- cash** Exchange for cash.

- compensate** Make payment to compensate.
*The manager is hoping for victory to **compensate** for the team's dismal league campaign.*
- compensation** The action or process of awarding compensation.
*Send your CV and current **compensation** to Executive Search Consultant.*
- duty** The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force- John.
*It's my **duty** to uphold the law.*

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| earnings | Money obtained in return for labour or services. <i>He claimed damages for loss of earnings.</i> |
| emolument | A salary, fee, or profit from employment or office. <i>The directors emoluments.</i> |
| income | The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate income.</i> |
| increment | A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>All sizes from 4 30 mm in 1 mm increments.</i> |
| meed | A person's deserved share of praise, honour, etc. <i>He must extract from her some meed of approbation.</i> |
| paid | (of work or leave) for or during which one receives pay. <i>Five weeks paid holiday a year.</i> |
| pay | Bring in. <i>You ll pay for this.</i> |
| payment | A sum of money paid or a claim discharged. <i>A suit with a velvet collar that I got as payment for being in the show.</i> |
| perquisite | A thing which has served its primary use and to which a subordinate or employee has a customary right. <i>The perquisites of celebrity are intoxicating.</i> |
| recompense | Make amends for; pay compensation for. <i>Adequate recompense for workers who lose their jobs.</i> |
| refund | Pay back money to. <i>I ll refund you for the apples and any other damage.</i> |
| reimburse | Reimburse or compensate someone as for a loss. <i>Your expenses will be reimbursed.</i> |
| reimbursement | Compensation paid (to someone) for damages or losses or money already spent etc. <i>Reimbursement of everyday medical costs.</i> |
| remunerate | Pay (someone) for services rendered or work done. <i>They should be remunerated fairly for their work.</i> |
| remuneration | Money paid for work or a service. <i>They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional remuneration.</i> |
| restitution | The restoration of something lost or stolen to its proper owner. <i>Upon the restitution of the book to its rightful owner the child was given a tongue lashing.</i> |

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| revenue | The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>The government s tax revenues.</i> |
| reward | Strengthen and support with rewards. <i>A slap on the face was his reward for his cheek.</i> |
| salary | Pay a salary to. <i>He received a salary of 24 000.</i> |
| subsidy | A grant paid by a government to an enterprise that benefits the public. <i>She was anxious about her Arts Council subsidy.</i> |
| tariff | Charge a tariff. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import tariffs.</i> |
| tax | Impose a tax on someone or something. <i>An officer taxing a bill of costs.</i> |
| taxable | Subject to taxation. <i>Taxable income.</i> |
| taxation | Government income due to taxation. <i>The progressive nature of taxation.</i> |
| unremunerative | Not yielding profit or recompense. <i>Unremunerative research work.</i> |
