- *Wanting or devouring great quantities of food.*
- *Engaging in an activity with great eagerness or enthusiasm.*
- *Devouring or craving food in great quantities.*

- compulsive** Irresistibly interesting or exciting; compelling.
A ***compulsive*** liar.
- edacious** Relating to or given to eating.
Edacious vultures.
- esurient** Hungry or greedy.
Fell into the ***esurient*** embrace of a predatory enemy.
- gluttonous** Excessively greedy.
A ***gluttonous*** cigar smoking capitalist.

greedy	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>People driven from their land by greedy developers.</i>
<u>insatiable</u>	Of a person having an insatiable appetite or desire for something especially sex. <i>So insatiable a gourmand as myself.</i>
omnivorous	(of an animal or person) feeding on a variety of food of both plant and animal origin. <i>An omnivorous reader.</i>
prodigious	Remarkably or impressively great in extent, size, or degree. <i>A prodigious vision.</i>
rapacious	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>The rapacious wolf.</i>
ravening	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>Ravening creditors.</i>
<u>ravenous</u>	(of hunger or need) very great; voracious. <i>Ravenous as wolves.</i>
unappeasable	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>What began as an aspiration turned soon to an unappeasable hunger.</i>
<u>uncontrollable</u>	Not controllable. <i>Uncontrollable pain.</i>
<u>uncontrolled</u>	Not controlled. <i>Some uncontrolled children rather marred the proceedings.</i>
<u>unquenchable</u>	Not able to be quenched. <i>Unquenchable thirst.</i>
wolfish	Resembling or likened to a wolf, especially in being rapacious, voracious, or lascivious. <i>A wolfish grin.</i>

- *Paying taxes to voracious governments.*
- *She's a voracious reader.*

acquisitive

Eager to acquire and possess things especially material possessions or ideas.

An *acquisitive* mind.

addle	Become rotten. <i>Addled eggs.</i>
appetite	A feeling of craving something- Granville Hicks. <i>An appetite for life.</i>
covetous	Showing extreme cupidity; painfully desirous of another's advantages. <i>Jealous of his success and covetous of his possessions.</i>
<u>craving</u>	An intense desire for some particular thing. <i>A craving for chocolate.</i>
desire	Express a desire for. <i>There had been a time years ago when he had desired her.</i>
desirous	Having or characterized by desire. <i>The Pope was desirous of peace in Europe.</i>
epicurean	Of Epicurus or epicureanism. <i>Epicurean pleasures.</i>
glutton	A person who is devoted to eating and drinking to excess. <i>He s a glutton for adventure.</i>
gluttonous	Excessively greedy. <i>A gluttonous cigar smoking capitalist.</i>
gourmand	A connoisseur of good food; a gourmet.
grasping	Immoderately desirous of acquiring e.g. wealth. <i>The lecture was beyond his most strenuous graspings.</i>
greedy	Having or showing an intense and selfish desire for wealth or power. <i>He s scoffed the lot the greedy pig.</i>
hedonistic	Devoted to pleasure. <i>A hedonistic existence of booze drugs and parties.</i>
hungry	Causing hunger. <i>I always find art galleries hungry work.</i>
<u>insatiable</u>	Of a person having an insatiable appetite or desire for something especially sex. <i>An insatiable hunger for success.</i>
jealousy	The state or feeling of being jealous. <i>Cherish their official political freedom with fierce jealousy.</i>
<u>lecherous</u>	Having or showing excessive or offensive sexual desire. <i>She ignored his lecherous gaze.</i>
lupine	Any plant of the genus Lupinus; bearing erect spikes of usually purplish-blue flowers.

miser	A stingy hoarder of money and possessions often living miserably. <i>A typical miser he hid his money in the house in various places.</i>
miserly	Of or characteristic of a miser. <i>He left a miserly tip.</i>
moneylender	Someone who lends money at excessive rates of interest.
prehensile	Having a keen intellect. <i>Prehensile employers stingy with raises for their employees.</i>
rapacious	Excessively greedy and grasping. <i>A rapacious appetite.</i>
ravening	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>Ravening creditors.</i>
ravenous	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>Ravenous as wolves.</i>
swine	Stout-bodied short-legged omnivorous animals. <i>Mist is a swine in unfamiliar country.</i>
tantalize	Harass with persistent criticism or carping. <i>She still tantalized him.</i>
unquenchable	Not able to be quenched. <i>Unquenchable thirst.</i>
unscrupulous	Without scruples or principles. <i>Unscrupulous politicians who would be happy to sell their country in order to gain power.</i>
