- *Summon (a vouchee) into court to warrant or defend a title.*
- *Confirm that someone is who they say they are or that they are of good character.*
- *Give personal assurance; guarantee.*
- *Give supporting evidence.*
- *Assert or confirm as a result of one's own experience that something is true or accurately so described.*
- *Give surety or assume responsibility.*

Authorize officially.
*The Law Society will **certify** that the sum charged is fair and reasonable.*

Administer the religious rite of confirmation to.
*The organization has **confirmed** the appointment of Mr Collins as managing director.*

<u>corroborate</u>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The witness had corroborated the boy's account of the attack.</i> (in South Africa under apartheid) order a black person to leave an urban area for failing to meet certain requirements of the Native Laws Amendment Act. <i>A further 500 000 had been endorsed out of urban areas under the pass laws.</i>
endorse	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
give assurance of	Bestow.
give credence to	Accord by verdict.
give substance to	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>A demand that 100 000 be deposited to guarantee their costs.</i>
guarantee	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>The concept is difficult to prove.</i>
prove	Give support or one's approval to. <i>Her view is seconded by most Indian leaders today.</i>
<u>second</u>	Provide evidence for.
show the truth of	Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts. <i>They had found nothing to substantiate the allegations.</i>
<u>substantiate</u>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>At work during the day I could support the grief.</i>
support	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.
swear to	Provide evidence for.
testify to	Stand up for; stick up for; of causes, principles, or ideals. <i>They uphold a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.</i>
uphold	Give evidence for. <i>All analytical methods should be validated in respect of accuracy.</i>
validate	Check or regulate (a scientific experiment) by conducting a parallel experiment or comparing with another standard. <i>Verify a claim.</i>
verify	Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for. <i>The employees feel that industrial action is warranted.</i>

- *The explosive used is of my own formulation, and I can vouch for its efficiency.*
- *He was refused entrance until someone could vouch for him.*
- *I vouch for the quality of my products.*
- *He vouched his words by his deeds.*

adherence

The quality or process of sticking fast to an object or surface.
*A strict **adherence** to etiquette.*

assurance

Confidence or certainty in one's own abilities.
*He gave an **assurance** that work would begin on Monday.*

<u>assure</u>	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>They assured him of their full confidence.</i>
authenticity	The quality of being authentic. <i>The paper should have established the authenticity of the documents before publishing them.</i>
avow	Assert or confess openly. <i>He avowed his change of faith.</i>
betroth	Formally engage (someone) to be married. <i>In no time I shall be betrothed to Isabel.</i>
<u>commitment</u>	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>With so many business commitments time for recreation was limited.</i>
confidently	In a way that expresses little or no doubt about something. <i>He confidently predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<u>consistency</u>	The property of holding together and retaining its shape. <i>The consistency of measurement techniques.</i>
continuance	The state of remaining in existence or operation. <i>Scheduling trial dates and refusing to grant continuances are part of a judge's prerogative.</i>
<u>covenant</u>	Undertake to give a sum of money regularly to charity by means of a covenant. <i>The nations covenanted to fight terrorism around the world.</i>
encourage	Spur on. <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>
ensure	Make certain of. <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client ensure against being misled.</i>
foreordination	(theology) being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).
<u>genuine</u>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something G K Chesterton. <i>Genuine emotion.</i>
guarantee	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>The company guarantees to refund your money.</i>

indemnify	Secure (someone) against legal liability for their actions. <i>Each of the parties shall indemnify me for all reasonable costs of defending such actions and proceedings.</i>
indenture	Bind by or as if by indentures as of an apprentice or servant. <i>Dick was indentured to the Company in 1917.</i>
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of oaths.</i>
pledge	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>In his hand a sculptured goblet as he pledged the merchant kings.</i>
policyholder	A person who holds an insurance policy; usually, the client in whose name an insurance policy is written.
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>I ve been promised to him for years.</i>
quality	Of good quality excellent. <i>A quality family.</i>
reassure	Say or do something to remove the doubts or fears of (someone). <i>I reassured him that we were safe.</i>
recognizance	A security entered into before a court with a condition to perform some act required by law; on failure to perform that act a sum is forfeited. <i>He was released on his own recognizance of 30 000.</i>
renege	Fail to fulfill a promise or obligation. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t renege him.</i>
sincere	Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings. <i>An entirely sincere and cruel tyrant.</i>
sincerity	The quality of being open and truthful; not deceitful or hypocritical. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>
underwrite	Sign and accept liability under (an insurance policy), thus guaranteeing payment in case loss or damage occurs. <i>They were willing to underwrite in part the construction of a ship.</i>
viability	Ability to work successfully. <i>Pregnancy depends on the viability of the sperm and egg.</i>
