- *A person who freely enrolls for military service rather than being conscripted, especially a member of a force formed by voluntary enrolment and distinct from the regular army.*

- A person to whom a voluntary conveyance or disposition is made.
- (military) a person who freely enlists for service.
- A person who performs voluntary work.
- A person who freely offers to take part in an enterprise or undertake a task.
- A person who works for an organization without being paid.
- A native or resident of Tennessee.

*Many **patients** in the hospital were more ill than she was.*

subject

The subject matter of a conversation or discussion.

*He didn't want to discuss that **subject**.*

tennessean

A native or resident of Tennessee.

voluntary

A piece of music performed extempore, especially as a prelude to other music, or composed in a free style.

come forward	Be found or available.
comment	Make or write a comment on. <i>Teachers commented that children of all abilities would benefit.</i>
<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>The mansion was declared a fire hazard.</i>
<u>hazard</u>	Put (something) at risk of being lost. <i>He hazarded a guess.</i>
make oneself available	Charge with a function; charge to be.

<u>moot</u>	Think about carefully; weigh. <i>The scheme was first mooted last October.</i>
<u>observe</u>	Observe with care or pay close attention to. <i>She observed that his presentation took up too much time.</i>
offer	Offer verbally. <i>The hotel offers private meeting rooms.</i>
offer one's services	Ask (someone) to marry you.
<u>posit</u>	Put in position place. <i>These plots are posited on a false premise about women s nature as inferior.</i>
present	Give as a present make a gift of. <i>We cannot represent this knowledge to our formal reason.</i>
present oneself	Give, especially as an honor or reward.
proffer	Present for acceptance or rejection. <i>He proffered his resignation.</i>
<u>propose</u>	Propose or intend. <i>He proposed a new nine point peace plan.</i>
propound	Put forward (an idea or theory) for consideration by others. <i>He began to propound the idea of a social monarchy as an alternative to Franco.</i>
put forward	Cause (someone) to undergo something.
put up	Attribute or give.
remark	Make or write a comment on. <i>He remarked the man s inflamed eyelids.</i>
say	Communicate or express nonverbally. <i>The padre finished saying the Nunc Dimittis.</i>
step forward	Furnish with steps.
<u>submit</u>	Put before. <i>The United States refused to submit to arbitration.</i>
<u>suggest</u>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>The temperature wasn t as tropical as the bright sunlight may have suggested.</i>
<u>tender</u>	Make a tender of in legal settlements. <i>Tenderize meat.</i>
venture	Put at risk. <i>Agents for other people s money they do not venture their own capital.</i>

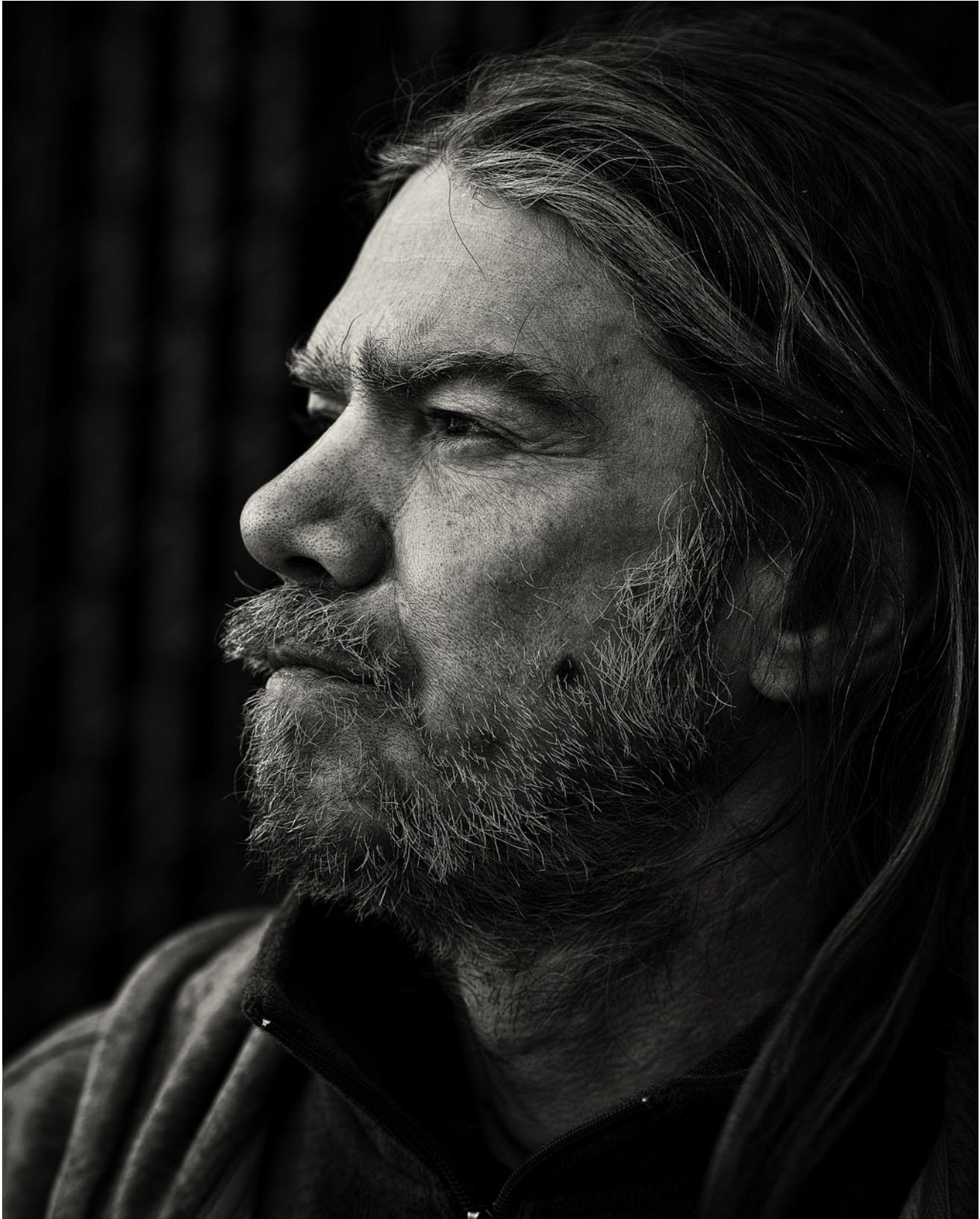

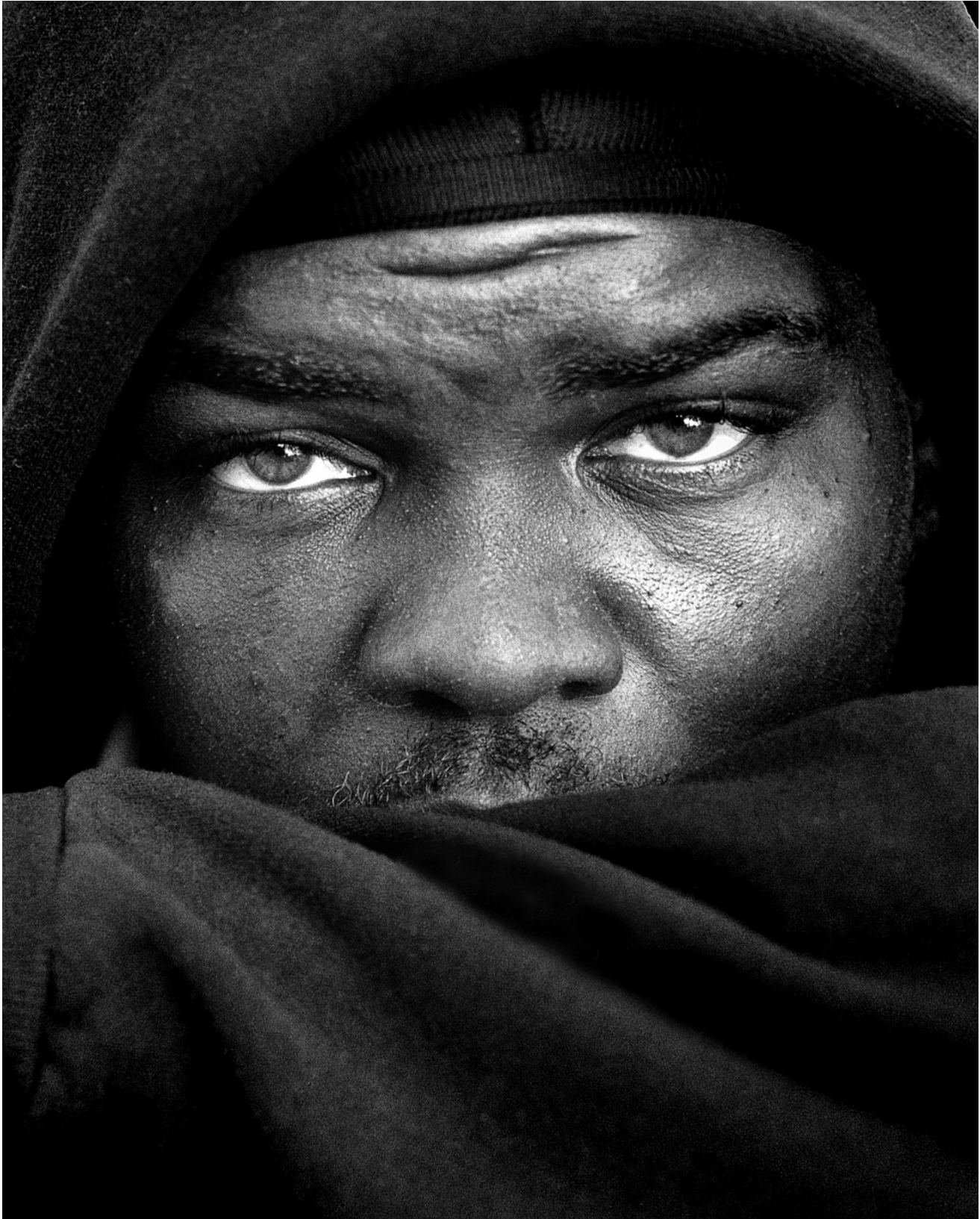
Synonyms of "Volunteer" as an adjective (1 Word)

Associations of "Volunteer" (30 Words)

ablaze	Keenly excited (especially sexually) or indicating excitement. <i>His eyes were ablaze with excitement.</i>
accidental	Happening by chance or unexpectedly or unintentionally. <i>A verdict of accidental death.</i>
adventitious	Associated by chance and not an integral part. <i>The adventitious population.</i>
ambulance	Convey in an ambulance. <i>He was taken by ambulance to the district hospital.</i>
blaze	Indicate by marking trees with blazes. <i>The horse had a blaze between its eyes.</i>
charitable	Full of love and generosity. <i>Charitable to the poor.</i>
charity	An activity or gift that benefits the public at large. <i>Faith hope and charity.</i>
discretionary	(especially of funds) not earmarked; available for use as needed. <i>There has been an increase in year end discretionary bonuses.</i>
endowment	The capital that provides income for an institution. <i>An endowment policy.</i>
extinguish	Extinguish by crushing. <i>Hope is extinguished little by little.</i>
firefighter	A person whose job is to extinguish fires.
fireman	A laborer who tends fires (as on a coal-fired train or steamship).
freshness	The quality of being pleasantly new or different. <i>The commentary should display freshness of insight.</i>
fundraiser	A social function that is held for the purpose of raising money. <i>A fundraiser for the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Society.</i>
humanitarian	Of or relating to or characteristic of humanitarianism. <i>Groups sending humanitarian aid.</i>
impromptu	Done without being planned, organized, or rehearsed. <i>An impromptu press conference.</i>
improvisation	A creation spoken or written or composed extemporaneously (without prior preparation). <i>Free form jazz improvisations.</i>
improvised	Done or made using whatever is available; makeshift. <i>We slept on improvised beds.</i>

naturalness	The quality or state of being natural. <i>He accepted the naturalness of death.</i>
outreach	The extent or length of reaching out. Outreach centres.
participation	The act of sharing in the activities of a group. Participation in chapel activities.
reflex	In reflexology a response in a part of the body to stimulation of a corresponding point on the feet hands or head. <i>A newborn baby is equipped with basic reflexes.</i>
<u>spontaneity</u>	The condition of being spontaneous; spontaneous behaviour or action. <i>She occasionally tore up her usual schedule in favour of spontaneity.</i>
<u>spontaneous</u>	(of movement or activity in an organism) instinctive or involuntary. Spontaneous laughter.
<u>uninhibited</u>	Expressing one's feelings or thoughts unselfconsciously and without restraint. <i>Fits of uninhibited laughter.</i>
unreserved	Not set apart for a particular purpose or booked in advance. Unreserved behavior.
volitional	With deliberate intention. <i>Acceptance is a volitional act.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	A person who freely enlists for service. Voluntary social workers.
want	Hunt or look for want for a particular reason. <i>You shall want for nothing while you are with me.</i>
<u>willingness</u>	The quality or state of being prepared to do something; readiness. <i>The ability and willingness of workers to migrate.</i>
