes at the extremes of an octave.
phonic	Relating to phonics. <i>The English language presents difficulties if a purely phonic approach is attempted.</i>
piano	Used as a direction in music; to be played relatively softly. <i>The piano passages in the composition.</i>
reverberation	A remote or indirect consequence of some action. <i>Electronic effects have been added such as echo and reverberation.</i>
shouting	Uttering a loud inarticulate cry as of pain or excitement. <i>It s all over but the shouting.</i>
shriek	Utter a high-pitched piercing sound or words, especially as an expression of terror, pain, or excitement. <i>The answer shrieked at her all too clearly.</i>

<u>sing</u>	Deliver by singing. <i>My brother sings very well.</i>
singing	The act of singing vocal music. <i>His singing is rich toned.</i>
solfege	A voice exercise; singing scales or runs to the same syllable.
sonorous	Capable of producing a deep or ringing sound. <i>He relished the sonorous words of condemnation.</i>
soprano	A female or boy singer with a soprano voice. <i>A good soprano voice.</i>
sound	Phonetics an individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language. <i>A sound timber.</i>
<u>tenor</u>	An adult male with a tenor voice. <i>A tenor sax.</i>
<u>tune</u>	Adjust (an engine) or balance (mechanical parts) so that a vehicle runs smoothly and efficiently. <i>DJ Samantha provided the tunes.</i>
