<b>backbone</b>	The spine of a book. <i>He has enough <b>backbone</b> to see us through this difficulty.</i>
<b>choice</b>	The act of choosing or selecting. <i>My only <b>choice</b> is to refuse.</i>
<b><u>commitment</u></b>	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>A man of energy and <b>commitment</b>.</i>
<b>decision</b>	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>The burden of <b>decision</b> was his.</i>
<b><u>dedication</u></b>	A ceremony in which something (as a building) is dedicated to some goal or purpose. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome <b>dedication</b> to his wife.</i>

<u>determination</u>	A tendency to move in a fixed direction. <i>Expert <b>determination</b>.</i>
<u>discretion</u>	The power of making free choices unconstrained by external agencies. <i>I ll be the soul of <b>discretion</b>.</i>
<b>doggedness</b>	Persistent determination.
<u>drive</u>	Hitting a golf ball off of a tee with a driver. <i>The team was ready for a <b>drive</b> toward the pennant.</i>
<b>firmness of purpose</b>	The quality of being steady or securely and immovably fixed in place.
<b>fixity of purpose</b>	What something is used for.
<b>option</b>	The right to buy or sell property at an agreed price; the right is purchased and if it is not exercised by a stated date the money is forfeited. <i>Choose the cheapest <b>options</b> for supplying energy.</i>
<u>prerogative</u>	A faculty or property distinguishing a person or class. <i>Suffrage was the <b>prerogative</b> of white adult males.</i>
<b>purposefulness</b>	The quality of having a definite purpose.
<b>resoluteness</b>	The trait of being resolute. <i>His <b>resoluteness</b> carried him through the battle.</i>
<b>resolution</b>	Computer science the number of pixels per square inch on a computer generated display the greater the resolution the better the picture. <i>It was his unshakeable <b>resolution</b> to finish the work.</i>
<b>resolve</b>	A formal resolution by a legislative body or public meeting. <i>She received information that strengthened her <b>resolve</b>.</i>
<b>single-mindedness</b>	Characterized by one unified purpose.
<b>spine</b>	A small sharp-pointed tip resembling a spike on a stem or leaf. <i>The title and author were printed on the <b>spine</b> of the book.</i>
<b>staying power</b>	The state of inactivity following an interruption.
<b>strength of character</b>	Physical energy or intensity.
<b>tenaciousness</b>	Persistent determination.
<u>tenacity</u>	The quality or fact of continuing to exist; persistence. <i>The sheer <b>tenacity</b> of the limpet.</i>
<u>will</u>	The capability of conscious choice and decision and intention- George Meredith. <i>Where there s a <b>will</b> there s a way.</i>

### Usage Examples of "Volition" as a noun

- able** Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence.  
*We were at last **able** to buy a car.*
- apt** Having a tendency to do something.  
*She proved an **apt** pupil.*
- believable** Able to be believed; credible.  
*She felt that Dawn's story was not quite **believable**.*
- bound** Bound by an oath.  
***Bound** and gagged hostages.*
- codicil** A supplement to a will; a testamentary instrument intended to alter an already executed will.  
*Francis has remembered him in a **codicil** to this will.*

<b><u>dependence</u></b>	Addiction to drink or drugs. <i>The <b>dependence</b> of our medical schools on grant funds.</i>
<b>dower</b>	A dowry. <i>When she got married she got <b>dowered</b>.</i>
<b>impulsion</b>	The act of applying force suddenly. <i>The <b>impulsion</b> of the singers to govern the pace.</i>
<b>inclined</b>	(often followed by `to') having a preference, disposition, or tendency. <i>An <b>inclined</b> ramp.</i>
<b>intestacy</b>	The situation of being or dying without a legally valid will.
<b>intestate</b>	Having made no legally valid will before death or not disposed of by a legal will. <i>He died <b>intestate</b>.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Speculation on the <b>likely</b> effect of opting out.</i>
<b><u>motivational</u></b>	Relating to the reason or reasons for acting or behaving in a particular way. <i>Fear is used as a <b>motivational</b> tool.</i>
<b>plausible</b>	(of a person) skilled at producing persuasive arguments, especially ones intended to deceive. <i>A <b>plausible</b> explanation.</i>
<b>potential</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>A young broadcaster with great <b>potential</b>.</i>
<b>potentiality</b>	The possibility of something happening or of someone doing something in the future. <i>The technology is still relatively not well known in spite of its great <b>potentiality</b>.</i>
<b>practicable</b>	Able to be done or put into practice successfully. <i>A <b>practicable</b> solution.</i>
<b><u>preliminary</u></b>	A preliminary action or event. <i>The discussions were seen as <b>preliminary</b> to the policy paper.</i>
<b>presumable</b>	Capable of being inferred on slight grounds.
<b>presumptive</b>	Affording reasonable grounds for belief or acceptance. <i><b>Presumptive</b> evidence.</i>
<b><u>probable</u></b>	Apparently destined. <i>He foresaw a <b>probable</b> loss.</i>
<b><u>prone</u></b>	Lying face downward. <i>A <b>prone</b> position.</i>

<b>prospective</b>	Expected or expecting to be the specified thing in the future. <i>A <b>prospective</b> mother.</i>
<b><u>providence</u></b>	God or nature as providing protective care. <i>Divine <b>providence</b>.</i>
<b><u>seem</u></b>	Seem to be true probable or apparent. <i>I <b>seem</b> to remember giving you very precise instructions.</i>
<b><u>testament</u></b>	A profession of belief. <i>He stated his political <b>testament</b>.</i>
<b>testate</b>	A person who makes a will. <i>He desired to die <b>testate</b>.</i>
<b>testator</b>	A person who makes a will.
<b><u>voluntary</u></b>	Of your own free will or design; done by choice; not forced or compelled. <i>A <b>voluntary</b> helper.</i>
<b><u>will</u></b>	Expressing desire consent or willingness. <i>Come what may I <b>will</b> succeed.</i>
