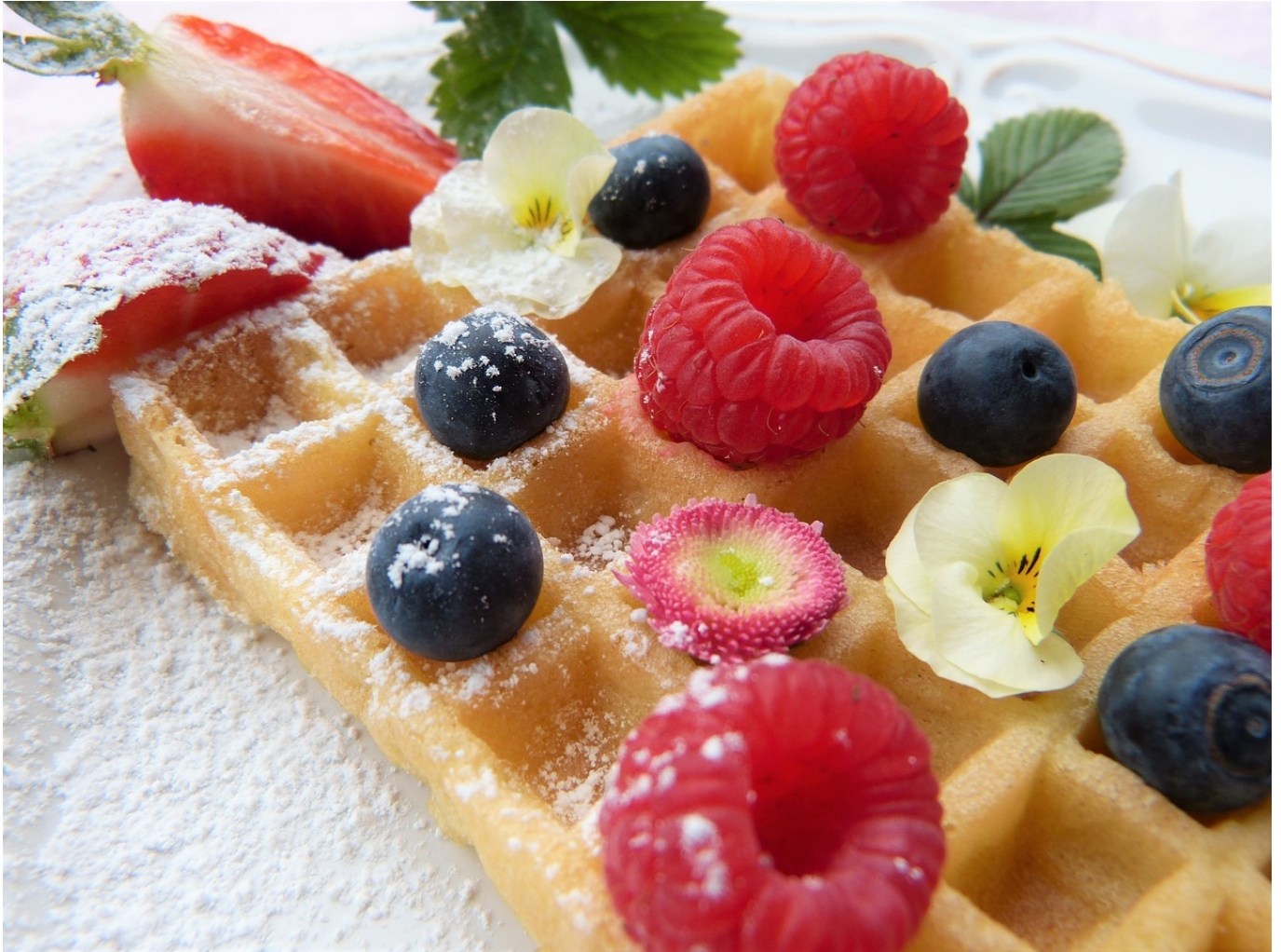

Synonyms of "Waffle" as a noun (14 Words)

bunkum	Nonsense. <i>They talk a lot of bunkum about their products.</i>
drivel	A worthless message. <i>Don t talk such drivel.</i>
gibberish	Unintelligible or meaningless speech or writing; nonsense. <i>He talks gibberish.</i>
jabbering	Rapid and indistinct speech.
meaningless talk	An exchange of ideas via conversation.
mumbo jumbo	Language or ritual causing, or intending to cause, confusion.
<u>nonsense</u>	Ornamental objects of no great value. <i>She s a strong woman who stands no nonsense.</i>

- padding** Artifact consisting of soft or resilient material used to fill or give shape or protect or add comfort.
*Avoid waffle or **padding** in your essay.*
- prattle** Foolish or inconsequential talk.
*Do you intend to keep up this childish **prattle**.*
- prolixity** Boring verbosity.
- stuff and nonsense** Informal terms for personal possessions.
- twaddle** Pretentious or silly talk or writing.
*He dismissed the novel as self indulgent **twaddle**.*
- verbiage** Excessively lengthy or technical speech or writing.
*Use concise military **verbiage**.*
- verbosity** An expressive style that uses excessive or empty words.
*A critic with a reputation for **verbosity**.*

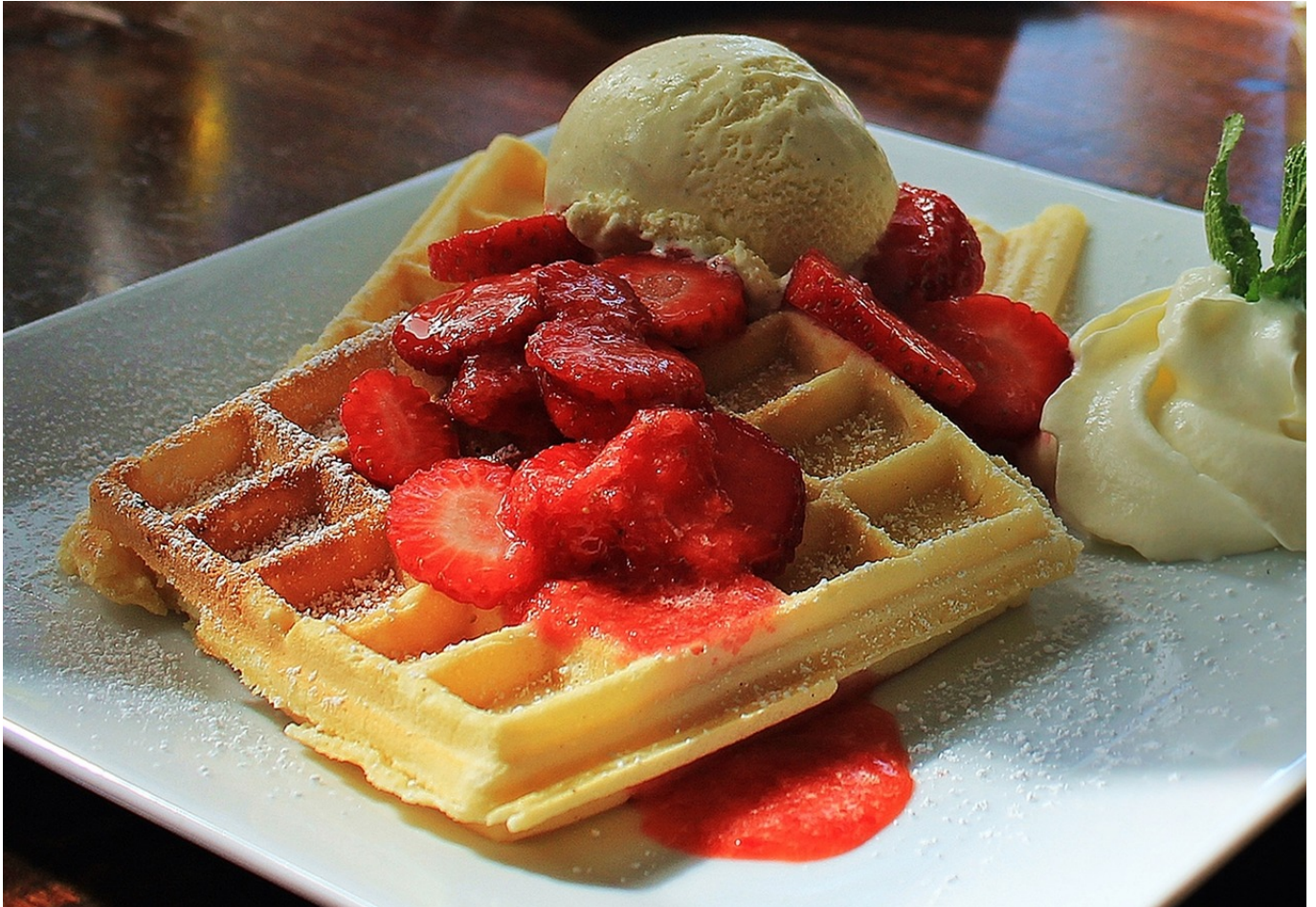
- *Fail to make up one's mind.*
- *Pause or hold back in uncertainty or unwillingness.*
- *Speak or write at length in a vague or trivial manner.*



Synonyms of "Waffle" as a verb (18 Words)

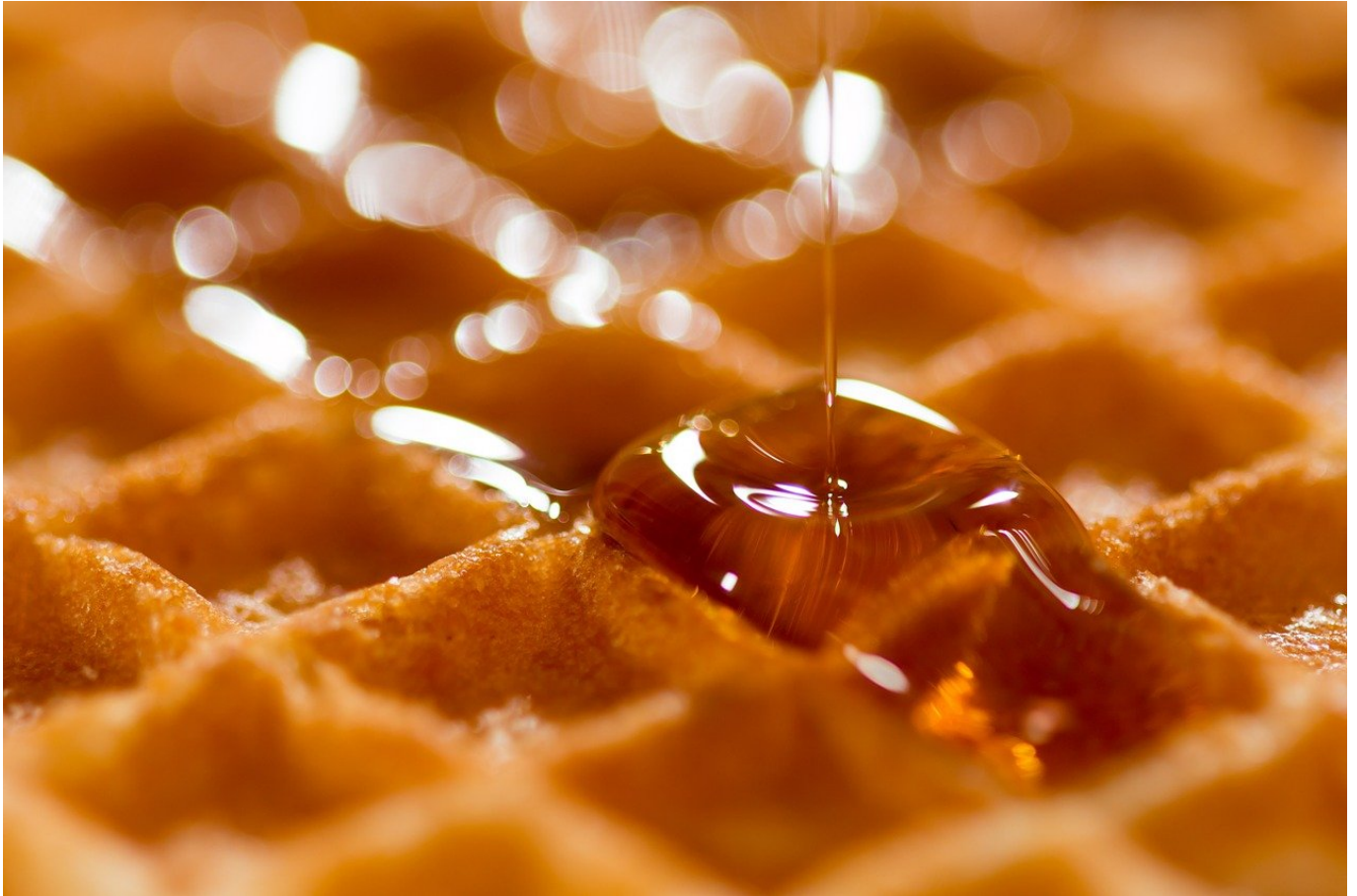
- babble** Utter something rapidly and incoherently.
*I gasped and stared and **babbled** Look at this.*
- bleat** (of a sheep, goat, or calf) make a characteristic weak, wavering cry.
*The lambs were **bleating**.*
- burble** Make a continuous murmuring noise.
*The air no longer flows smoothly over the wing but **burbles** and slows down decreasing lift.*
- cackle** Talk or utter in a cackling manner.
*The women **cackled** when they saw the movie star step out of the limousine.*
- chatter** Cut unevenly with a chattering tool.
*The magpies were **chattering** in the trees.*
- drivel** Let saliva drivel from the mouth.
*The nurse leaves you to **drivel** and never wipes your nose.*

- gab** Talk at length, typically about trivial matters.
*It seems they were too busy **gabbing** about their weekend to actually help a customer.*
- gabble** Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly.
*He **gabbled** on in a panicky way until he was dismissed.*
- gibber** Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly.
*They shrieked and **gibbered** as flames surrounded them.*
- hesitate** Be reluctant to do something.
*He **hesitated** to spoil the mood by being inquisitive.*
- jabber** Talk in a rapid, excited, and often incomprehensible way.
*He **jabbered** on about football.*
- mumble** Say something indistinctly and quietly, making it difficult for others to hear.
*Sorry she **mumbled**.*
- mutter** Say something in a low or barely audible voice, especially in dissatisfaction or irritation.
*He **muttered** something under his breath.*
- prate** Talk foolishly or at tedious length about something.
*I heard him **prate** on for at least an hour and a half.*
- prattle** Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly.
*She began to **prattle** on about her visit to the dentist.*
- ramble** Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment.
*Willy **rambled** on about Norman archways.*
- run on** Flee; take to one's heels; cut and run.
- waver** Move back and forth very rapidly.
*The flame **wavered** in the draught.*



Usage Examples of "Waffle" as a verb

- *He waffled on about his problems.*
- *Joseph had been waffling over where to go.*



Associations of "Waffle" (30 Words)

- bake** A social gathering at which baked food of a specified kind is eaten.
Bake a cake.
- baked** Intoxicated by drink or drugs, especially cannabis.
Baked goods.
- batter** Make a dent or impression in.
*The loss of his baby turned him into a domineering bully who **battered** his partner.*
- bread** The bread or wafer used in the Eucharist.
*A loaf of **bread**.*
- breakfast** Provide breakfast for.
*I often have toast for my **breakfast**.*
- burnt** Ruined by overcooking.
*She served us underdone bacon and **burnt** biscuits.*

butter	Spread butter on. <i>Lily battered a slice of toast.</i>
cake	Baked goods made from or based on a mixture of flour, sugar, eggs, and fat. <i>A mouthful of cake.</i>
cooked	(of food or a meal) prepared by heating. <i>A cooked breakfast.</i>
cornbread	Bread made primarily of cornmeal.
crisp	A thin crisp slice of potato fried in deep fat. <i>A crisp autumn day.</i>
crispy	Tender and brittle. <i>Crispy fried bacon.</i>
dessert	A dish served as the last course of a meal. <i>A dessert of chocolate mousse.</i>
doubt	Consider unlikely or have doubts about. <i>I doubt these reports.</i>
falter	Speak haltingly. <i>Her smile faltered and then faded.</i>
fried	Under the influence of alcohol or drugs. <i>A breakfast of fried eggs and bacon.</i>
fry	Kill by electrocution, as in the electric chair. <i>Drugs fry the brain.</i>
grill	A dish of grilled food especially meat. <i>Grill the sausages.</i>
hesitate	Be reluctant to do something. <i>One hesitates over publicizing these things.</i>
microwave	Cook or heat in a microwave oven. <i>Microwave radiation.</i>
oven	An enclosed compartment, usually part of a cooker, for cooking and heating food. <i>The sun was beating down on to my little tent and it was like an oven in there.</i>
pancake	With reference to an aircraft make or cause to make a pancake landing. <i>Hurley s car was pancaked.</i>
recipe	Something which is likely to lead to a particular outcome. <i>It would be useless to enumerate all the drugs and recipes for their application which have been tried.</i>
roast	The process of roasting something especially coffee or the result of this. <i>If you waste his time he ll roast you.</i>

- sandwich** Something that is constructed like or has the form of a sandwich.
*The degree includes a **sandwich** year.*
- smoked** (used especially of meats and fish) dried and cured by hanging in wood smoke.
*They were hidden behind the **smoked** glass of their limos.*
- stove** Treat an object by heating it in a stove in order to apply a desired surface coating.
*Dinner was already on the **stove**.*
- toast** Slices of bread that have been toasted.
*We were spread out on the grass **toasting** ourselves one hot day.*
- toaster** A kitchen appliance (usually electric) for toasting bread.
- warmed** Having been warmed up.
*A cup of **warmed** milk.*
