- caretaker** A custodian who is hired to take care of something (property or a person).
*He works as a college **caretaker**.*
- chancellor** A senior state or legal official.
*The Lord **chancellor** and the judges will consider the application.*
- chief** The head of an organization.
*It s quite simple **chief**.*
- concierge** A French caretaker of apartments or a hotel; lives on the premises and oversees people entering and leaving and handles mail and acts as janitor or porter.

<u>curator</u>	A keeper or custodian of a museum or other collection. <i>The curator of drawings at the National Gallery.</i>
<u>custodian</u>	A person employed to clean and maintain a building. <i>The custodian of the Great Seal in Canada is always the Secretary of State.</i>
director	Member of a board of directors. <i>The sales director.</i>
doorman	A man such as a porter, bouncer, or janitor who is on duty at the entrance to a large building.
governor	A member of a governing body. <i>The governor of the Bank of England.</i>
guard	The person who plays the position of guard on a basketball team. <i>Guards must be good blockers.</i>
<u>guardian</u>	A person who cares for persons or property. <i>I am acting as guardian of my late brother's family.</i>
head	The pressure exerted by a head of water or by a confined body of steam. <i>Stags yearly cast their heads in March.</i>
jailer	Someone who guards prisoners.
<u>janitor</u>	Someone employed to clean and maintain a building.
keeper	An animal attendant employed in a zoo. <i>These lakes consistently give up healthy pound size keepers.</i>
master	Someone who holds a master's degree from academic institution. <i>A master's degree.</i>
mistress	A woman (other than the man's wife) having a sexual relationship with a married man. <i>Mary go and fetch your mistress some cold chicken.</i>
<u>overseer</u>	A person who directs and manages an organization.
porter	A person employed to carry supplies on a mountaineering expedition. <i>The company produces a bottle conditioned porter.</i>
preserver	A substance used to preserve food, wood, or other materials against damage or decay. <i>You might also want to coat the bottom of the canes with wood preserver.</i>
<u>president</u>	The head of a university. <i>The president of the European Union.</i>
principal	An actor who plays a principal role. <i>A design consultancy whose principal is based in San Francisco.</i>

prison officer	A correctional institution where persons are confined while on trial or for punishment.
protector	A person or thing that protects someone or something. <i>A man who became her protector adviser and friend.</i>
provost	The head of certain university colleges, especially at Oxford or Cambridge, and public schools.
ranger	A commando. <i>Rangers of the mountains.</i>
rector	A person authorized to conduct religious worship.
sentry	A person employed to keep watch for some anticipated event. <i>On sentry duty.</i>
steward	Someone who manages property or other affairs for someone else. <i>Farmers pride themselves on being stewards of the countryside.</i>
superintendent	A caretaker for an apartment house; represents the owner as janitor and rent collector. <i>Superintendent of district nurses.</i>
supervisor	A person who directs and oversees the work of a postgraduate research student.
vice chancellor	Moral weakness.
watchman	A member of a body of people employed to keep watch in a town at night. <i>A night watchman.</i>

apartment	A block of apartments. <i>The Imperial apartments.</i>
arrest	The action of seizing someone and taking them into custody. <i>I have a warrant for your arrest.</i>
captive	An animal that is confined. <i>A captive power plant.</i>
captivity	The state of being a slave. <i>He was released after 865 days in captivity.</i>
capture	Bring about the capture of an elementary particle or celestial body and causing it enter a new orbit. <i>This nucleus has captured the slow moving neutrons.</i>

committal	The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital). <i>The funeral service was held on May 12 followed by committal at Forest Lawn Cemetery.</i>
convict	A person who has been convicted of a criminal offense. <i>Twelve people were convicted for their part in an attempted coup.</i>
conviction	A final judgment of guilty in a criminal case and the punishment that is imposed. <i>She had a previous conviction for a similar offence.</i>
courtyard	An unroofed area that is completely or partially enclosed by walls or buildings, typically one forming part of a castle or large house.
culprit	The cause of a problem or defect. <i>Low level ozone pollution is the real culprit.</i>
detention	A state of being confined (usually for a short time). <i>The detention of tardy pupils.</i>
dungeon	Imprison someone in a dungeon.
felony	A serious crime (such as murder or arson). <i>An accusation of felony.</i>
fetter	Restrain with fetters. <i>The fetters of convention.</i>
imprisonment	The state of being imprisoned. <i>He was sentenced to two months imprisonment.</i>
incarcerate	Imprison or confine. <i>The murderer was incarcerated for the rest of his life.</i>
indictment	A formal charge or accusation of a serious crime. <i>These rapidly escalating crime figures are an indictment of our society.</i>
inmate	A patient who is residing in the hospital where he is being treated. <i>Inmates of the Louisiana State Penitentiary.</i>
intern	Work as an intern. <i>The young doctor is interning at the Medical Center this year.</i>
jail	Put someone in jail. <i>The driver was jailed for two years.</i>
locus	The set of all points or lines that satisfy or are determined by specific conditions. <i>The real locus of power is the informal council.</i>
misbehave	Behave badly. <i>The children misbehaved all morning.</i>

nick	Make a nick or nicks in. <i>A small nick on his wrist.</i>
offender	A person who transgresses moral or civil law. <i>An institution for young offenders.</i>
park	Bring a vehicle that one is driving to a halt and leave it temporarily typically in a car park or by the side of the road. <i>A panda cub is drawing the crowds at a wildlife park.</i>
parole	Release a prisoner on parole. <i>I took their paroles of honour.</i>
penitentiary	Showing or constituting penance. <i>Penitentiary institutions.</i>
prison	A prisonlike situation a place of seeming confinement. <i>He died in prison.</i>
ranger	A keeper of a park, forest, or area of countryside. <i>Park rangers.</i>
renter	A person who rents a flat, car, or other object.
