| division | Biology a group of organisms forming a subdivision of a larger category. <i>No multiplication or division is necessary.</i> |
| hospital ward | A medical institution where sick or injured people are given medical or surgical care. |
| mary augusta arnold ward | English writer of novels who was an active opponent of the women's suffrage movement (1851-1920). |
| montgomery ward | A district into which a city or town is divided for the purpose of administration and elections. |

| admit to hospital | Allow to enter; grant entry to. |
| give entry to | Afford access to. |
| guard | Stay close to (an opponent) in order to prevent them getting or passing the ball. <i>Guard my possessions while I m away.</i> |
| let in | Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition. |
| receive | Receive a specified treatment abstract. <i>The basin that receives your blood.</i> |
| take in | Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes. |

captor A person that catches or confines another.

| convoy | A procession of land vehicles traveling together. <i>A convoy of lorries.</i> |
| defence | The counsel for the defendant in a lawsuit. <i>Wire netting is the best defence against rabbits.</i> |
| defend | Be on the defensive; act against an attack. <i>They were forced to defend for long periods.</i> |
| defense | The justification for some act or belief. <i>He gave evidence for the defense.</i> |
| defensible | Justifiable by argument. <i>A morally defensible penal system.</i> |
| fender | A low frame bordering a fireplace to prevent burning coals from falling out. <i>In Britain they call a fender a wing.</i> |
| frontier | An undeveloped field of study; a topic inviting research and development. <i>The frontier between thought and reality is confused.</i> |
| guard | The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>The gates were guarded by soldiers.</i> |
| guide | Use as a guide. <i>Your resting pulse rate is a rough guide to your general physical condition.</i> |
| helmet | A predatory mollusc with a squat heavy shell, which lives in tropical and temperate seas. |
| ironclad | Covered or protected with iron. <i>An ironclad guarantee.</i> |
| protect | Shield (a domestic industry) from competition by imposing import duties on foreign goods. <i>Japan s Ministry of Trade Industry erected barriers to protect the country s infant computer industry.</i> |
| protecting | Shielding (or designed to shield) against harm or discomfort. <i>A protecting alibi.</i> |
| protector | A person or thing that protects someone or something. <i>A man who became her protector adviser and friend.</i> |
| ranger | A keeper of a park, forest, or area of countryside. <i>Rangers of the mountains.</i> |
| safeguard | Escort safely. <i>A framework which safeguards employees from exploitation.</i> |

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| <u>secretive</u> | Inclined to secrecy or reticence about divulging information. <i>Secretive deals.</i> |
| <u>security</u> | Procedures followed or measures taken to ensure the security of a state or organization. <i>The emotional security of being the one special person that someone else loves.</i> |
| sentry | A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>On sentry duty.</i> |
| <u>shelter</u> | Provide shelter for. <i>We are sheltered from the awfulness of reality.</i> |
| tenable | Based on sound reasoning or evidence. <i>Such a simplistic approach is no longer tenable.</i> |
| <u>territorial</u> | Nonprofessional soldier member of a territorial military unit. <i>The gerbils territorial behaviour.</i> |
| watchman | A man employed to look after an empty building, especially at night. <i>A night watchman.</i> |
