Directed or bound inward.

- compensate** Make payment to compensate.  
*The manager is hoping for victory to **compensate** for the team's dismal league campaign.*
- compensation** The action or process of awarding compensation.  
*Send your CV and current **compensation** to Executive Search Consultant.*
- duty** The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force- John.  
*It's my **duty** to uphold the law.*

<b>earnings</b>	Money obtained in return for labour or services. <i>He claimed damages for loss of <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>emolument</b>	A salary, fee, or profit from employment or office. <i>The directors <b>emoluments</b>.</i>
<b>income</b>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate <b>income</b>.</i>
<b>increment</b>	A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>All sizes from 4 30 mm in 1 mm <b>increments</b>.</i>
<b>meed</b>	A person's deserved share of praise, honour, etc. <i>He must extract from her some <b>meed</b> of approbation.</i>
<b>paid</b>	(of work or leave) for or during which one receives pay. <i>Five weeks <b>paid</b> holiday a year.</i>
<b>pay</b>	Bring in. <i>You ll <b>pay</b> for this.</i>
<b>payment</b>	A sum of money paid or a claim discharged. <i>A suit with a velvet collar that I got as <b>payment</b> for being in the show.</i>
<b>perquisite</b>	A thing which has served its primary use and to which a subordinate or employee has a customary right. <i>The <b>perquisites</b> of celebrity are intoxicating.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	Make amends for; pay compensation for. <i>Adequate <b>recompense</b> for workers who lose their jobs.</i>
<b>refund</b>	Pay back money to. <i>I ll <b>refund</b> you for the apples and any other damage.</i>
<b>reimburse</b>	Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>Your expenses will be <b>reimbursed</b>.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	Compensation paid (to someone) for damages or losses or money already spent etc. <i><b>Reimbursement</b> of everyday medical costs.</i>
<b>remunerate</b>	Pay (someone) for services rendered or work done. <i>They should be <b>remunerated</b> fairly for their work.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	Money paid for work or a service. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional <b>remuneration</b>.</i>
<b>restitution</b>	The restoration of something lost or stolen to its proper owner. <i>Upon the <b>restitution</b> of the book to its rightful owner the child was given a tongue lashing.</i>

<b>revenue</b>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>The government s tax <b>revenues</b>.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>A slap on the face was his <b>reward</b> for his cheek.</i>
<b>salary</b>	Pay a salary to. <i>He received a <b>salary</b> of 24 000.</i>
<b>subsidy</b>	A grant paid by a government to an enterprise that benefits the public. <i>She was anxious about her Arts Council <b>subsidy</b>.</i>
<b>tariff</b>	Charge a tariff. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import <b>tariffs</b>.</i>
<b>tax</b>	Impose a tax on someone or something. <i>An officer <b>taxing</b> a bill of costs.</i>
<b>taxable</b>	Subject to taxation. <i><b>Taxable</b> income.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>The progressive nature of <b>taxation</b>.</i>
<b>unremunerative</b>	Not yielding profit or recompense. <i><b>Unremunerative</b> research work.</i>
