- *A person who waits for a time, event, or opportunity.*
- *A small tray; a salver.*

- attendant** A person employed to provide a service to the public in a particular place.
*A mosaic of the Empress Theodora with her **attendants**.*
- server** A waiter or waitress.
*The software runs on a variety of Unix **servers**.*
- steward** One having charge of buildings or grounds or animals.
*Farmers pride themselves on being **stewards** of the countryside.*
- stewardess** A woman employed to look after the passengers on a ship or aircraft.
- waitress** A woman waiter.

- accommodation** A convenient arrangement; a settlement or compromise.
*They were living in temporary **accommodation**.*
- attendant** An assistant to an important person; a servant or courtier.
***Attendant** members of the congregation.*
- audience** Formal hearing.

- booking** An act of reserving accommodation, a ticket, etc. in advance.
*The play had **bookings** throughout the summer.*
- bookshop** A shop where books are sold.
- butler** English novelist who described a fictitious land he called Erewhon (1835-1902).
- cater** Give what is desired or needed, especially support, food or sustenance.
*My mother helped to **cater** for the party.*

cleaning	The act of making something clean. <i>He gave his shoes a good cleaning.</i>
clerk	Work as a clerk. <i>Eleven of those who left college this year are clerking in auction stores.</i>
constable	A lawman with less authority and jurisdiction than a sheriff. A person who has responsibility for taking care of or protecting something.
<u>custodian</u>	<i>The custodian of the Great Seal in Canada is always the Secretary of State.</i>
dishwasher	A machine for washing dishes automatically.
<u>hostel</u>	A hotel providing overnight lodging for travelers.
hostelry	An inn or pub.
<u>hotel</u>	A pub. A hotel room.
<u>librarian</u>	A person in charge of or assisting in a library.
overnight	Done happening or for use overnight. <i>They refused to stay overnight.</i>
participant	Someone who takes part in an activity. <i>Staff are to be active participants in the decision making process.</i>
porter	Someone who guards an entrance. <i>A nice pint of porter.</i>
pub	Frequent pubs. <i>Sometimes we would catch the train into Oxford and go pubbing.</i>
receptionist	A secretary whose main duty is to answer the telephone and receive visitors.
reservation	An area of land set aside for occupation by North American Indians or Australian Aboriginal people. <i>The boy s family live on a reservation.</i>
<u>restaurant</u>	A place where people pay to sit and eat meals that are cooked and served on the premises.
<u>secretary</u>	An official in charge of a US government department. <i>She was secretary of the Women s Labour League.</i>
server	A waiter or waitress. <i>The software runs on a variety of Unix servers.</i>
service	Perform a service or services for someone. <i>He volunteered his services as a driver.</i>

- shop** Do one's shopping at do business with be a customer or client of.
*She **shopped** for groceries twice a week.*
- steward** One having charge of buildings or grounds or animals.
*Farmers pride themselves on being **stewards** of the countryside.*
- tollbooth** A roadside kiosk where drivers or pedestrians must pay to use a bridge or road.
- treasurer** A person appointed to administer or manage the financial assets and liabilities of a society, company, local authority, or other body.
