<b>extent</b>	The distance or area or volume over which something extends. <i>Decision making was to a large <b>extent</b> outside his control.</i>
<b>hardback</b>	A book bound in stiff covers.
<b>intensity</b>	The quality of being intense. <i>There s an <b>intensity</b> in his eyes that s downright scary.</i>
<b>issue</b>	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>A new <b>issue</b> of stamps.</i>
<b>largeness</b>	Large or extensive in breadth or importance or comprehensiveness. <i>A man distinguished by the <b>largeness</b> and scope of his views.</i>
<b>loudness</b>	The magnitude of sound (usually in a specified direction).
<b>magnitude</b>	A number assigned to the ratio of two quantities two quantities are of the same order of magnitude if one is less than 10 times as large as the other the number of magnitudes that the quantities differ is specified to within a power of 10. <i>About the <b>magnitude</b> of a small pea.</i>
<b>manual</b>	A vehicle with manual transmission. <i>A computer <b>manual</b>.</i>
<b>mass</b>	(Roman Catholic Church and Protestant Churches) the celebration of the Eucharist. <i>Multiply the <b>mass</b> of the payload by the distance travelled.</i>

<b>number</b>	The grammatical category for the forms of nouns and pronouns and verbs that are used depending on the number of entities involved singular or dual or plural. <i>In English the subject and the verb must agree in <b>number</b>.</i>
<b>opus</b>	A separate composition or set of compositions. <i>He was writing an <b>opus</b> on Mexico.</i>

<b>paperback</b>	A book bound in stiff paper or flexible card. <i>The shelves were stacked with well thumbed <b>paperbacks</b>.</i>
<u><b>portion</b></u>	A part of something divided between two or more people; a share. <i>She wanted the right to decide how her <b>portion</b> of the allowance should be spent.</i>
<b>proportion</b>	Harmonious arrangement or relation of parts or elements within a whole (as in a design). <i>The bleach can be diluted with water in the <b>proportion</b> one part bleach to ten parts water.</i>
<u><b>publication</b></u>	The communication of something to the public; making information generally known. <i>The <b>publication</b> of her first novel.</i>
<u><b>quantity</b></u>	The figure or symbol representing a quantity. <i>A small <b>quantity</b> of food.</i>
