### Definitions of "Vouch" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “vouch” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Summon (a vouchee) into court to warrant or defend a title.*
- *Confirm that someone is who they say they are or that they are of good character.*
- *Give personal assurance; guarantee.*
- *Give supporting evidence.*
- *Assert or confirm as a result of one's own experience that something is true or accurately so described.*
- *Give surety or assume responsibility.*

Establish or verify the usage of.

Contain or hold; have within.

**certify**

Authorize officially.  
*The Law Society will **certify** that the sum charged is fair and reasonable.*

**confirm**

Administer the religious rite of confirmation to.  
*The organization has **confirmed** the appointment of Mr Collins as managing director.*

<b><u>corroborate</u></b>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The witness had <b>corroborated</b> the boy's account of the attack.</i>
<b>endorse</b>	(in South Africa under apartheid) order a black person to leave an urban area for failing to meet certain requirements of the Native Laws Amendment Act. <i>A further 500 000 had been <b>endorsed</b> out of urban areas under the pass laws.</i>
<b>give assurance of</b>	Submit for consideration, judgment, or use.
<b>give credence to</b>	Bestow.
<b>give substance to</b>	Accord by verdict.
<b>guarantee</b>	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>A demand that 100 000 be deposited to <b>guarantee</b> their costs.</i>
<b>prove</b>	Prove formally demonstrate by a mathematical formal proof. <i>The concept is difficult to <b>prove</b>.</i>
<b><u>second</u></b>	Give support or one's approval to. <i>Her view is <b>seconded</b> by most Indian leaders today.</i>
<b>show the truth of</b>	Provide evidence for.
<b><u>substantiate</u></b>	Establish or strengthen as with new evidence or facts. <i>They had found nothing to <b>substantiate</b> the allegations.</i>
<b>support</b>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>At work during the day I could <b>support</b> the grief.</i>
<b>swear to</b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.
<b>testify to</b>	Provide evidence for.
<b>uphold</b>	Stand up for; stick up for; of causes, principles, or ideals. <i>They <b>uphold</b> a tradition of not causing distress to living creatures.</i>
<b>validate</b>	Give evidence for. <i>All analytical methods should be <b>validated</b> in respect of accuracy.</i>
<b>verify</b>	Check or regulate (a scientific experiment) by conducting a parallel experiment or comparing with another standard. <i><b>Verify</b> a claim.</i>
<b>warrant</b>	Show to be reasonable or provide adequate ground for. <i>The employees feel that industrial action is <b>warranted</b>.</i>

- *The explosive used is of my own formulation, and I can vouch for its efficiency.*
- *He was refused entrance until someone could vouch for him.*
- *I vouch for the quality of my products.*
- *He vouched his words by his deeds.*

### **adherence**

The quality or process of sticking fast to an object or surface.  
*A strict **adherence** to etiquette.*

### **assurance**

Confidence or certainty in one's own abilities.  
*He gave an **assurance** that work would begin on Monday.*

<b><u>assure</u></b>	Assure somebody of the truth of something with the intention of giving the listener confidence. <i>They <b>assured</b> him of their full confidence.</i>
<b>authenticity</b>	The quality of being authentic. <i>The paper should have established the <b>authenticity</b> of the documents before publishing them.</i>
<b>avow</b>	Assert or confess openly. <i>He <b>avowed</b> his change of faith.</i>
<b>betroth</b>	Formally engage (someone) to be married. <i>In no time I shall be <b>betrothed</b> to Isabel.</i>
<b><u>commitment</u></b>	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>With so many business <b>commitments</b> time for recreation was limited.</i>
<b>confidently</b>	In a way that expresses little or no doubt about something. <i>He <b>confidently</b> predicts a change of fortune.</i>
<b><u>consistency</u></b>	The property of holding together and retaining its shape. <i>The <b>consistency</b> of measurement techniques.</i>
<b>continuance</b>	The state of remaining in existence or operation. <i>Scheduling trial dates and refusing to grant <b>continuances</b> are part of a judge's prerogative.</i>
<b><u>covenant</u></b>	Undertake to give a sum of money regularly to charity by means of a covenant. <i>The nations <b>covenanted</b> to fight terrorism around the world.</i>
<b>encourage</b>	Spur on. <i>Pupils are <b>encouraged</b> to be creative.</i>
<b>ensure</b>	Make certain of. <i>Only by researching stocks thoroughly can a client <b>ensure</b> against being misled.</i>
<b>foreordination</b>	(theology) being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).
<b><u>genuine</u></b>	Being or reflecting the essential or genuine character of something G K Chesterton. <i><b>Genuine</b> emotion.</i>
<b>guarantee</b>	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>The company <b>guarantees</b> to refund your money.</i>

<b>indemnify</b>	Secure (someone) against legal liability for their actions. <i>Each of the parties shall <b>indemnify</b> me for all reasonable costs of defending such actions and proceedings.</i>
<b>indenture</b>	Bind by or as if by indentures as of an apprentice or servant. <i>Dick was <b>indentured</b> to the Company in 1917.</i>
<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of <b>oaths</b>.</i>
<b>pledge</b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>In his hand a sculptured goblet as he <b>pledged</b> the merchant kings.</i>
<b>policyholder</b>	A person who holds an insurance policy; usually, the client in whose name an insurance policy is written.
<b>promise</b>	Make a promise or commitment. <i>I ve been <b>promised</b> to him for years.</i>
<b>quality</b>	Of good quality excellent. <i>A <b>quality</b> family.</i>
<b>reassure</b>	Say or do something to remove the doubts or fears of (someone). <i>I <b>reassured</b> him that we were safe.</i>
<b>recognizance</b>	A security entered into before a court with a condition to perform some act required by law; on failure to perform that act a sum is forfeited. <i>He was released on his own <b>recognizance</b> of 30 000.</i>
<b>renege</b>	Fail to fulfill a promise or obligation. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t <b>renege</b> him.</i>
<b>sincere</b>	Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings. <i>An entirely <b>sincere</b> and cruel tyrant.</i>
<b>sincerity</b>	The quality of being open and truthful; not deceitful or hypocritical. <i>The simple <b>sincerity</b> of folk songs.</i>
<b>underwrite</b>	Sign and accept liability under (an insurance policy), thus guaranteeing payment in case loss or damage occurs. <i>They were willing to <b>underwrite</b> in part the construction of a ship.</i>
<b>viability</b>	Ability to work successfully. <i>Pregnancy depends on the <b>viability</b> of the sperm and egg.</i>
